### **Citadel Graduates** Its First Black Women

Seven Black women have graduated from the Citadel for the first time in the institution's 157-year history.

They were among a class of 298 cadets that graduated last week from the state military college in Charleston, S.C.

"Coming into school, we weren't thinking about coming as African Americans. We were more concerned about being females." Natosha Mitchell told reporters.

The Citadel was forced to accept female cadets after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the all-male admissions policy at Virginia Military Institute was unconstitutional.

Shannon Faulkner was the first woman to attend the Citadel in 1995 under a judge's order. She later dropped out because of stress and isolation. Nancy Mae was the first female to graduate from the Citadel in 1999

## Maryland Halts Executions **Pending Study** by NNPA News Service

The state of Maryland has temporarily suspended all executions as it conducts a study whether there is racial bias in its use of the death penalty in capital cases. Nine of the 13 men in Maryland on death row are Black, and more often than not the victims were White. The nine men were all convicted in Baltimore County, a majority White suburb.

"Use of the death penalty ought not to be a lottery of geography," Gov. Paris Glendening said. "It is imperative that I as well as cur citizens have complete confidence that the legal process involved in capital cases is fair and impartial."

The execution of Wesley Baker, which was scheduled for this week, has been put on hold by Glendening. Baker, 44, was convicted for the murder of a White woman in 1991. Baker's attorneys have said that there is not enough evidence to prove that he fired the gun. His co-defendant was sentenced to life in prison.

Lt. Gov. Kathleen Kennedy Townsend, who will run for Governor after Glendening's final term is over, supports the death penalty in some circumstances, and had asked the governor to impose the sus-





#### STRENGTH FOR TODAY HOPE FOR TOMORROW

Question: As a Christian wife what should I do if my husband does not try to work out the difficulties in our marriage?

Anower: As in any case Christians have a responsibility to follow the teachings of Christ in all matters. Certainly, we have instruction from the Holy Spirit on this matter of the family

In first Peter 3:1-6 wives are instructed to be submissive to their husbands. Before I say anything else I balieve it is important to address this teaching about submission. The Bible does not teach submission requires one to be a doormat. Submission is actually a position of strength The one who submits makes a choice to align themselves under the will of another. It is also important to note that Peter says that the husband must also submit to the wife (1 Peter 3:7). "Likewise you husbands..." refers to the husband submitting as the wife submits in 3:1, as the servants submit in 2:18, as the citizen submits in 2:13. The wife is to submit to the husband's authority (which he receives from God). And the husband is to submit to the wife's needs-physical, emotional, and spiritual. This teaching is found in Ephesians 5:21-33. I hasten to add that the husband submits first.

Wives as you submit to the husband he will have the opportunity to observe your behavior. Without a word your behavior has a greater

ability to win him over Then he can become the kind of husband to you that Christ is to the church (see Ephesians 5:25). Notice that Perer says that it is the behavior of the wife that will win her husband over and not her preaching or hinting or angging or turning the preacher loose on the old rescal. The obedient life she lives before Jesus is far more powerful than any of these methods. I guess you could say that he would rather see a sermon than hear one

Now there is no guarantee that the husband will obey God's word and be the right kind of nusband. He still has the choice to become that kind of man or not. But you will come closer to reaching your husband by controlling your actions rather than trying to control his If your husband chooses to remain the same your choice is to remain obedient to Christ This is why it is so important that individuals make the right choice in a mate before getting married. I have learned that serious character flaws in spouses didn't just occur all of a sudden. They have always been there. The spouse chooses to ignore these flaws or believe that they can change their mate.

## Walk Across Texas results

The 2002 Walk Across Texas Celebration Awards Event was held Saturday: May 18, 2002 at Christ the King Cathedral School Gym. This event is sponsored by the Family and Consumer Sciences Advisory Board of Lubbock County Extension Office in response to the State goal for Health and Wellness and the Lubbock County Texas Community Futures Forum goal for improving the health and well being of Lubbock County residents.

Teams of 4 to 8 people pooled their miles to walk, bike, run, swim or dance their way the equivalent distance from Texline to Brownsville (943 miles). In 2002, 376 individuals participated on 56 youth and adult teams. They walked a total of 25,544.22 miles.

But we have seen that the Enron debacle is not merely an isolated abuse, but it is representative of the lack of ethics on which our profit economy is based.

In her tremendously important Commentary in The Right of Aesthetic Realism to Be Known, "Enron-and What Americans Truly Want," Ellen Reiss, Class Chairman of Aesthetic Realism, comments on the nature of the business Enron is in-the energy business. She writes:

The first question here is whether such fundamental things as gas, electricity, water-things all people need in order to live-should be owned privately at all: by just some people, for personal profit... Should a baby now in a room in Boston be warm only if her parents can pay the fees that will enrich some stockholders, and tremble with cold if

In the last decades, millions of Americans have been devastated by corporate bankruptcies, such as Enron's, and businesses moving overseas. Showing the root cause of this Ms. Reiss explains:

The profit motive by definition inant for centuries [Goodbye. Profit is: ... to get as much for yourself as you can while expending or giving as little as possible... . Those running Enron simply took the profit system seriously. Since the facts and what human beings deserve tend to be interferences with your making profit, to go after your main goal you try to get around or change the facts and make unreal what people deserve. That is why the profit motive has made for child labor, sweatshops, wages so low that families starved to death. The large upshot of the Enron happening should be the seeing by Americans: the motive that has impelled economics has been no good; it's been un-American; it's been contempt. We have to economics impelled by something else-something fair to and respectful of human beings- ...

> We have learned there is nothing about the profit system in either the Declaration of Independence or the Constitution. "The alternative, the needed thing," Ms. Reiss writes:

... is the motive that was present on September 11\* and after as people felt expressed being useful to other people. Economics has to be based on good will as aesthetics, the oneness of opposites: the feeling. Justice to other things and people is what makes me important-not beating them out and exploiting them.






