POLL: BLACKS **GOT UNFAIR TRIAL**

Indianapolis, Ind. (NBNS) -A recent poll of Blacks in the Indianapolis area shows that two of every three believe former boxing champion Mike Tyson did not get a fair trial for the rape charges lodged against him. Both Brack men and women felt roughl, the same. The survey of 1,207 people was conducted by the Public Opinion Laboratory of Indiana University. Among Blacks, 67% said Tyson was convicted unfairly, 11% said he was guifty but receive an unfair sentence and 7% felt he was tried and sentenced fairly while 23% said they did not know. Survey director Brian Vargas said the Tyson case appears to reflect a common view among African-Americans that the criminal justice system treats Blacks, especially Black men, unfairly.

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

"Moses Rebuts Editorials On Schools"

Editor's Note: The following letter was sent to us by LISD Superintendent Mike Moses who falsely attributed the editorials to Stephen C. McIntyre.)

Recently, I have read another article from your newspaper written by Stephen McIntyre. Mr. McIntyra continue to write with regard to the 5-2 and 7-0 plans for school trustee redistricting. Since I have not made a recommendation with regard to either of

these two plans and since the merits of both have been discussed a great deal, I will not seek your time reviewing the subject. Nevertheless, I am tremendously perplexed about why you continue to allow Mr. McIntyre to write columns which are so lacking in truth or dictorted as to facts regarding the Lubbock Independent School District.

The school district has never said it was perfect. In fact, this school district experienced many of the same problems of other school district across the United States in the 1960's and 1970's. There is no doubt that racial segregation existed in this school district as others. Furthermore, this school district was placed under federal court supervision, as were other districts. Many years have come and gone, and good people have tried very hard to correct as many injustices as possible. That does not mean that problems do not still exist, but you seem intent on letting Mr. Mointyre continue to challenge the good faith efforts made by

It almost seems as though an attack on the school district is nothing more than "cannon fodder" for those who simply want to continue to push their own agenda or represent divisiveness. I have heard much from Mr. Petterson about all of us pulling together and trying to move in the same direction, ye the information I see in the newspaper is continually negative toward the

Mr. McIntyre's recollection of facts regarding the school district is flawed in many ways . He makes a special point of always referring to some of the trustees on the school board as "white." It seems as though anyone who disagrees with his point of view has to be identified by race. Naturally, he would find it offensive if this same identification was used by non-minorities who disagreed with the minority point of view. He states that 'LISD's white trustees then went back on their promise to build the school by trying to convince the federal court that it was 'against public policy' to build the school because it would cost much more than LISD originally expected.* Once a decision was randered by the federal court that the school in central Lubbock was to be built, trustees promptly voted to do so and no appeal was made to the Fifth Circuit or to the United States Supreme Court.

Mr. McIntyre goes on to be completely dishonest and states that "The LISD's white trustees didn't care and ignored our views." Specifically, he was speaking about the conversion of Dunbar High School as a high school. In fact, many residents in the East Lubbook community were consulted about the transition of Dunbar-Struggs High School, Certainly, everyche did not agree with what was to occur, but dialogue did take place.

In fact, both of you gentlemen were involved in this dialogue on several occasions. Moreover, several people who were present at a meeting in 1990 distinctly remembered Mr. Patterson expressing views that perhaps we needed three high school, or, if Dunbar were no longer a high school, the district needed to be sure if was used as some other type of facility. There certainly was recognition that East Lubbook was finding it difficult to support two high schools 2.4 miles apart. Of course, there were a great many thoughts expressed to school administrators and school trustees in private that were later forgotten after trustees voted on the plan to transition Dunbar.

