We know that Iraq still possesses chemical and biological weapons. 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Texas Tech University Receives Top 50 Ranking

LUBBOCK - Texas Tech University is ranked 43rd among the top 50 public research institutions in the country, according to a new ranking from the University of Florida.

"We are keenly aware of our forward momentum at Texas Tech," said David J. Schmidty, president of Texas Tech. "But it is very positive to have other organizations recognize our progress. We will continue to move up in the rankings of America's Top 50 public research universities."

The University of Florida publication, Top American Research Universities 2002, compares 600 public and private universities in nine different categories- In order to rank among the top 50, an institution must score in the Top 25 in one of the nine categories and conduct at least \$20 million annually m federally supported

Categories include: total research, federal research, endowment assets, annual giving, national academy members among faculty, faculty awards, doctorates granted, postdoctoral appointments and median SAT score.

Texas Tech ranked 19th nationally in annual giving at \$115.8 million and conducted \$21.5 million in federal research.

Texas Techs total research of \$68.2 million ranked 85th nationally. Endowment assets of \$316.5 million ranked 46* nationally. The 139 doctorates granted in 2001 ranked Texas Tech 68th, while the average und agraduate SAT score of 1075 ranked 131st nationally.

The University of Florida report is meant to offer analysis and data useful for understanding American research university performance.

"One of the strategic goals of Texas Tech University is to move up he ranking charts among public research universities in the country," said Schmidly "According to this publication, we are achieving that goal by ranking 43id."

The changes to the junior high include six new science labs, two new classrooms, and an integrated technology lab. Seven old science labs were renovated to create regular classrooms and the old lab storage areas are now being used for extra storage for other subjects.

A new parking lot has been added to accommodate the new entrance to the school, which also houses new administration offices. The new entrance and parking lot are located on the southwest side of the building. The facilities entrance had been located on the north side of the building with little parking available. The district hopes this will make the building more user friendly.

Patterson said he is very happy with the improvements. "This is good for the neighborhood, the area and really all of Lubbock.

This is good because it shows the community is still concerned about young people.


This really adds to what we need in this community," he

African-American Social Work Students at NYU Benefit

A gift of \$1 million from Constance Silver, an alumna of the New York University Sharley M. Enrenkron: School of Social Work, will est Clish the Constance McCatherin-Silver Fellowship Fund, which will provide \$5,000 fellowships to ten African-American students at NYU Social Work each year.

The Fund will benefit
African-American students who
demonstrate academic merit and
financial need, as well as an
abiding commitment to working
in the African-American
munity. The awards will be made
each year to five MSW students
in the School's two-year program
and also to five students in the
advanced standing program.
Fellowship recipients will be
known as Silver Scholars in
Social Work.

In describing her reasons for making the gift, Dr. Silver said, "While I was an adjunct professor at NYU, I realized how difficult it was for many African-American students from the irmer city who wanted to work on graduate degrees in social work to afford to do so. I hope this gift will enable the social work program to recruit the best of these students, and to build a network of talented and committed individuals who will then go back into their communities to work."

According to Suzanne England, dean of NYU Social Work, "This wonderfully generous gift, the largest of its kind to the School, will make it possible for many students to receive an education that will enable them be highly effective professionals in their communities. Connie Silver believes in these students and knows well the great need in the communities they are committed to helping. Her 'evergreen' gift will have a lasting impact on the students, their communities, and on our program, and we are grateful to

Mentoring will be a big part of the fellowship program, according to Dean England. "Connie Silver will be a mentor to the Silver Fellows, and she also wants to build upon that mentorship, so that the initial scholars will serve as mentors to incoming fellows."

Dr. Silver, who earned a B.S. M.S.W. in 1979 from NYU, also received a Ph.D. from the Union Institute. Her many professional interests include work with the Indian Creek Village Public Service Department, a precinct of the Miami Beach police; and she has trained with the International Association of Chiefs of Police and with international undercover drug operatives- As part of her work in Florida, she has taught asset forfeiture, risks of undercover drug operations, the technical aspects of search warrants, and profiling (specifically how to profile stalkers of celebrities). She also worked with the FBI in the weeks following September 11, 2001, conducting sessions with agents who were having difficulty debriefing former "lay spe-

"I have always been a lover of mysteries, from the time I picked up my first "Nancy Drew" book when I was a little girl," Dr. Silver said. "My work in Miami and more recently with the FBI has been very interesting and rewarding."

Dr. Silver also works in a more traditional social work mode with law enforcement, counseling police officers and looking at how the department handles police suicide. Besides NYU, she has taught at the Training Institute for Mental Health, where she instructs students from NYU, Fordham, and Columbia Universities. She also has a private clinical practice.



If we are consuming our meals on the go, then there is some indication that we do not cat at home. That would mean that no one is making well-rounded home cooked meals which require a family or an individual to sit down at a table at some designated time and have a wholesome meal as we used to do! Not sitting down having a meal as a family may very well have some effect on how our bodies metabolize the food we cat. There is a

And in eating too much, we are eating too much of the kinds of foods that are high in sodium and cholesterol. These are the two main ingredients that lead to heart attack and stroke. It has some kind of contributing factors to diabetes as well, it would appear. Somehow the cholesterol and sodium apparently attacks the pancreas and causes it not to function properly, as diabetes is quite prevalent among obese people. Many people with Type 2 diabetes have been advised by their physicians that they can control their diabetes with a proper diet. Therefore, it appears in order to say that those foods so often labeled 'fast foods' are certainly contributing factors to obesity and diabetes.

Another astonishing fact about diabetes is that the cumber of cases has grown overwhelming among Black people and children, especially. There

is another variable indicative of the diets of children and that is the school menus. We are aware that the inception of free lunches and breakfasts at school has meant that more children are being fed on a daily basis. The lunches are praised as being wholesome and nutritional especially since catsup or 'ketchup' is now considered a vegetable by edict from President Reagan. But who is situated in schools to prevent the students from purchasing the chips of all kinds, cookies, cakes, and the high calorie snacks with no nutrition? Since most lunches are free, the cafeteria makes its profits from the 'junk foods.' When the ch'dren eat those high calorie lunches and then add the junk food to it, what is there to keep them from becoming 'fat? There is seldom to be found an elementary school with physical education on a daily basis for students and there are few schools left, with playgrounds. So, where does the child get a chance to burn some of that energy he has? It is time that we get 'in cinque' and stop our children from becoming obese.



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
