"THE ISSUE IS NOT — TO TEST OR NOT TO TEST" Condition of Education Report Shows Need for Investment

Washington D.C. — "To test or not to test? That is NOT the question," declared NEA President Bob Chase responding to the release of the Dept. of Education's Condition of Education report released today. "Students are subject to an array of standardized and teacher developed tests each year. The key question is — 'How can standards and tests help students achieve, rather than hurt them?'"

In its "Testing Plus" (www.nea.org/testingplus) — NEA calls for smarter testing that also provides students and schools the tools they need to succeed. "Reform without resources simply won't produce results," said Chase. "Unfortunately the prevailing mindset among too many elected officials is something right out of the movie 'Field of Dreams': 'If we just set high standards, students will magically achieve.' This is delusional."

Chase said setting high standards and implementing a regime of testing and consequences is easy. "The hard part — the part we have seriously neglected — is giving every child the good schools and quality teachers and individual assistance he or she needs to have a fighting chance to succeed. The tax cut for the next year gobbles up 50 times more than what Congress and the President would provide the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. This is unconscionable. Where are efforts to reduce class size and to repair and modernize schools?"

"As educators we believe that unless we give students and teachers the tools to succeed — it is thoroughly, morally wrong to hold children to high standards and threaten them with failure," said Chase. "This is the message Sen. Jeffords delivered in making his courageous declaration of independence from party affiliation. We hope it is a message that will be heard and heeded on Capitol Hill."

For the first time in our history, we have set a truly challenging objective: successfully educating all children — rich and poor, smart and slow — to the same high standards. As a teacher, I embrace this revolution. It is a revolution that must be matched with adequate resources and investments to make a difference in the lives of every child," said Chase. For example, no money has been allocated for school repair and modernization, even though as the superintendent of Houston public schools, Sec. Paige supported a strong federal role for school repair funding. (The letter he signed in support of legislation follows this page.)

Teachers' group names 16 "Legislative Stars"

AUSTIN - The Texas Classroom Teachers Association has named 16 "legislative stars" and another eight lawmakers were given "special recognition" for their work on behalf of public education in Texas during the 77th session of the Texas Legislature.

TCTA is an independent professional association exclusively for Texas teachers and related non-administrative professionals. The Association was founded in 1927 and has more than 43,000 members.

"The 77th Texas Legislature made history by giving those employed in Texas public schools a state plan for health insurance," said Ann Fickel, TCTA Director of Legislation. The session also saw an increase in the Teacher Retirement System multiplier used to calculate monthly checks sent to retired teachers, a tightening of controls on charter schools and passage of school start-date legislation. "Issues such as these are invariably touched by many, but of the state's 31 senators and 150 representatives, some were shining examples in working for Texas teachers and students," Fickel said.

The 16 lawmakers named as "legislative stars" were those that TCTA felt had "gone the extra mile for teachers and school children," making extraordinary efforts on education issues while considering

the perspective of educators, Fickel said. TCTA also gave eight legislators "special recognition" for particularly noteworthy actions on behalf of public education in Texas. TCTA's "legislative stars" from the 77th session are Sen. David Cain (D-Dallas), Sen. John Carona (R-Dallas), Sen. Robert Duncan (R-Lubbock), Sen. Mario Gallegos (D-Galena Park), Sen. from the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith Let Wisdom be Your Guide

Sunday, August 12, 2001, a suicide bomber blew himself up on the patio of a restaurant near the northern Israeli coastal town of Haifa, killing himself and wounding up to 20, Israeli authorities reported. The bomber set off his explosives on the patio outside the restaurant, shredding an awning, overturning tables and chairs and leaving the patio covered of the Wall Street Cafe covered with blood.

A high school student was driving down the highway during a rainstorm. An oncoming driver swerved into his lane causing him to jerk the wheel violently to avoid a collision. He lost control of the car, spun round several times, plunged down an embankment and jammed the car between two huge trees. The car was wedged with such force between the trees that every window was broken out. The young man was wearing his seat belt and escape injury. He climbed out one of the broken windows, walked to the highway and flagged down a passing motorist to take him back into town.

The driver let the boy off to send a wrecker to extricate the car. As the driver of the wrecker was about to pull away, the boy pulled his car keys from his pocket. Wait! You will need these. I locked the doors when I got out. The young man had the knowledge to do the right thing. He had not the wisdom to discern that locking the doors was inappropriate.