Mr. Mctrityre states, "Closing Dunbar as a high school will hurt East Lubbock and Lubbock's minerity citizens and economic

growth." Perhaps Mr. McIntyre puts that issue ahead of properly educating young people wiso will be responsible for that economic growth. The fact that 17 honors courses offered at other high schools in our district that were not offered at Dunber High School does not seem to bother Mr. McIntyre. As long as these students were captured and given some type of education that would be inferior would be fine with him. In fact, this would give him another issue to write about. He could say the school district furnished an infraior education to students at Durbar. If the school district tried to do anything about it, he could then critize the school district for whatever if chose to do about the utilization

Mr. McIntyre greatest abuse of the truth is in his statement, "We remember how they tried to make it look like their citizens' advisory group thought up the idea (Dunbar reutilization), when actually the LISD superintendent developed the plan a year earlier." That is an assertion that Mr. McIntyre simply cannot prove, and he knows it. I had no agenda with regard to Dunbar-Struggs High School when I came to the Lubbock Independent School Dis-

Mointyre says several times in his column, "We remember that " Unfortunately, Mr. Mointyre has a selected memory and chooses not to remember some things. He was a member of the citizens' advisory committee. He participated in many of the discursions when no school board members were present, and, on occasion, when the superintendent was not present. Not only

this, he entered into some rather lengthy discussions with me about the appropriateness of any plan for reorganization. The fact of the matter is that Mr. McIntyre indicated to me his preference for a two high school plan that would racially balance two cleventh and twelfth grade schools. Naturally, Mr. McIntyre cat silent when the final discussion took place with regard to how we should use our high schools and organize our school district.

Mr. McIntyre states in his column, "We do have to accept a mixed system with at-large seats -- a system in which we will never be able to elect an at-large trustee until we consult over fifty percent of Lubbock's population." Once again, Mr. McIntyro chooses to omit the fact that this community has elected two minority trustees at-large prior to single-member districts. It is obvious that individuals, be they minority or non-minority, who have the broadbased support and respect in the community, can be elected to the school board.

As I mentioned in the beginning of this letter, our school district is not perfect. What Mr. McIntyre refuses to recognize is that we have made progress during the past several years. Of course, rather than give any school trustee, administrators, or teachers credit for this progress, we simply her that it is because of the government or the federal court. No one is ever given credit for any type of diligence or dedication in attempting to bring about fairness.

There is very little said about the district's multi-cultural efforts. We do not see much in your newspaper about school district efforts to employ and promote minority administrators. We do not see information that points out almost \$30 million of the \$58 million bond issue being spent in Districts 1 and 2. We do not see information about the number of grants written for schools in East Lubbock where we have large numbers of economically disadvantaged students. We do not see Information about the number of grants written for schools in East Lubbock where we have large numbers of economically disadvantaged students. We do not see information about the amount of technology placed in Estacado High School, Alderson Junior High School, and Iles and Wheatley Elementary Schools. We do not see anything about the district's efforth to sensitize its staff to the needs of minority children through staff development programs.

All educators in Lubbock see in your newspaper is that the USD is biased and no good. Mr. Mointyre blames all the problems of LISD on white school trustees. During my tenure, these trustees have never voted against one recommendation that involved more money for economically disadvantaged students, more money for schools in minority districts; minority individuals recommended for administrative positions; minority individuals recommended for employment: grants, programs, or magnet opportunities for minority students; trips for minority students to colleges and universities across the south; extra buses for students to attend Estucado High School playoff games; extra expenditures for any program promoting multi-cultural awareness; or any other worthwhile program.

Some of these same board members have worked with groups such as the Black Entrepreneurs, paid dues to belong to other minority organizations worked with COMA, supported projects and programs by these minority organizations, and have sought to have a sense of fair play for all students, in return the designation they receive from your newspaper is "white guys."

Perhaps we cannot exist in Lubbook unless there is an issue. Ferhaps there must always be something divisive. Perhaps there must always be someone like McIntyre who has nothing to do but find a band of followers, not interested in the facts, but only interexting (sic) in perpetuating some type of hatred and ill-failing. You may treat Mr. McIntyre as though he knows a great dealt, but Mr. McIntyre does not know me nor the "white guys." He may never know what is in the heart of any of these individuals, but he is certainly being given the opportunity to damage that feeling by your newspaper.


