From the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith The Business At Hand: Mexican Vicente Fox part 2

Who is Vincente Fox? Who is this bipedal primate that would insult 34 millions black Americans, Who is this hominid that find it self-serving to be insensitive to 2.5 millions black Americans living on Mexico northern boundary in the state of Texas? The report goes on to say that much of Mexico's population is of mixed Spanish and Indian ancestry, and Indians are overwhelmingly poor with little access to education. It appears that Mr. Fox and the Mexican government are discriminating against the Indians.

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

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

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

Summer fun at the pool begins with safety

Take one hot summer day. Add an eye on the children. an inviting swimming pool. Fill with children and adults eager to Other safety suggestions: cool off and you have a recipe for a relaxing day in sunny Texas.

"Or you may have all the ingredients for a tragedy," said Kathleen Moore with the recreational sanitation pool program at the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS). "Each year, people have to deal with the unintended tragedy of a friend or family member who is injured or killed."

In 2003, the last year for which figures are available, 311 people in Texas died from accidental drowning. Of these, 61 were children under 5.

Swimming pools generally are safer for recreation than natural bodies of water. "But it is taking specific safety precautions that make the real difference," Moore said.

At the top of the list: Never swim alone. "No matter what your age or skill level you should always take a buddy with you when you swim, even if a lifeguard is on duty," she said.

Second: Never take your eyes off a child in and around the pool. "Always supervise children in any swimming pool, wading pool or hot tub no master how shallow the water," Moore said. "Anyone can pool. drown in a matter of minutes."

name a designated watcher to keep

· Don't depend on inflatable arm bands or rings to keep children safe in water. Small air-filled swimming aids slip off children's arms or over their heads and are not intended to be used to prevent drowning.

Take CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and first-aid training.

If you do not know how to swim, do yourself and your children a favor take swimming lessons. And have your children take lessons as well. But continue to watch children closely, even if they have had swirnming lessons.

· Don't use a swimming pool as a babysitter. Be sure your children understand that they are not allowed in or near a pool without a responsible adult present.

· Obey lifeguards. They are there to prevent a drowning

"Safety equipment at public pools is required for a reason," Moore said. "The ring buoy and the shepherd's crook are to be used only as rescue devices. Be sure no one plays with the ring buoys in the pool or removes them from the pool area. These devices can save lives."

Prevent children from having direct access to a home swimming

"Install a four-sided, isolation In large groups or at parties, fence with self-closing and selflatching gates around the pool,"

Moore said. The sence should be at least 4 feet tall and should completely separate the pool from the house and yard or play area.

"Keep tables and chairs away from the pool fence to prevent children from climbing into the pool area," she said. "And remove steps to above-ground pools when not in use. Equip the pool with lifesaving devices including a shepherd's crook or lightweight pole and a float with an attached line."

"Don't depend on chlorination alone to protect health," Moore said. "Sanitation precautions also are important."

Teach youngsters to practice good hygiene. Shower before swimming. Take children on bathroom breaks or change diapers often. Wash your hands after using the toilet or changing diapers. And teach children to keep pool water out of their mouths.

"Consistently taking simply precautions will greatly increase the chances that parents and children will enjoy a fun, safe time at the pool," Moore said.

DSHS establishes rules covering minimum standards for public swimming pools and spas including those in public recreation areas as well as at hotels, motels, apartments, condominiums, mobile home parks, clubs, schools and those operated by property owners associations.

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

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

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
