September 11, 1977 when the Digest was born, it cost approximately \$150 00 to print an issue The cost has continued to rise, and currently, costs approximately seven times that original amount. We did not increase our advertising prices or subscription prices. Our subscription pricing in 1977 was \$15.00 per year. We finally increased subscriptions to \$20.00 while postage continued to rise. Now our subscription price does not even pay the postage. So we lose!

Cur advertising rate has been \$7.50 per column inch for over twenty years. We have always been reluctant to raise our prices. However, surviva dictates that we must raise that price to \$12.00 per column inch. At this rate, we were still extremely competitive with other local n.edia.
