



Dear Friends,

I am writing to enlist your help for a very important event. United Supermarkets has partnered with UMC, the National Marrow Donor Program, United Blood Services, and others to raise awareness of and boost local participation in the worldwide need to recruit and register potential bone marrow donors. There are currently local individuals needing a bone marrow transplant in order to live; and, at any given time, there are 3,000 people in the U.S. waiting for a perfect match to be found. When an individual needs a marrow transplant, it is typically his (her) last option for survival. If he is unable to find a perfect match in his immediate family (only three in ten do find a family match), he then has to look for an unrelated match. For every person that can be added to the national registry, there is one more chance that a person in crisis will receive a miraculous gift of life. For most individuals who find a match, it is very common to find only one match. So, every person registered may be the only chance another human being has to live.

The process for donating bone marrow is very safe and involves at most a few days of soreness in the lower back area. Within a few weeks, the body's bOone marrow completely replenishes itself in short, the costs to the donor are insignificant when

compared to the potential payoff-saving the life of another individual. On May 18th, we kicked off the area-wide program with a luncheon honoring a Lubbock woman whose gift of bone marrow saved the life of a six-year-old boy in Houston. At that luncheon, we enlisted the help of the media in an effort to spread our important message. At the same time, we asked for the help of local foundations and several businesses in order to raise money to offset the \$80 per person cost of registration for any Caucasian donors. Because so few non-Caucasians are on the national registry, all African-Americans, Hispanics, Asians, and other ethnic minorities who register do so at absolutely no cost to the individual.

There are currently approximately 5,100 people in Lubbock County on the registry; our goal will be to add 1,000 to that number this year. If half of those registering are Caucasian, we will need to raise a minimum of \$40,000 to reach that

On Friday and Saturday, June 15th and 16th, we will be conducting a major donor registry drive at the Southwest. Cancer Center. The drive does not collect bone marrow, only a small vial of blood. Participating in the drive does not mean you will donate bone marrow someday, but it puts your blood makeup on the national registry. One thing is for certain: if you are not registered, you will not be able to save the life of a person needing help . . . even if you do have the perfect match they

Unfortunately, without people to spread the message about our effort, the irapact will be minimal. What I ask of you

1) Be at the drive on June 15-16 and join with United in supporting this important cause by registering to be a bone marrow donor.

2) Tell the people in your family, your workplace, your church, and your peer group about the importance and relative ease of bone mar row donor registration.

Q: How often does my lawn need to be watered? A: Approximately every 4 to 6 days. Established lawns need to be watered deeply and infrequently. Deeply means by applying I" to I 1/2" of water to the lawn. The water will soak down 4 to 6 inches in depth.

Q: How long should I leave the sprinklers running? A: A good rule to follow is to use an empty tuna or cat food can. Place the can about six inches from the base of the sprinkler. When the can fills with water you have applied the recommended I" to 1 1/2" of water to your lawn.


Q: When is the best time to water my lawn? A: Early morning or late evening. Watering during these times ensures that all the water used for watering actually reaches the ground and does not evaporate. Never water during the heat of the day.

The day was Sunday, May 20, 2001. The place was South Bend, Indiana at the University of Notre Dame. The speaker for the commencement address was George W. Bush, the president of the United States of America. The president was

flanked by the Rev. Edward A Malloy, president of me University of Notre Dame, and Patrick F. McCartan, chairman of the university's board of trustees. The mood of the speech transcended self to the servant-hood of helping those less fortune.

The media pointed out that Mr. Bush leaning on facts more sweeping than he typically uses, said government did the right thing in the 1090's by expanding services to the poor Americans and the right thing in the 1990's by putting limits on such assistance. Now, he said, it was time for government to act as a catalyst for the private sector-o encourages individuals and groups, including religious ones, to address the needs of those who are struggling. Mr. Bush said "There is no great society which is no a caring society.

Mr. Bush expanded his speech by saying that he was expanding spending in some critical areas and pursuing measures, like allowing taxpayers who do not itemize their returns to-deduct charitable contributions, that would prompt more private help for the poor.

He pulled all of what he said together by saying that government"mug be active enough to fund services for the poor and humble enough to let good people in local communities provided those services."

A defender of the poor is someone who is concerned about justicestanding up against laws and attitudes that oppress the poor. This uppopular easily misunderstood role teaches us what it means to be a servant, one who shows respect for the poor by serving without pride.

God has always valued the poor in a way our world does not. The poor God chose to use in history were slaves in Egypt. When God became human, He came as a poor Galilean with no influence. Christ identified so closely with the hungry, thirsty, naked, and estranged that He said that to mistreat them was to mistreat Him. History reveals that the early church was not populated with the cream of the crop of society, so to speak. The early church did not even have political power influential people among its soci-

We must remember that God also uses rich people. Moses lived in the luxury of Pharaoh's court for forty years. Paul and Luke were well-educated. However, God also seems to delight in using the underdog, the unexpected person, those who would be called the stress of society. In using these persons His power is made visible through their weakness.

The temptations for the rich are great: temptations to become proud, to trust in what is untrustworthy and uncertain, etc. Political parties give special privileges to generous givers, but this cannot happen in the community of faith. Money can never be a bargaining chip or a way to gain status or leadership in the church. In the church, leadership and respect are given to those who honor and obey the royal law of love; to love their neighbors as themselves. Remember that God is a defender of the poor.




