### CHICAGO ALDERMEN PREFER BRAIN MACHINE TO CLEANING CITY HALL

CHICAGO, Sept. 5 (AP)—Alderman James B. Bowler asked members of the city council's finance committee to consider a request from the Municipal Court's Psychiatric Institute for \$2,300.

"They want to buy a—en—enceph—no, it's an electro—" began Alderman Duffy, who was interrupted by Alderman Gillespie, who suggested: "Electric fan, maybe—to fan-brows?"

"No, they want this thing here," Bowler replied displaying a paper with the word "electro-encephalograph."

"Somebody look in the dictionary," urged Alderman Merryman, but Alderman Orlikowski said the big word book offered no help. "Even Webster doesn't know what it is."

"Well, they want it anyway," said Bowler. "It does something about brains."

"And, sure we could use that around here," rejoined Duffy, ignoring Gillespie's query, "on what?"

Bowler then explained the \$2,300 would have to be taken from the fund set aside to clean the exterior of the City Hall.

"Let's buy it for them," Duffy recommended. "The inside of the City Hall needs cleaning a lot more than the outside."

Bowler closed the discussion by saying the motion had carried. "that we are going to buy an electro-encephalograph. Don't bother to have the minutes show what it is."

(An institute spokesman explained the electro-encephalograph is a machine to record human brain waves and thus disclose abnormalities.)

### Ragen's Death Investigated

CHICAGO, Sept. 5 (AP)—A coroner's jury was summoned today for an inquest into the death of James M. Ragen, head of a nation wide racing news service, as his widow protested against the proposed exhumation of Ragen's body for further examination.

Coroner A. L. Brodie has received a court order for removal of Ragen's body from its cemetery crypt for further examination to determine whether his death was due to complications from gunshot wounds or to poisoning.

State's Attorney William J. Tuohy said that despite Mrs. Ragen's objection to having her husband's body removed for a new autopsy, Brodie has the legal authority to act and "it is his business to carry out the court order."

Brodie said he planned another conference with Mrs. Ragen after the inquest and again would ask her permission for a second autopsy.

The coroner said Mrs. Ragen told him she believed her husband, who was 66, died of uremia, although coroner's toxicologists have reported finding enough mercury in Ragen's body to kill three persons.

He died on Aug. 14, seven weeks after he had been shot in a gangland ambush. He blamed hoodlums in the old Capone gambling syndicate for the attack on his life and said they had tried to gain control of his racing news service.

### "Virile Nation" Can Withstand Atombomb, Blandy Believes

BOSTON, Sept. 5 (AP)—Vice-Admiral W. H. P. Blandy, commander of the Bikini atomic bomb test, said today that he believed a "virile nation" might endure atomic warfare for months and even years after its cities had been destroyed.

He said in an interview upon arrival here to address today's session of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, that he did not "subscribe to the theory that a proud people would give in even if its cities were lost, so long as it had the means of resisting."

"I cannot believe," he added, "that it would surrender while its fighting forces were intact—its armies, fleet, its bombs, its launching platforms. Japan lost her means of resistance before the atomic bombs dropped."

## Army Fashion Shows Will Decide What GI's And Wacs Are To Wear

WASHINGTON, (UP)—The Army has decided that there's nothing about a uniform that a fashion show won't fix.

Army Quartermaster Corps teams are touring principal posts in the US and overseas to get GI opinions on designs for a new winter dress uniform. The QMC has made up seven different versions of the dress "blues." As a result of agitation over the so-called ciste system, the "blues" are to be issued to enlisted as well as officer personnel for dress and off-duty wear.

Oldtimers may shake their heads and sigh, but the army wants to determine "what the people who have to wear the uniform really want."

Long-legged and shaven models, picked from the QMC ranks, parade the new designs before a GI audience while a commentator points out the distinguishing features. Each member of the audience is supplied with a six-page questionnaire, which asks his preference on everything from dress uniform or no-dress uniform to elastic tops in his socks or garters.

