Death Penalty Denies Due Process To Defendants

For the second time this year, a federal judge has ruled the federal death penalty in America is unconstitutional, thereby chipping at my at the weakening wall of state-sponsored mu.der, known as capital punisament.

Judge William Sessions, III. of the United States District Jourt in Busington, MA, ruled the law denies defendants' rights to due process, allowing evidence and procedures that could not be used at trial, to be used to sentence a convioud person to drath.

"If the death penalty is to be part of our system of justice, due praces of law and the fair trial guarantees of the 6th Amendment require that standards and safeguards governing the kinds of evidence juries may consider must be rigorous and constitutional rights and liberties scrup alously protected. To relax those standards invites abuse; and significantly undermines the reliability of decisions to impose the death penalty", said Judge Sessions.

Supporters of the federal deary penany assent one rilling deserves another, or an "eyefor-an-eye, tooth-for-a-tooth" policy. They claim victims (by way of their survivors) are justified in evening the score. The result of such a policy leaves a nation blind, and anable to chew on the broader issues such as health care, educational

opportunity, and liveble wages: The reality is that he death penalty is a human rights issue. Unlike other "less civilized" nations, the United States maintains a system of legal lynching, notwithstanding the mental conditions of the convicted, or the adequacy of legal representation afford the accused. America bragadotiously boasts of moral authority, yet a glaring chink in the? America armor is the federal death penalty.

Furthermore, the application of the death penalty across the United States has been shown to be arbitrary, capricious, and unfair. In 2000, a Columbia University study concluded appellate review of Ceath sentences nationwide found reversible error in 68% of cases; and 82% of the cases retired after reversal did not result to a death sentence. In other words, most doomed to die are wrongly convicted.



Question: Why does it seem like churches are dying and not growing?

Auswert (Part two) The oberch is declining because people desire to please self rather than please

God. Pleasing self in tead of God is not a new problem. Satan desired to have his place above Jehovah. "I will ascend to heaven: I will raise my throne above the stars of God, and I will sit

on the mount of assembly in the recesses of the north. I will ascend above the neights of the clouds; I will make myself like the Most High." (Isaiah 14: 13,14). This is a quotation from Satan exalting himself above God. Here is where the problem of pleasing self rather than pleasing God began.

Satan's rebellion against the Lord and consequent sin infected other angels with the desire to please self. In Jude 6 we read that, "angels who did not keep their own domain, but abandoned their proper abode, He has kept in eternal bonds under darkness for the judgment of the great day." There is some difference of opinion among scholars about what is meant about this statement but, there is no disputing the fact that these angels were disobedient. They wanted to please them-

selves and not God.

Satan's influence also affects us.
When we choose to do what we want instead of what God wants us to do it is obedience to Satan.
"Therefore do not let sin reign in your mortal bedy that your body

should obey its lusts, and do not go on presenting the members of your body to sin as instruments of unright-courses; but present yourselves to God as those alive from the dead and your mem-

bers as instruments of righteous ness to God. For sin shall not be master over you." (Romans 6:12-14) We must choose to obey God rather than Satan. Sometimes the sense of well being that these Christians experience may cause them to take for granted the blessing of salvation in Chrisa, Consequently, they may lack the fervor and dedication that is demonstrated by others who came from unseemly backgrounds. Of course I am not saying this is the case with all who were raised in Christian homes but this does speak to some who have had this experience. A warning to these in this circumstance should be sufficient to encourage their faith and help them guard against the complacency that could set in as a result of their background.
