

ALBANIA TO BECOME PART OF ITALIAN EMPIRE

US. Voices Its Condemnation Of Invasion Some Washingtonians See Affair As Start Of Another Crisis

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—Amid mounting official fears that a new European crisis impends, the United States today condemned Italy's "forcible and violent invasion of Albania." In a pointed rebuke, Secretary of State Hull, with President Roosevelt's expressed approval, declared the fascist assault on little Albania "violates the will of all people in the world that their governments shall lead them, not toward war, but along the path of peace."

The latest American condemnation of aggression was issued against a background of reports that led some high officials to believe the Albanian development was but a prelude to a new general European crisis. Opinion in both the state and war departments was authoritatively represented as inclining to the view Germany was preparing to test with a threat at Danzig—possibly next week—the new "Sto Hitler" pact of Great Britain and Poland.

Officially there were no predictions. Hull told a press conference yesterday he had no official confirmation of reports of new German troop movements toward the Polish border, particularly Silesia. The rebuke to Italy was issued after the secretary of state conferred again by telephone with Mr. Roosevelt, who was preparing to conclude a Warm Springs, Ga., vacation and return to the capital. Hull, who appeared flushed and apparently aroused, told reporters the president agreed the statement should be published.

Without expressing a direct opinion whether Italy, in using force against Albania, had violated the 1928 Kellogg anti-war pact, Hull referred a question to the phrase "forcible and violent invasion." Both Italy and Albania signed or adhered to the treaty outlawing war as an instrument of national policy.

An informant said reports which had alarmed officials here were to the effect that Germany and Italy had decided definitely to "call" as "a monumental bluff" Britain's pledge to protect the independence of Poland.

BRITAIN AFTER Balkan Pacts LONDON, April 8 (AP)—The British government, alarmed by the swift Italian invasion of Albania, is pressing to get Rumania quickly into a European defensive alliance and also hopes to conclude secret agreements with smaller Balkan states, diplomatic informants said tonight.

Prime Minister Chamberlain abandoned a vacation in Scotland and will arrive in London tomorrow. Ten members of the cabinet met in emergency session with Chamberlain participating by telephone from Aberdeen, after which a statement was issued that the Albanian situation was "still obscure in regard to a number of important factors." This was taken to mean no decision was reached to accede to opposition demands for the recall of parliament, which is in Easter recess until April 15.

POLAND INFORMED BERLIN, April 8 (AP)—Germany, through diplomatic channels, said by a press barrage, informed Poland today with the frankness on which totalitarian states pride themselves that the British-Polish defensive alliance is regarded as an unfriendly act toward the Nazi Reich.

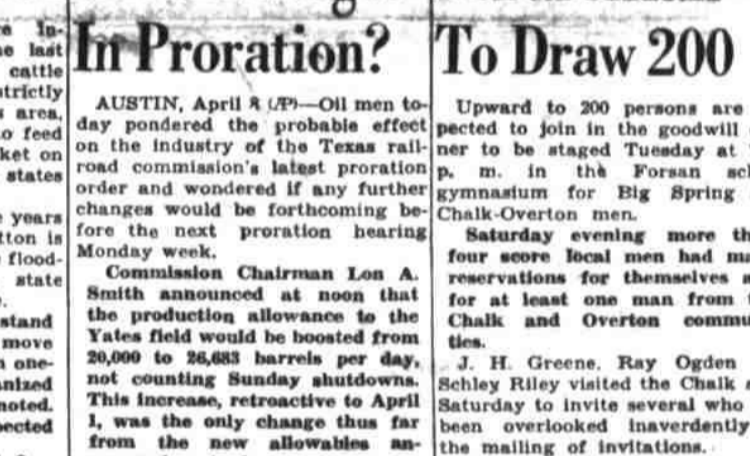
Bank Robbery Suspect Held; Linked In Kidnap, Killing

More Changes In Proration?

AUSTIN, April 8 (AP)—Oil men today pondered the probable effect on the industry of the Texas railroad commission's latest proration order and wondered if any further changes would be forthcoming before the next proration hearing Monday week. Commission Chairman Lon A. Smith announced at noon that the production allowance to the Yates field would be boosted from 20,000 to 26,683 barrels per day, not counting Sunday shutdowns. This increase, retroactive to April 1, was the only change thus far from the new allowances announced yesterday.

VICE-PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION BECOMES COVETED HONOR FOR '40

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—A situation tending to make the democratic vice-presidential nomination in 1940 a special prize is developing from the party struggle for control of the national convention machinery next year. At this admittedly premature stage, many veteran politicians find the three most probable democratic presidential nominees in 1940 to be obvious one-term contenders due to age or other circumstances. Should any of the three—President Roosevelt, Vice-President Garner, or Secretary Hull—be nominated, a "young" democrat picked to run with him could reasonably hope for succession as top of the ticket four years later.

