"The new census data documents the continuing dramatic growth in the number, size, and distribution of Hispanic-and African American-owned businesses in the United States and underscores significant increases in minority purchasing power and in opportunities for business development," said Eddie N. Williams, president of the Joint Center. "We must note however, that this data reliects the state of these businesses in 1997 and cannot give a current picture of minority-owned businesses. Many sectors of our economy are measured annually, and even monthly, and the same must be done for minority-owned businesses if we are to get an accurate view of the entire U.S. economy."

MBFIT members have annual revenues in excess of 50 million dollars and employ between 80 and 4000 persons each in a wide range of industries, publishing, fransportation, telecommunications, manufacturing, energy, construction, and staffing






Nonagricultural employment grew by 33,200 jobs during the month.

The highest unemployment rate was 12.7 percent in McAllen-Edinburg-Mission, followed by 7.7 percent in Brownville-Harlingen, 7.4 percent in El Paso, 6.8 percent in Laredo and 6.6 percent in Beaumont-Port Arthur.

# from the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith

Upton Sinclair was born on September 20, 1878, in Baltimore, Maryland, His family had once belonged to the Southern aristocracy, but at Sinclair's birth they lived in

less opulent circumstances. Sinclair graduated from high school at an early age, and enrolled in the City College of New York at the age of fourteen. At the age of fifteen, he began writing to support himself and help pay his college expenses. During his college years, Sinclair encountered Socialist philosophy, and became an avid supporter of the political movement. It is said; the influence of Socialist thought is evident in Sinclair's writing throughout his life. Sinclair graduated from college and enrolled in Columbia University as a graduate student in 1897.

In 1906, Sinclair traveled to Chicago to do research on a sixth novel. The five precious works had not generated much money. He wanted to write a story about the poverty and misery of wage earners living in slums surrounding Chicago meatpacking factories. The goal of his novel was to build a case for Socialism by detailing the ills of capitalism.

The book published, "The Jungle" was a masterpiece-on the subject of unfairness. The setting is the packing plants connected to the Chicago stockyards around 1900. Sinclair's main character is an immigrant whose first name is Jurgis.

This immigrant and his relatives (with his bride-to-be) are optimistic for making it in America. They combine their saving

and earnings in order to purchase a house near the stockyards. Unknown to them, the owners keep repainting the same house after foreclosing on immigrants families. The newcomers are never properly informed about required home insurance and other added fees in the fine print. All of the family has to work at dirt wages to try to make ends meet.

In the packing plants, the immigrants are met with overwhelming injustices that force them to their eventual defeat. They witness rates being round right into the sausage along with other meat that should have been rejected. Sinclair's book was so powerful that its sales actually altered the meat eating habits of many Americans for a long time. What finally gets to the reader is page after page of example of gross unfairness in the way people are treated, as well as the realization that people have been treated this way for years without noticed by the rest

Sometimes unfairness goes on right before the eyes of the majority race in America, but they are blind to it. We cannot help but believe that the One who "love righteousness, and hated iniquity" would not have the people who He allows to direct the destiny (in a sense) of others to not be attuned to what is fair.

God demands that we deal justly with others. Fairness is a constant theme throughout the Bible. It is a characteristic of God, and it should be a characteristic of those who believe in

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
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
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# KNOW YOUR CITY GOVERNMENT by Eddie P. Richardson