There are times when things are right, yet inappropriate. A case in point is the locking of the doors, when leaving the wrecked

automobile or condemning the Palestinians without knowing the cause of or for the madness of their actions. There is a difference between wisdom and knowledge. Knowledge is knowing the right answer. Wisdom is knowing when to give the right answer.

One can be knowledgeable and use that knowledge in hurtful ways. You may know of someone who delights telling others the truth, especially if telling others causes them discomfort.

Have you known someone who have said to an obese person: "you're putting on a great deal of weight haven't you," in front of others? That may be a true statement, but it usually is not a wise one to make.

A wise person is one who has knowledge coupled with Christ-like character. Wisdom is not telling all you know. Knowledge couple with the Fruit of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control) is wisdom. Wisdom is a gift from God. James reminds us in chapter 3:5 that all we have to do is ask God for it.

Wisdom from God helps us make good decisions. All of us have faced problems in which we cannot come up with a perfect answer. God's wisdom helps in this. We cannot see into the future. We cannot see the entire picture. God can. God does. His wisdom helps us make informed, solid decisions.

Wisdom is a rare fruit. It is "first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality and without hypocrisy (James 3:17). It would do us well to seek wisdom.

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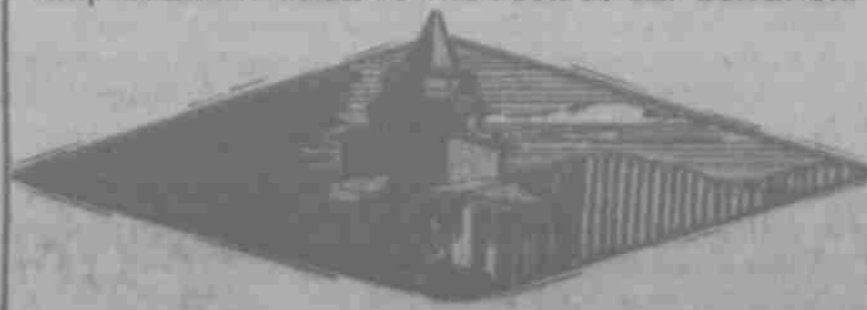


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OBITUARY CHRISTINE CARTER

Fiber Important Part of Healthy Diet for Men

LUBBOCK- For men, eating healthy isn't always the easiest thing to do, but adding vegetables to their diet can prevent dangers to their health.

According to the American Dietetic Association (ADA), four of the 10 leading causes of death and disease are directly associated with diet. The typical American male gets barely half the recommended amount of dietary fiber in his diet.

"We know that foods high in fiber can lower the risk of heart disease, cancer, diabetes and lower cholesterol," said Traci Keck, a dietician with Covenant Health System. Men who eat foods with enough fiber

are also less likely to suffer from constipation, hemorrhoids and diverticular disease. Eating saturated fat can lead to prostate cancer because digesting them can generate cancer-causing molecule. Certain antioxidants present in vegetables, such as lycopene, prevent the molecule from growing.

"Tomatoes are high in lycopene, which helps lower the risk of prostate cancer," Keck said. "It is better to cook the tomatoes so you can easily absorb lycopene into your system."

Soy products, which contain genistein, also have been proven to slow the growth of prostate cancer cells in lab

animals, according to the ADA.

Men, as well as women, daily need to include three servings of vegetables and two servings of fruits in their diet. By increasing fruit and vegetable intake, fiber intake will also increase.

As summer begins, take advantage of all the fresh summer produce. Add a few vegetables to the grill, and eat fruit for dessert.

"Adding vegetables to your pizza or adding lettuce and tomatoes to your hamburger are small steps to increase your fiber intake" Keck said. "If you need help to create a healthy diet, ask a registered dietician for help."

helpful hints to save you money this summer

Q: Will an automatic sprinkler help me save water?

A: Yes. A sprinkler system can be programmed to turn itself off and on. You still need to visually observe your lawn to ensure that you have no broken heads, the sprinklers are set so the water goes on your yard not the street or sidewalk and most important that the correct amount of water is being applied over the time allotted on the sprinkler timer.

Q: How often should I fertilize?