Plane Crash Near Alpine Kills Pilot

Three Of Crew Bail Out, Bring In Word Of Storm Tragedy EL PASO, April 8 (AP)—Border patrolmen and ranchers packed into the rugged bad lands of the northern Big Bend country of West Texas today to reach the wreckage of a coast guard plane and the body of Lieut. Robert L. Grantham, killed when his ship crashed in a snowstorm Thursday south of Alpine.

Wreckage Located

The coast guard announced tonight the wreckage of the plane had been located from the air 13 miles southeast of Alpine, and that the plane burned. It added that ground parties had started from Alpine, but would not be able to bring out the body of Lieutenant Grantham until tomorrow. Three other members of the plane's crew, all enlisted men, escaped by taking to their parachutes. Grantham also bailed out, but his parachute failed.

ESTELLE DICKSON, YOUNG GUN GIRL, SURRENDERS

KANSAS CITY, April 8 (AP)—Unarmed and alone, Estelle Dickson, 16-year-old blonde sharpshooter, surrendered meekly to arrest today amid a bustling crowd of Easter shoppers in the heart of the business district. This ended the seven-month crime career of the nation's "public enemy couple No. 1." Her outlaw husband, Benny Dickson, died in a hall of federal agents' bullets at St. Louis Thursday night as he reached for one of his two pistols.

Teer Inspects Hospital Here

Claud Teer, chairman of the state board of control, was here Saturday for an inspection of the Big Spring state hospital. After making a tour of the buildings in the new \$817,000 institution and checking on the arrival of equipment, Teer expressed satisfaction with progress made to date. The delay in securing the emergency appropriation for equipment, he said, had resulted in late movements of supplies and materials to the hospital and might delay the tentative opening date of May 1. Dr. George T. McMahan, superintendent, accompanied Teer on a tour of the hospital plant and grounds. He conferred with the board of control chairman here during the day.

Teer recognized a drive by legislators to economize and said that emergency appropriations, along with those of other general fund items, were being pared to the bone. However, he was hopeful of securing funds for two new buildings at the Big Spring hospital during the biennium. "We were asked to shave off a million dollars—or one-seventh of the total—off the emergency appropriations," he explained. "Since the general fund is in such sad state (the deficit is now around 19 million) it means that we are just going to have to cut out a lot of things and get along as best we can in order to come a little nearer to living within the income."



For Easter Parade Fair Weather Forecast

"And if Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain. Yes, and we are found false witnesses of God; because we have testified of God that He raised up Christ, whom He raised not up, if so be that the dead rise not. For if the dead rise not, then is not Christ raised:" 1 Cor. 15: 14-15. With the resurrection of Jesus Christ the whole gospel stands or falls. If He is not risen, our preaching is vain, idle, empty—nothing to it. A dead Christ makes an empty gospel; a living Christ makes a full one.

GAIL, April 6—Eight 4-H club boys from Borden county exhibited and sold nine beef calves, eight lambs and one pig at the South Plains Junior Fat Stock show at Lubbock this week.

Weldon Street of the Mesquite community won first place in the beef cattle division with his group of three calves fed by one exhibitor and also won 12th place in the heavyweight division with an individual beef calf. It was Weldon's fourth consecutive trip to the Lubbock show, and while his beef calf projects have won some premiums in the lower brackets every year, this was his first time to show a top winning exhibit in the Lubbock show. Besides the 113 he received in premiums, his average of better than 11 cents on three calves made this his most profitable year in club work.

O. D. Jackson of Gail won first place and reserve grand champion in the fat lamb division and took first place in the group of five fat lambs fed by one exhibitor. He got \$10 in premiums and a sale price of 20 cents per pound for his 100 pound prize winning individual and nine cents per pound for his five lambs. This gave him one of the best money-making projects in the country this year.

Darrell Parker of route No. 1, O'Donnell, took 14th place and \$5 in premiums with a lightweight calf. The 12 1/2 cents a pound he received for his calf made this his first year, a successful one.

Interest among Borden county boys in 4-H club feeding projects has resulted in the largest enrollment on record during 1939. County Agent E. B. McElroy reported.