Then the accompanying public opinion experts get to work on the questionnaires. At the end of the tour the designers will work out two preferred uniforms. Two teams will wear these at parties and public gatherings to get more public opinion. And out of all this will emerge the costume that Mr. GI will wear dancing.

The army's problem centers mainly around color combinations. The cut of the uniform already has been determined. The old small-at-the-waist and full-around-the-hips tunic is outdated. The new look for men, one of the commentators said, and consequently the new cut, is the Y-shape—V as in Van Johnson.

The uniform will be blue, an old army tradition. But the soldier audiences will have to decide which of four shades of blue serge will go best with their eyes. One of the four is dangerously close to powder blue.

Then there's the matter of trimming. The QMC offered a choice of yellow, gold, orange, ecru and red. But does a man want his accessories—epaulets, chevrons, buttons and belt—to match? Does he want stripes down his trouser legs for that longer look? Will a double band-around his garrison-cap make all eyes turn his way? ### Conservatives Meet To Urge Harmony

FORT WORTH, Sept. 5 (AP)—A dozen or more "conservative Democratic leaders of Texas" today awaited the opening of the state Democratic convention next Tuesday in San Antonio after holding a four-hour meeting here yesterday.

Except for an 88-word statement issued by B. A. Stufflebeme of Grand Prairie, most of the conservative group were silent following the meeting.

Some of those in attendance, however, denied, off the record, that convention strategy had been planned.

The statement issued by the group is as follows:

"Mr. B. A. Stufflebeme of Grand Prairie, a conservative leader, announced today that he met with a number of other conservative Democratic leaders of Texas at Fort Worth to see what could be done to promote harmony in the Democratic party in Texas, and in the coming state Democratic convention at San Antonio. He stated that there was some surprise at the convention program recently announced but that contrary to press reports, he found no disposition for any organized opposition to the governor-elect's convention program."

### No Snake Handling Allowed At Funeral Of Bitten Cultist

NEWPORT, Tenn., Sept. 5 (AP)—Hobart Wilford, who died Monday from the bite of a rattlesnake during religious ceremonies, was buried without snake handling rites—near here yesterday.

Wilford, 46, of Newport, was struck by a rattler during funeral services in Cleveland, Tenn., for Walter H. Henry, his brother-in-law.

Wilford's death was the third in Cleveland within ten days during services of the snake-handling sect. Henry, 54, was bitten by a snake Aug. 25 and died last Saturday. Eighteen-year-old Harry Skelton was bitten Aug. 17 and died Aug. 25.

Director Don C. Holder of the Holder Funeral Home in announcing services for Wilford said that "we agreed to take charge of the funeral on the promise that no snake handling ceremonies would be held during the services."

### Governors Of Texas

# "Ma" Ferguson Was First--And Only Woman To Rule In Governor's Office

Editors Note — This is the 27th in a series of articles based on the lives of governors of Texas.

By PAUL BOTTON

The genesis of an idea which resulted in Texas' first woman governor — and, to date, Texas' only woman governor — is one of those subjects over which future historians may fight. One version is that James E. Ferguson, barred from running himself "thought up" while sitting on a "baggage truck in Lometa, between speaking engagements in 1924.

Mrs. Ouida Nalle, daughter of the famed Fergusons, has written a book about her family, scheduled for publication this August; and she never heard of the story.

"The first I knew about it," she recalls, "was when we were waiting for a court decision on whether Daddy's name was going to be on the ticket. I got the decision in the afternoon, and Daddy was speaking at Taylor. I rushed over to Taylor to tell him about it.

"He was in a hotel room — he'd just finished his speech — and as always, had sweat through his shirt. I told him about the decision and said, 'What are you going to do now?' 'He looked up at me and said, very calmly, 'Your mother can run.' That was the first I knew about it. Where he got the idea, I don't know, but he'd already filed her name."