A: About twice a year for root stimulation, but be sure not to over-fertilize. Grass with a good root system makes better use of less and is more drought-tolerant.

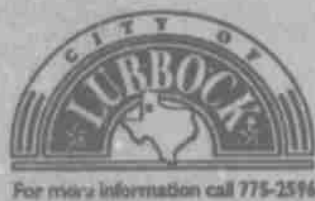
Q: How do I know how much water to apply on my particular kind of grass?

A: This applies during the growing season. See chart below.

Type of Grass	Watering Frequency
Buffalo Grass	Every 2 weeks
Tex-curf-10	Every 7-10 days
Bermuda	Every 4-6 days
Fescue	Every 4 days

In the winter, all the above grasses go dormant and do not need to be watered except Fescue which needs to be watered approximately once every 2 weeks.

Note: Newly planted lawns do require more water initially.



Scientists Report New Findings on the Connection Between Diabetes and Heart Disease and Stroke

Philadelphia, PA - Research findings released today at the American Diabetes Association (ADA) annual meeting shed new light on the connection between diabetes and cardiovascular disease. The latest report from the NIH sponsored Epidemiology of Diabetes Interventions and Complications study (EDIC) demonstrates that high blood glucose levels play a role in the development of atherosclerosis (hardening of the arteries), putting people with diabetes at increased risk for heart disease and stroke.

"Heart attacks and stroke are the major killers of people with diabetes. After following patients with type 1 diabetes for more than 12 years, we can conclude that patients who control their blood glucose significantly lower their risk for worsening atherosclerosis," says David M. Nathan, M.D., co-chairman of the EDIC study and an investigator at Harvard Medical School.

In response to mounting scientific evidence on the connection between diabetes and cardiovascular disease, the National Diabetes Education Program (NDEP) today launched a new campaign to make people with diabetes aware of their high risk for heart disease and stroke and to tell them how they can take steps to lower that risk. The Be Smart About Your Heart: Control

the ABCs of Diabetes campaign is a coordinated national response to this critical public health problem, involving over 200 partner organizations.

"If you have diabetes, you have the same high risk of having a heart attack as someone who has already had their first attack," said Dr. Charles Clark, National Diabetes Education Program Chair. "Even worse, your chances of dying from your first heart attack are the same as someone without diabetes who has had a second heart attack."

Management of three critical indicators is essential for reducing risk of heart attacks and strokes in people with diabetes: blood glucose (often called blood sugar), blood pressure, and blood lipids, including cholesterol and triglyceride. The Be Smart About Your Heart campaign tells people with diabetes to Control the ABCs of Diabetes:

- A is for the A1C test to measure blood glucose;
- B is for blood pressure; and
- C is for cholesterol.

"We want people to ask their health care providers three important questions about the ABCs of diabetes," said Dr. Judith Fradkin, NDEP Executive Committee member and Director of the Division of Diabetes, Endocrinology, and Metabolic Diseases at the National Institutes of Health. "1) What are my A1C, blood pressure, and

cholesterol numbers? 2) What are my treatment goals? 3) What do I need to do to reach my goals?"

"We have come to learn that the devastating effects of cardiovascular disease do not have to happen to people with diabetes," said Dr. Frank Vinicor, NDEP Executive Committee member and Director of the Division of Diabetes Translation of the CDC. "Managing the ABCs can make a real difference in the lives of people with diabetes."

The Be Smart About Your Heart campaign will include mass media messages, educational materials for consumers, and clinical practice tools for health care providers that support and complement the efforts of the American Diabetes Association, the American Heart Association, the American College of Physicians and other groups.

The National Diabetes Education Program (NDEP), a joint initiative of the National Institutes of Health and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, has worked for well over a year with its 200 partner organizations in this effort.

Lubbock is a home rule city governed by Article XI, section 5 of the Texas Constitution. Since Lubbock elects six of its council members from single member districts, the 14th Amendment to the United States Constitution requires under the principle of "one-person one-vote" that all the districts have essentially the same number of people. Also, Texas and its political subdivisions are jurisdictions covered by the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and as subsequently amended. Under Section 5 of the Act, the Attorney General of the United States must preclear all voting changes before they may be implemented. The Attorney General must determine that all voting changes made by the city do not have a discriminatory purpose or effect upon the rights of minorities to vote. The Attorney General's regulations strongly encourage community input into the process. Therefore, a public hearing will be held for the purpose of securing community comment upon the proposed redistricting plan. The date, time and location of the public hearings are as follows:

KNOW YOUR CITY GOVERNMENT

(This is a series of stories which will give the citizens a close look at their city government, namely: its origin, function, every department, and other important matters. This information was supplied by the Texas Municipal League (TML) Tony Privitt, Director of Communication and Legislation.)

