

# **AARP** Plans **Chili Supper For Hospital**

At mid-afternoon Friday, the temperature was 76 degrees, the sky was light, sunshiny and clear, cotton gins were running wide open and farmers worked diligently to get their cotton crop off the stalks and into trailers, or more populary these days, compacted into modules.

This year, Mother Nature has gone overboard in this part of the country, and consequently, area farmers are blessed with one of the best cotton crops noted in many a year.

Even in the springtime, when devastating hailstorms, carrying a potential of wiping out a major portion of the cotton crop, the weather almost always bypassed Bailey County.

It would be almost impossible to estimate how many modules are in the fields in the county, although one gin has estimated they have some 650-700 at this time, and crops still being harvested.

Each module generally contains from six to nine bales of cotton, and you may see 30 or more modules in a row in the fields.

Large trucks pick up the modules and move them under the suction at the gin for processing and compacting into bales.

beginning to harvest the cotton. From just north of Muleshoe at Clay's Corner in Parmer County, some 2,875 had been ginned on Friday. The yield has been reported to be from one and a half to 2.7 bales per acre.

A few producers have brought in cotton that produced close to three bales. They said the cotton has been 80 percent middling grade.

Some 7,000 bales have been ginned at the Farmer's Co-op Gin at Enochs, with around 10,000 expected before the end of the ginning season.

The gin reported nearly all the cotton around Enochs is in modules, and if the weather stays pretty, they will be nearly through ginning by Christmas.

Some bale to bale and quarter is being reported from that dryland area.

From Lariat, the Lariat Gin said they have ginned 1,400 bales and expect some 3,000-3,200 before the end of the season. They are getting reports of a bale and fourth to a bale and three fourths.



# **Start Now To Control Cotton Seedling Disease**

Many cotton grovzers were hit hard by seedling disease in the spring of 1987. Now is the time for growers to plan strategies which will help combat this problem in 1988.

This disease is caused by an assortment of soil fungi. They may occur separately or in combinations. The most important fungi in this complex are Rhizocontonia solani, Pythium spp., Fusarium spp. and Thielaviopsis basicola.

Symptoms include decay of the seed before germination, decay of the seedling on the way to the soil surface, partial or complete girdling of the emerged seedling at or near the soil surface, and rotting of seedling root tips. Although there are some subtle differences between the symptoms caused by the different fungi, all the general symptoms can be caused by each fungus alone.

Growers can readily recognize losses from fungal damage that causes partial to complete loss of stand. These include immediate costs of replanting, growing season time (heat units), soil moisture and the precision planned to integrate all production procedures.

Losses not readily recognized are those that result from seedling root rot. One of the more drastic delayed effects results from a girdling lesion on the taproot. The taproot dies below the girdle and is seldom replaced. The plant will develop shallow lateral roots that will serve it well until it is stressed by moisture or heat.

Such a plant may suffer or die from lack of water in midsummer heat even though soil moisture is adequate at a lower depth for plants with a normal tap root system.

Several practices reduce losses to seedling disease. The first of these is rotation. Cotton followed by cotton will build up populations of seedling disease fungi in the soil. Fields should be rotated out of cotton as often as possible. Sometimes, problem fields can be identified and rotated out of cotton more

often or for a longer time than others.

The second line of defense is seed quality. The characteristics of quality seed include good germination, good vigor, low free fatty acids and originating from a fully matured crop. Quality seed will emerge from the soil more quickly and develop secondary roots faster, therefore being vulnerable to fungal infection for a shorter period of time.

The third step in reducing seedling disease loss is timely planting. Unusually warm weather early in the season and less than adequate equipment to plant quickly later often entice growers to plant earlier than they should.

Even good quality seed shouldn't be placed until the 10-day average soil temperature at the eight-inch depth is 65 degrees Fahrenheit. If a grower consistently runs into seedling disease problems and doesn't have good quality seed, it will be better to delay planting until soil temperatures are closer to 70 degrees.

This delay isn't always practical and in some years doesn't solve the problem. Good early stands can be severly damaged by seedling disease if cold, wet weather develops later in the season.

Probably the most underrated seedling disease control practice is the use of seed fungicide treatments. Seed treatments are used, however most of the seed on the South Plains is treated with only a single chemical.

Approximately 60 percent of the South Plains seed is treated with only captan. Pythium is the primary fungus controlled by captan. The chemical has no effect on the other seedling disease fungi.

Two or three chemical combinations in which each material is effective on a different seedling disease fungus will provide much better control.

# Farm Computer Training Available **By Contacting Extension Office**

Farmers and ranchers in Bailey County who want to improve their skills with computers as a step toward improving their chances for profit should take advantage of a series of short courses being offered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says County Agent Spencer Tanksley.

"The Extension Service is dedicated to helping Texas farmers and ranchers regain profitability in their operations," Tanksley said. "To do this, producers must improve their financial management skills, their skills in budgeting,

More than 8,000 bales had been produced by the Muleshoe Co-op Gin Friday afternoon which is less than one-half the cotton expected this year.

It was reported that the staple and mike has stayed very good. Some of the production has been near three bales.

From West Camp, 2,800 bales had been ginned, with a lot of modules in the fields as yet. They are reporting averages of one and a half to slightly more this year.

Most of the cotton is showing a very good mike.

Maple is the 'big' producer' to date. They had ginned 12,000 bales, and figure they are approximately half through.

The average yield there is from a bale to a bale and a half, on mostly dryland production.

Needmore Co-op Gin has ginned 3,600 bales to date, and say they are nearly half through with the season. They report a lot of modules still in the fields.

planning and record keeping." One of the newest pieces of farm and ranch equipment that can be used to enhance these skills is the computer, the Extension agent said.

To provide in-depth training in the rse of this piece of equipment, The Extension Service will teach four computer short courses in the next few months at Sweetwater on the Texas State Technical Institute campus. Each will be two-and-ahalf-days long and will be taught by Extension economists from around the state who specialize in various computer applications in their work with farmers and ranchers.

The first in the series will be Dec. 28-30 and will cover "Electronic Spreadsheets and Their Use in Agriculture," said Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension agricultural economist and management specialist at Lubbock. Lotus 1-2-3 is the spreadsheet software to be used in the training.


"The spreadsheet has proved to be the type of software most often used and most helpful to farmers and ranchers, "Tanksley said. The first short course will cover what spreadsheets are, how they work, and what they can do to help agricultural

decision makers develop new aids to fit their situations.

"No previous computer spreadsheet experience is necessary, since most of this course will involve teaching the basics of Lotus 1-2-3," the county agent said.

Each short course will be limited to 20 participants. This will insure the opportunity for hands-on computer use and a high staff-participant ratio, Smith explained. The \$125 registration fee covers four meals, refreshments and educational materials. Those interested in attending the spreadsheet short course Dec. 28-30 in Sweetwater should immediately write or call Dr. Jackie Smith at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center, Rt. 3, Box 213AA, Lubbock 79401, telephone 806-746-6101.

Other in-depth short courses to be held in 1988 at Sweetwater will include "Farm and Ranch Accounting with Microcomputers," "Advanced Elec-tronic Spreadsheet Applications in Agriculture," and "Whole Farm/Ranch Planning and Financial Management. "Information on these is available from local County Extension offices.