In any event Mrs. Ferguson ran and won; she ran again in 1926 and lost; she ran again in 1930 and was defeated; she ran again in 1932 and beat Ross Shaw Sterling; she ran again in 1940 — and that defeat marked the end of the Ferguson regime. The woman known to a full generation of vol-

unteers — affectionately and otherwise — as "Ma Ferguson" got about one-tenth of the votes cast.

"Two governors for the price of one" was the slogan heard in Texas during Mrs. Ferguson's first term. If not the first woman governor in the United States, she was by far the most publicized. Reports flocked to Austin and Temple from all over the nation to "write up" this sensational development in the already-sensational regime of the Fergusons. It was the apex of the era which came to be known as Fergusonism.

Again, the Ferguson administration is close, the "pro" and "anti" feeling too intense, for any true evaluation of their place in politics (and you do talk about the Fergusons, rather than about either of them as individuals), is hitherto.

"During Mrs. Ferguson's 1932 campaign, Jim made a summary of what Fergusonism meant and printed it in his once famed Ferguson Forum. From his viewpoint it meant:

The 9-34 hour law for women workers; the compulsory school law; the free textbook law; regulation of employment agencies; semi-monthly pay-days for workers; a child labor law; a workmen's compensation law. It also meant the first "rural aid" law — rural aid to schools unable to keep up scholastic standards with local tax revenues. It meant the creation of the State Highway Commission; the building of state hospitals; the founding of teachers' colleges at Commerce, Alpine, Kingsville, Nacogdoches. It meant the establishment of West Texas A&M College, now known as Texas Tech. To Ferguson, his regime meant the county library law, and the establishment of the crippled children's hospital.

To Ferguson, Fergusonism meant "a liberal pardon policy to deserving convicts and businesslike methods in 1917 left a million dollars in credit to the penitentiary board". It was this same policy which has led to much of

### GI's Granted Extended Duty When Discharged

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5 (AP)—The war department said today the army is making a practice now of granting furloughs to enlisted men when they report for discharge at separation centers.

The change was inaugurated on Sept. 1, the department said, to comply with the new GI terminal leave pay bill which provided up to a maximum of 60 days accumulated furlough at the expiration of enlistments. This is similar to terminal leave which previously had been granted only to officers.

Under the new system, a department official explained to a reporter, an enlisted man is given the opportunity to volunteer for extended active duty when he reports to a separation station. The length of extension corresponds to the number of days accrued leave which he has earned.

As soon as this is done, the GI is placed on furlough and permitted to go home. He draws full army pay during that time and may if he chooses, take a job. At the end of the period he is discharged.

The process of volunteering for extended duty is required, the official said, to conform with law stipulating that a soldier must be on active duty status to draw his pay.

DALLAS, Sept. 5 (AP)—Robert Roland Anderson explains it this way.

"Those boys," Anderson said pointedly, "got around. I stayed in Dallas."

## What "Free" Means In Soviet Zone Where "Free" Elections Ordered

**By JOSEPH ALSOP**

BERLIN — Marshal Sokolowski astute Soviet Commander in Germany, has ordered "Free Elections" this month in his zone. In order to understand the German situation as well as the nature of the Soviet system one must grasp just what the word "free" means as used by Marshal Sokolowski. There can be only one answer to that question, if the view from this deep-hole in the Iron Curtain is not deceptive. Americans (and Germans) should read the editorial in this issue of a "free election" is the plebiscite which confirmed Hitler in power after the Reichstag fire.

From the omnipresence of creeping political terror to a sort of Tammany system of passing out favors to the faithful, every method which the Nazis exploited so successfully is now being employed by the Soviets. As might be expected the whole system is squarely based on the one party principle.

