God confirmed the message being prayed, sung, and proclaimed by His servants. As the two sang, and the prisoners listened with fascination, an earthquake rocked the area. The quake's force burst the doors of the cells off of their hinges and loosened the chains of the prisoners. The two evangelists could have run. Here was an opportunity for freedom! Instead, they remained in jail.

God honors the witness of those who by His grace rise above circumstances and shape them for His glory. The gospel made inroads in Philippi because Paul and Silas did not allow circumstances to hinder their testimony.
