



Program allows amnesty for people with City warrants

Municipal Judge Robert Doty put in jaii." is extending amnesty to people who have outstanding municipal warrants from 2003 and earlier. The amnesty period will

run from November 8-23. "During the amnesty period, we will not make any arrests on municipal warrants when the defendant voluntarily appears before the Court," said Judge Doty. "We want people to come in and take care of these warrants without the fear of being

defendants to come in voluntarily and take care of their warrants. Municipal Court will work with each defendant to work out the details of the wanplans, fine adjusiments, community service or work release.

To handle the anticipated increased work load, the Municipal Court offices will offer extended hours for three