The chosen instrument is the so-called Unity party. This is the result of the merger between Socialists and Communists bludgeoned through in the Soviet zone this spring by Sokolowski's predecessor, Marshal Zhukov. Terror and bribery were freely employed to secure the merger. Socialists who opposed it had a tendency to disappear without trace. Socialists who favored it conversely tended to blossom forth with large new villas, extra food rations and other special privileges.

The formation of the Unity party was, of course, nothing but an expedient to break the Socialists. It is precisely what has now happened. Since the merger former Socialist working within the unity party have been reduced to a minimum. In Land Saxony, for example, ninety percent of this party's posts are held by former Communists. Those Socialists who remain as leaders in the new party are spied upon in the familiar manner. Even Otto Grotewohl, sponsor of the merger and chief Socialist front man, is not permitted to make public appearances alone, receive visitors alone or move about as he chooses.

In the Soviet zone, Unity party membership is required of school teachers, business administrators, civil servants and others, in favored positions. Party membership cards in many localities are the only means of securing the full food ration as shown on the ration card. Independents are punished by positive harassment as well as by the denial of privileges and opportunities. By these familiar expedients the party has been forced into a powerful political implement.

No Socialist activities are permitted in the Soviet zone since the alleged "merger" but the Christian Democrats and Liberals have been licensed as opposition parties in order to preserve democratic appearances. How meaningless this pretense is can be judged by the evidence. As for the Liberal Party it is a small minority group, the leader of which in the Soviet zone, is well known to be an almost senile Soviet stooge.

The far more courageous Christian Democrats have refused to become stooges. They have there-

fore been confronted with insuperable difficulties, threatened with daily dangers and subjected to constant humiliations. The national leaders of the party were certainly have called on their followers to abstain from the ballot if such a step had not threatened the actual extinction of every individual Christian Democrat in the grip of the Soviets.

At the same time, the issue has been confused still further by stimulating such agencies as the "Free German Youth" (Soviet substitute for the Hitlerjugend) to put up candidates of their own.

Already it is known that all kinds of pressure are being used to insure a suitable result. The situation is the same in the Soviet sponsored referendum on nationalization of industry in Land Saxony in the Spring. In that referendum, even the churches were ordered to endorse Soviet policy. In that referendum there was no secrecy of the ballot except in isolated districts selected for exhibition to foreign observers. Elsewhere voting was done publicly under the eyes of NKVD agents on ballots so thin that the markings could not be concealed. And those who voted in an unlighted manner paid the natural price. Such is "freedom" in the Soviet zone.