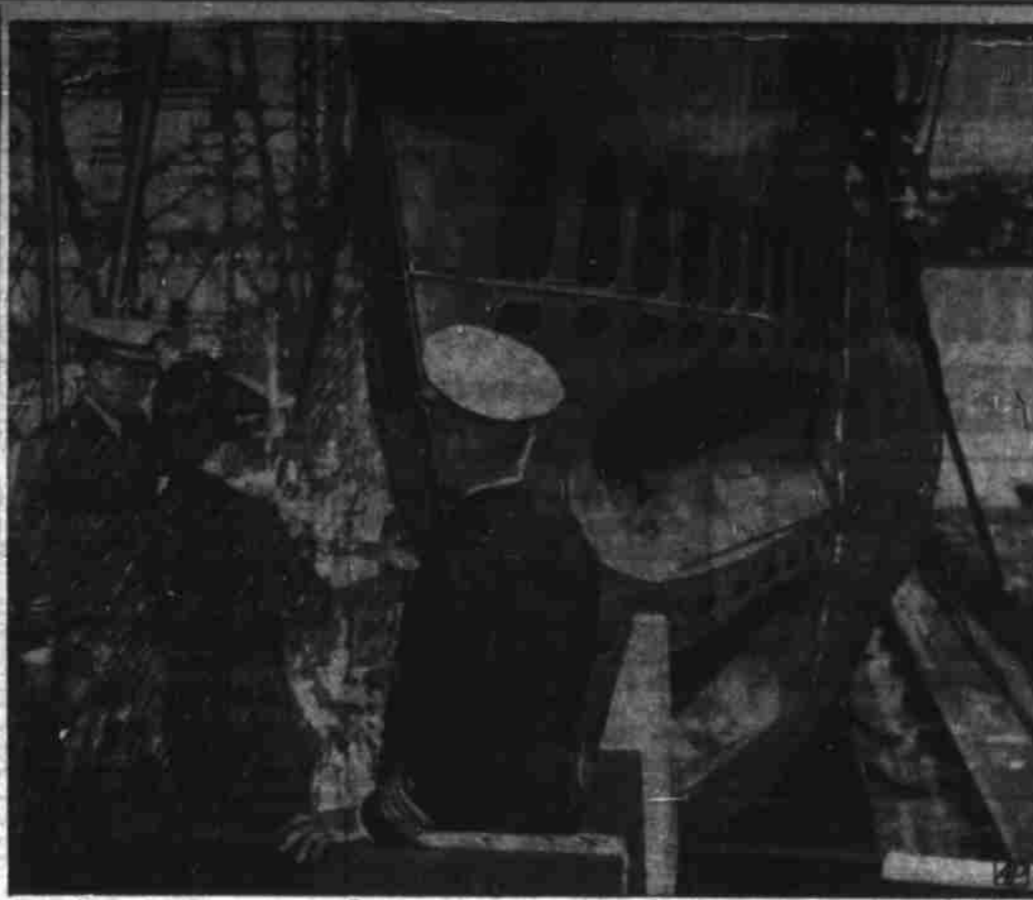

Aviation Mechanics To Be Trained In High Schools, While Pilots Are Instructed In Colleges

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—The administration is making arrangements to train thousands of aviation mechanics in high schools while pilots are being turned out in colleges to meet national defense needs.

Disclosing this today, informed officials said President Roosevelt was expected to put the program into effect this month. To carry it out, the administration proposes to give vastly augmented federal subsidies to specialized high school vocational education.

An inter-departmental committee turned to the high schools as a reservoir of future mechanics after modifying radically Mr. Roosevelt's original plan, announced last fall, to depend on the National Youth Administration.

The altered arrangement calls for mere "work experience" training by the NYA, supplemented by intensive schooling for some youths at the recently reopened naval ordnance plant at Charleston, W. Va., and the New Orleans navy yard, at Algiers, La.

Without discussing actual numbers, officials said several times as many mechanics as pilots must be provided, to meet the needs of expanding army and air forces, plane factories and air lines. Congress has approved a program for training 20,000 college fliers annually.

Already a shortage among the top 10 per cent of highly skilled workers has led to what aviation quarters termed "raids" on the personnel of various aircraft plants by other manufacturers.

By official estimates, the present 27,000 plane factory employees must be more than doubled in number to turn out the present and prospective American, British and French orders for military planes, and to meet commercial contracts.

For the present, the chief reliance will be on existing private schools for mechanics, and apprentice training systems of individual plants, officials indicated.

For the future, much is expected from intensified training in high schools.

Mrs. Gaskins had resided with her daughter in Odessa for a year. Prior to that, she had lived at Forsan. Survivors, besides the husband, include four daughters: Mrs. Harris, Mrs. Ray, Mrs. G. F. Parker of Meadow and Mrs. M. A. Tate of Goldsmith; one son, Charles T. Gaskins of Artesia, N. M.; 12 grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Conjecture On Freeze Loss

Extent of damage inflicted upon the fruit crop of Howard county by nine hours of freezing and sub-freezing temperatures here Friday remained a matter for conjecture here Saturday.

In the face of optimism resulting from the outward appearance of soundness of young peaches, plums, etc., County Agent O. P. Griffin warned that it would be Monday or Tuesday before the verdict would be written in accurate terms.

However, he added an encouraging note by observing that he had never seen a freeze that killed no more of the foliage than the Friday snap but what we managed to make some fruit.

By Monday or Tuesday, said the agent, the small fruit can be cut open and the answer determined. If the embryo seed is black, it's all off. If not, then fruit prospects will still be pretty good.

