

A SLEEPING CHURCH IS NOT ONLY HELPLESS AND USE-LESS. BUT IS A POSITIVE HINDRANCE TO OTHERS. WE MUST AND WE CAN IDENTIFY A PROBLEM AND FACE THE PROB-LEM WITH CONFIDENCE AND ENTHUSIAMS. THEM THE SOLUTION IS ON THE WAY. A NUMBER OF YEARS AGO I HEARD A PHILOSOPHER SAY. YOU ARE WHERE YOU ARE BECAUSE THAT.S EXACTLY WHERE YOU WANT BE.

BUT I HAVE LEARNING TO UNDERSTAND THAT MANY OF US ARE WHERE WE ARE NOT BECAUSE WE WANTED TO. IT BECAUSE SOMEBODY HAD GIVEN THE WRONG DIREC-YOUR SUCCESS AND YOUR HAPPINE IAKI WILL YOU, WELL, MANY OF OUR CHURCHES HAVE PUTS FORTH THE I DON.T CARE ATTITUDE. SOME OF OUR CHURCHES HAVE THE ATTITUDE THAT I AM BETTER THAN YOU. I DON.T NEED YOU, WELL. WE NEED EACH OTHER. TOO MANY OF US ARE ON A MERRY-GO-ROUND. WE SPEND ALL OUT TIMES GOING WRONG IN CIRCLES AND GETTING OFF RIGHT WHERE WE GOT ON. AS A RESULT WE HAVE GOT ABSOLUTELY NOWHERE, UNTIL LAZY MINISTER AND MEMBERS BECOME COMMITTED TO CHRIST AND WORK FOR HIM. KNOW YOUR CITY GOVERNMENT by Eddie P. Richardson

(This is a series of stories which will give the citizens a close look at their city government, namely; its origin, function, every department, and other important matters. This information was supplied by the Texas Municipal League (TML) Tony Privitt, Director of Communication and J egislation.)

(EDITOR'S NOTE: We began this series by defining home-rule state and the city manager form of government. The mayor and city council functions and responsibilities, and all of the city departments heads. Micro-Enterprise Loan Program