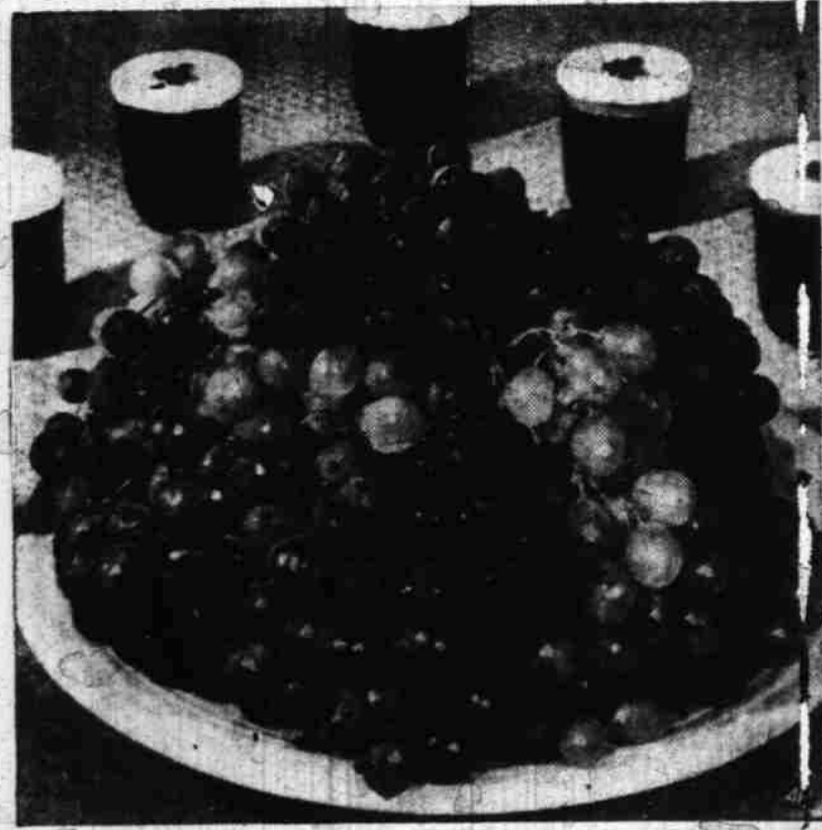

**Prepare For Christmas Now, During Jelly Time**



GRAPE JELLY... For hot biscuits next winter...

In this season of plentiful fruits it is to be hoped that each of us has managed to keep a reserve of her canning sugar to do up some of the wonderful jellies and jams which can be made from fall fruits such as grapes and plums.

Here are a few suggestions for preserves which will make beautiful Christmas presents later, and will gladden the hearts and palates of your family whenever they may eat them.

**Grape Jelly**  
 2 1-8 cups juice  
 3 1-2 cups sugar  
 1-4 cup bottled fruit pectin  
 To prepare the juice: Stem about 1 1/2 pounds of fully ripe grapes and crush thoroughly. (Concord grapes give best color and flavor.) Add 1-2 cup water; bring to a boil and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 2 1-8 cups juice into a large saucpan. (1-8 cup is 2 tablespoons.)

To make the jelly: Add sugar to juice in saucpan and mix well. Place over high heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Add bottled fruit pectin at once. (Scrape all pectin from the measuring cup.) Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1-2 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim, pour quickly into glasses. Paraffin at once. Makes about five six-ounce glasses.

**Plum Jelly**  
 1 3-4 cups juice  
 2 cups sugar  
 4 1-2 tablespoons (1-2 package) powdered fruit pectin  
 To prepare the juice: Crush

thoroughly about 1 1/2 pounds fully ripe plums. Do not peel or pit. Add 1-2 cup water; bring to a boil and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 1 3-4 cups juice into a large saucpan.

To make the jelly: Measure sugar and set aside. Place saucpan holding juice over light heat. Mix contents of pectin package thoroughly before measuring. Add the required amount of pectin and stir until mixture comes to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1-2 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim, pour quickly into glasses. Paraffin at once. Makes about 4 six-ounce glasses.

**Ripe Plum Jam**  
 4 cups prepared fruit  
 2 1-2 cups sugar  
 2 1-2 cups light corn syrup  
 1 box powdered fruit pectin  
 To prepare fruit: pit (do not peel) about 2 1-2 pounds fully ripe plums. Cut in small pieces and crush. Add 1-4 cup water; bring to a boil, and simmer, covered, 5 minutes. If desired 1-4 to 1 teaspoon each cinnamon, cloves and all spice may be added.

Measure sugar and syrup into dish and set aside until needed. Measure prepared fruit into 5- or 6-quart kettle, filling up last cup or fraction of cup with water if necessary.

Place over hottest fire. Add powdered fruit pectin, mix well, and continue stirring until mixture comes to a hard boil. At once pour in sugar and syrup, stirring constantly. (To reduce foaming, 1-4 teaspoon butter may be added.) Continue stirring, bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute. Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin hot jam at once. Makes about 11 six-ounce glasses.

 2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
 3 eggs, well beaten  
 1 tablespoon grated orange rind  
 1 cup orange juice  
 Raisin sauce

Scald milk. Add bread cubes, sugar, salt and butter. Mix lightly. Cool. Add eggs, orange rind and juice and blend. Turn into a well-greased 1 1/2 quart casserole. Set in a pan of hot water. Bake in a moderate oven (350-degree Fahrenheit) about 1 hour, or until pudding is done. Serve hot

or cold with Raisin Sauce. Makes 6 servings.