(EDITOR'S NOTE: We began this series by defining home-rule state and the city manager form of government. The mayor and city council functions and responsibilities, and all of the city departments heads. Now this series gives the departments and their functions so you may be advised more of what is going on in city government.

Food Safety at Temporary Events part 1

14 Steps to Safe and Sanitary Food Service Events

Church suppers, street fairs, civic celebrations and other similar events call for food service outlets to be set up out of doors or in locations where keeping foods safe and sanitary becomes a real challenge. This 14-step guide will help you keep your temporary event free of the risk of food poisoning.

1. Permits. Check with your local government agency about permits and code requirements. Be prepared to tell the department where you will hold the event, what you plan to serve, where the food will come from, how you will prepare and transport it, and the precautions you will take to prevent contamination.

In the event of a food borne illness, it will help if you can show you ran your event "by the book."

2 Booth. Design your booth with food safety in mind. The ideal booth will have an overhead covering, be entirely enclosed except for the serving window and have only one door or flap for entry. Clear plastic or light colored screening on sidewalls will aid invisibility. Only food workers may be permitted inside the food preparation area; animals must be excluded.

The more your food is exposed to outsiders, the greater the likelihood of contamination.

3 Menu. Keep your menu simple, and keep potentially hazardous foods (meats, eggs, dairy products, potato salad, cut fruits, and vegetables, etc.) to a minimum. Avoid using pre-cooked foods for leftovers. Cook to order, to avoid the potential for sources, avoiding foods that have been prepared at home.

Complete control over your food, from source to service, is the key to safe, sanitary food service.

4 Cooking Use a food thermometer to check on cooking and cold holding temperatures of potentially hazardous foods. Hamburgers and other ground beef should be cooked at 155° F or until juices run clear poultry parts, to 165°; pork KEEP and other meats to 145°. °FT

Most illnesses from THE temporary events can be DANGER traced back to lapses in ZONE temperature control.

5 Reheating. Heat foods to above 165°F within 30 minutes. Do not attempt to heat foods in crockpots, steam tables, or other hot holding devices, or over sterno.

Slow cooking mechanisms may activate bacteria and never reach killing temperatures.

6 Cooling and Cold Storage. Foods that require refrigeration must be cooled to 40°F as quickly as possible and held at the temperatures until ready to serve. To cool foods down quickly, use an ice water bath (60% ice to 40% water). Stirring the product frequently, or place the food in shallow pans no more than 4 inches deep and refrigerate. Pans should not be stored one atop the other and lids should be off or ajar until the food is completely cooled. Check the temperature periodically to see if the food is cooling properly.

Allowing hazardous foods to remain unrefrigerated for too long has been the cause of many episodes of food poisoning.

7. Transportation. If food needs to be transported from one location to another, keep it well covered and provide adequate temperature controls. Use refrigerated trucks or insulated containers to keep foods hot (above 140°F and cold foods cold (below 40°F).

Neglecting transportation can undo all the good of your other measures to prevent contamination.

8 Hand washing. Provisions must be made for an adequate hand washing facility. In a pinch, a large urn full of water, a soap dispenser, a roll of paper towels and bucket to collect wastewater may do the trick.

The use of disposable gloves can provide an additional barrier contamination, but gloves are no substitute for hand washing. Frequent and thorough hand washing remains the first line of defense in preventing food borne illness.

9 Health & Hygiene. Only healthy workers should prepare and serve food. Any one who shows symptoms of a disease—cramps, nausea, fever, vomiting, diarrhea, jaundice, etc.—or who have open sores or infected cuts on the hands should not be allowed in the food booth. Workers should wear clean outer garments and should not smoke in the booth.

Ill or unclean personnel are the frequent cause of food borne diseases. Smoking, besides being unhealthy and aesthetically unappealing in food preparation, contributes to the contamination of workers' hands.