Old timers believed that if half the crop were spared, the net return would be about as much as with overloaded trees.

Trees and other vegetation were damaged, but not seriously. Scattered early feed crops over the county were not greatly impaired.

U. S. WHEAT YIELD TO BE SMALLER

CHICAGO, April 8 (AP)—The United States was the pace setter today among wheat producing nations in efforts to cut down the world's huge price-depressing grain surplus.

Surveys of this country's winter wheat belt showed that although favorable weather has revived farmers' hopes of harvesting good yields from their reduced acreage, domestic production would fall far short of the crops of the past two years.

This means, grain market experts here said, that American farmers cooperating in the government's wheat program are taking the initiative in efforts to control production.

Current prospects indicate a crop estimated at 524,000,000 to 550,000,000 bushels compared with last year's harvest of 687,000,000 bushels. Prospects have improved 40,000,000 to 65,000,000 bushels since last winter.

PIONEER LAWYER OF BROWNWOOD DIES

BROWNWOOD, April 8 (AP)—E. J. Harrell, 80, pioneer lawyer, died here today.

He had been a resident of Brownwood 50 years and was a former county judge. Funeral services will be held tomorrow. Six daughters and a son survive.

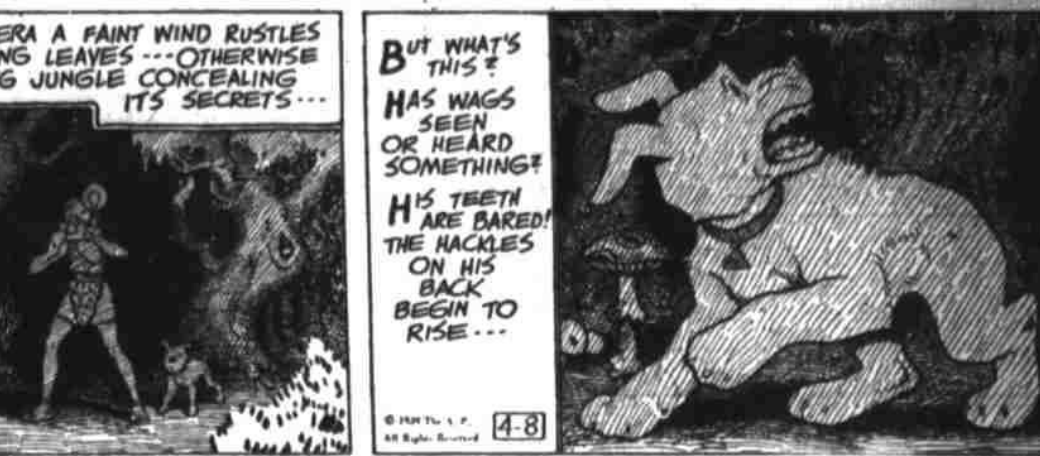

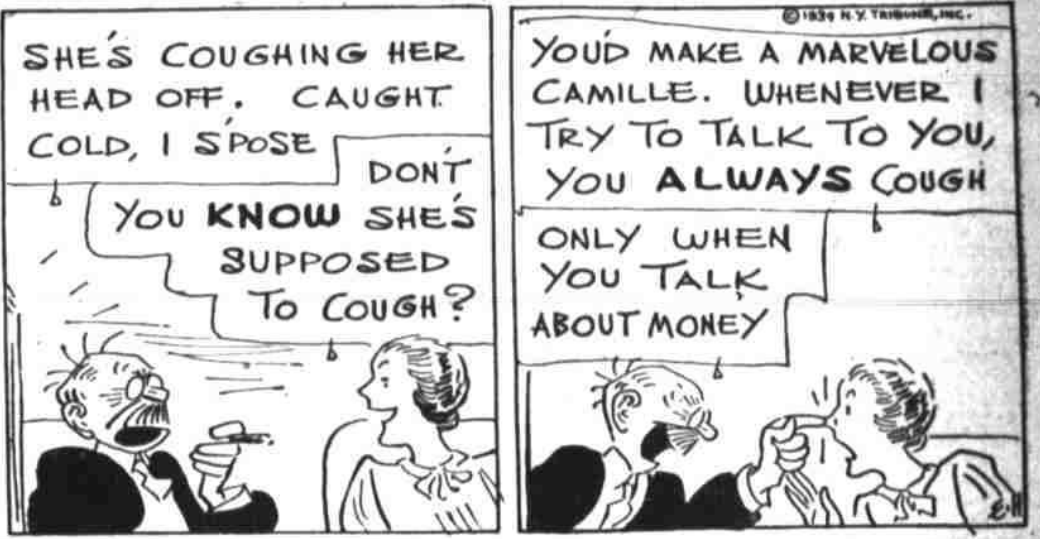