**Raisin Sauce**  
 1-2 cup seedless raisins  
 1-2 cups boiling water  
 1-2 cup sugar  
 1-8 teaspoon salt  
 1-4 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1 tablespoon cornstarch  
 2 teaspoons lemon juice  
 Add raisins to boiling water and let simmer 5 minutes. Mix together sugar, salt, cinnamon and cornstarch. Stir into hot raisins and cook about 10 minutes, or until thickened, stirring frequently. Remove from heat and stir in lemon juice. Serve with Orange Bread Pudding. Makes about 1 1/2 cups sauce.

### Simplified Coffee Cake Pleases Whole Family



Out of the jam jar comes this quick fruit topping for coffee cake for Sunday brunch or any festive morning meal. From the array of jams at the grocers, pick three favorites such as plum, cherry and peach. Mark off freshly-baked coffee cake into thirds and spread each third with a different jam. Then sprinkle the glistening top with a crumb mixture of flour, sugar and butter, and brown it under the broiler.

Here's a bright coffee cake to add sunshine to a Sunday breakfast, to team up with a fruit dessert at lunch or supper, or to pack in the lunch box. It's a fluffy baking-powder coffee cake frosted with jam or preserves, covered with a crumb mixture of flour, sugar, and butter, and then browned under the broiler. The jam or preserves is spread over the coffee cake right after it is baked. For variety, the coffee cake can be marked off into thirds, and each section spread with a different jam. Then, if Johnnie likes plum, Sue likes cherry and Jack likes peach coffee cake, each can have his choice.

#### Rainbow Coffee Cake

- 2 cups flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 6 tablespoons sugar
- 1-3 cup shortening, melted
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2-3 cup milk
- Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Combine shortening, egg and milk. Add to flour mixture and blend all ingredients together. Bake about 40 minutes at 400 degrees. Cover with Jam Crumb Topping.
- Jam Crumb Topping
- 3/4 cup jam
- 1-3 cup flour
- 4 tablespoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons butter
- Spread baked coffee cake with jam. Mix flour and sugar together. Cut in the butter until mixture resembles coarse grain. Sprinkle over jam. Brown under broiler.

Then why didn't he hire the overworked Mr. Grant? It's simple — Cary and his high-priced conferees weren't available. "Besides, we want to build stars for our company, California Pictures. We plan a large operation some day, soon as we can get the land, the talent and the money."

How then, to sell a picture and stars? "The best advertising is word-of-mouth," he said. "You have to get word of the picture to Mrs. Schultz in her kitchen before the film opens."

But how do you reach Mrs. Schultz in Fresno when the picture is playing in San Francisco—the press? "Yes. But mostly the long-distance telephone. How are the same stories told in New York and London the same day? Because of the telephone."

# MAYOR DABNEY PROCLAIMS THIS AS FAT SALVAGE MONTH IN CITY

## PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the world supply of fats and oils is far less than current needs, and,

Whereas, the imports of fats and oils for 1946 are anticipated at less than 902 million pounds compared to 1,200 million pounds pre-war, and,

Whereas, fats and oils are definitely needed abroad to prevent starvation and curtail widespread malnutrition, and,

Whereas, fats and oils of all kinds—used, edible and inedible—go to the nation's supply pool, now at an all-time low, and,

Whereas, fats and oils are vitally needed in the production of soap, electrical appliances, nylons, shoes, dress fabrics, new automobiles and in practically all other industrial fields, and,

Whereas, the US department of agriculture, which is sponsoring a fat salvage campaign, estimates that prior to the program 500 million pounds of used fats were poured down the drain yearly with a loss of 20 million dollars to US citizens.

Therefore, I, George W. Dabney, mayor of the City of Big Spring, do proclaim to the good people of Big Spring that the period Sept. 1—Sept. 30 be set aside as a special Big Spring Fat Salvage Month, and sincerely urge every housewife to have every possible drop of used fat and turn it into her butcher, and that the butcher accept it, and renderers make proper collection, and that all others cooperate in this vital program.

Big Spring housewives are being urged to redouble their efforts at fat salvage during the month of September.

Mayor George W. Dabney has proclaimed September as Fat Salvage Month, and food merchants and others are cooperating in collection of vitally needed fats and oils.

Combatting of shortages in soap and a variety of other industrial lines and the relief of starvation among 800,000,000 people in Europe and Asia are the objectives of the drive to "accelerate the collection of fats."

According to estimates, the average housewife washes six tons of dishes each year. It's a big job at best—and without soap or enough soap it would be well nigh impossible. Add to this the tonnage of clothing, etc., which must be washed regularly or at intervals and it becomes apparent how much soap is required for an individual household.

Already the pinch on soap is felt, and increase in fat salvage appears to be the only hope of relief for imports of fats and oils are down to less than half of the pre-war level.

Not only are fats and oils vital in soap production, but they also figure into the manufacture of table linens, draperies, floor coverings, automobiles, electrical appliances, and even nylons.

Had it not been for the fat salvage campaign in 1945, housewives would have had to get along in 14 per cent less soap last year. The need for salvage is even greater this year.

Sixteen tablespoons of fat make a pound—and one pound of salvage fats will make a box of laundry soap or five bars of toilet soap.

US department of agriculture experts urge housewives to use and reuse every possible bit of beef, pork and lamb fat until food value has been realized. When this is done, the remainder should be collected and turned into the family butcher. As precious as the material is, it should never be thrown away or allowed to go down the drain.

Collection of fryings, soup skimmings, residue from scraping pans, raw and cooking fats should be rendered and turned in. Every ounce helps, for ounces from hundreds of families will grow into pounds and even tons.

## ROOMS SO SCARCE, NO PRAYING SPACE

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Sept. 5. (AP)—The room shortage at the University of Illinois is so acute that eight Moslem students couldn't even find a place to pray in.

They recently completed a 30 day fast and daily prayer ceremony required during the Lunar month of Ramadan. But they unsuccessfully sought a room for a special secluded prayer ceremony in observance of the feast of Eid, ending the fasting period.

Their leader, Abdul Quayum of Lanore, India, gave up. He conducted the service outdoors, in an isolated glade near the university's rock garden.

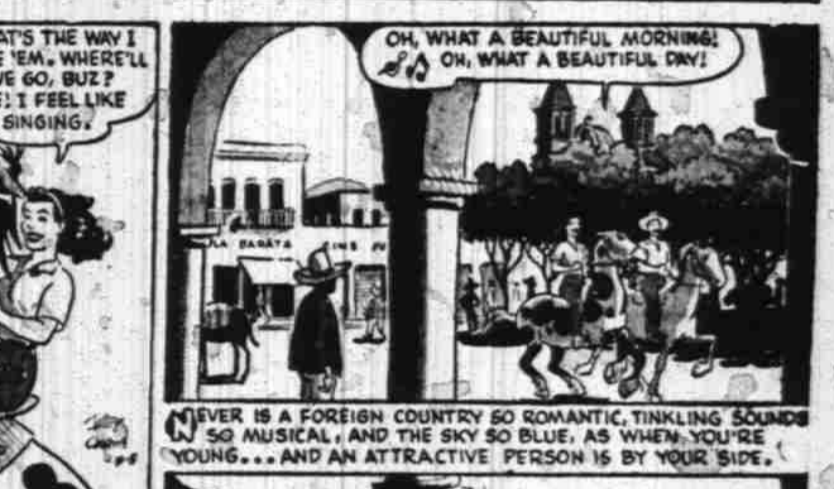
