## Dunbar-Struggs Supporters Pass Resolution

Approximately 125 residents of District Two attended a meeting at the Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church met to discuss their concern

about the unitary status. In talking about the matter, Dr. Damon Hill, president of the newly organized effort, told the group: "There is a

conflict between our District Two representative, Mrs. Billie Caviel, and citizens of District Two." "We can't hold in good

faith the position of the Lubbock School Board of Trustees," he continued.

Dr. Hill, with the assistance of Oscar Jones, gave an overview of why such a meeting was called at Bethel. Mr. Jones read a copy of an information sheet released by LISD.

After hearing from several persons in the audience, Dr. Hill called for a voice vote on whether the group present should support unitary status. The vote was 100 percent no. "You have showed your concern about the matter," said Dr. Hill.

In further talking about the unitary status, Dr. Hill told the group there are at least three reasons why we can't support this unitary status. They were, namely, 1. rumors, 2. communication, and 3. lack of knowledge.

Mrs. Joan Y. Ervin, former school board trustee, told the group that she couldn't support the unitary status in good faith. "If it took Justice to bring us where we are today since 1970, then what will happen without Justice," said Mrs. Ervin. Some persons present wanted know why their representative, Mrs. Billie Caviel, was not present. At that point, Dr. Hill advised the group that Mrs. Caviel had been invited.

"I don't say much, but tonight I'm very unhappy with our representative. Her kids are enrolled in

### Goal of Unitary Status Set

The Lubbock School Board, by a 5-2 decision, set obtaining unitary

status for the Lubbock Independent School District as the number

one priority of the 1986-87 school year. Board members Linda

DeLeon and Leuta Matthews voted in opposition of the unitary goal. DeLeon said she felt the people in her district of the school system needed the continued protection of the Justice Department. Matthews made no public comment as to the reason for her voting against the plan.

The decision clears the way for LISD administrative officials to file an

application for unitary status with the federal government. A court decree in 1983 provided that LISD could appeal for a new ruling at the end of the 1986-87 school year. June 1, LISD will seek court clearance of prior efforts to remove vestiges of a segregated system and compliance with desegregation orders handed down since 1970.

If unitary status is granted, the Lubbock Public Schools will

continue to be held responsible for all actions taken by the board from the point of unitary status forward. The status would also provide the district the freedom to make major school decisions on its own rather than under court order.

Board member Billie Caviel, before voting in favor of the unitary goal, made some major suggestions concerning the new status. She said, "Before voting in good faith and conscience there are two major concerns I feel must be addressed." She called upon the board to develop a three to five year plan that would show how segregation problems are being corrected. Caviel also suggested that a tri-ethnic commission be appointed to study and monitor the initiation of the unitary status.

**LISD Dropout Task Force Sets Meetings**

The LISD Dropout Task Force is sponsoring three town hall meetings during the months of January and February to gather input from the community concerning the dropout problem in the Lubbock Public Schools. The meetings are planned for January 26 at Alderson Junior High School, 219 Walnut Avenue; February 9 at Matthews High, 417 North Akron Avenue; and February 23 at Atkins Junior High, 5401 Avenue U. All of the meetings have a starting time at 7:00 p. m.

Dr. Laura Cavazos, president of Texas Tech University and chairman of the task force says, "This is a real opportunity for the citizens of Lubbock to let school

officials know what the issues are and how they should be addressed."

Cavazos will be joined at the town hall meetings by subcommittee chairpersons from the task force. Those representatives and their subcommittees are: Dr. Herman Garcia, Student, Jan Cummings, Family; Bob Ewalt, School; and Carroll Thomas, Community. Representatives from the LISD board of trustees and administra-

tion council will also be on hand.

Since its beginning in September of 1986, the task force has been studying the local problem of dropouts in the LISD. The Lubbock Independent School

District reports a twenty percent dropout rate. That compares to the nationwide average of thirty-five percent of students who do not finish high school. Of those dropouts on the national level, eighteen

percent are Anglo, 45 percent are Hispanic, and 30 percent are black. Cavazos adds, "As you can see, this is one of the most serious problems currently facing our city and nation."

## "Black Community's Leadership!"

For the Black Community to survive -- the initiative and leadership must come from within as Samuel Cornish and John Russworm so eloquently stated in *Freedom's Journal* so many, many years ago. "To long have other people spoken for us; it is time that we speak for ourselves."

*Freedom's Journal* was the first Black newspaper. It said it then and it still holds true today -- the Black newspaper is the "Voice of the Black Community" because the true Black newspaper renders a service to the Black community that can't be gotten any place else. The original organized leadership in the Black community was in this order -- Prince Hall, when he was awarded a charter in the early 1700's -- next Richard Allen, when he got a charter to establish Mother Bethel in Philadelphia, Pa. -- and the Cornish and Russworm with "*Freedom's Journal*". These three have basically been in a leadership role ever since with other organizations coming and going. The Black Press has had many of its leaders murdered, lynched and beaten up badly while other professional organizations haven't suffered as such. To be considered a true leader in the black community -- the organization or whatever -- has to be Black owned, Black controlled and Black oriented. So many of our so called Black organizations, across America, are white owned, white controlled and Black fronted. This is one of the reasons for some of the decline of true Black leadership in the Black community. You see when the piper pays the fiddler, the fiddler plays the piper's tunes. Black independent business people, Black owned businesses, Black churches, and Black companies -- like Atlanta Life Insurance Company and Universal Life Insurance Company -- Black lodges, Black fraternities, and others must take an active leadership role in our communities. This is a must in order to save them.

All of these Black forces must come together in order to save, build and rebuild our communities. We have to forget class status, social standings and all that other bull -- and get our act together for the good of all of us. We are in the same boat together, no matter what some of us think or have been misled to believe.

Black business people, Black organizations, Black professionals, Black laborers must get together. We've got to get off those ego and class trips; and get down to business. Remember elections are coming up. Let's get it together and get some people out of office who do not have our interest and well being in mind. We need to put some people in office who have our best interest in mind.

Black independent business people and Black independent people must join the flock and come out of the background and take some leadership roles in the community, because you don't have it made until all of your Black brothers and sisters have it made.

Remember, you can help! You are independent! The piper don't pay you; you don't have to play his tune. Your hands are not tied. Act like it! Do something; be somebody. Be a leader!!

One of the most important things to assure "Black Community Leadership" is unity and cooperation as well as coordinating and communicating. We have many organizations of many different goals and objectives. Example a few of the most visible Ministers, Juneteenth, NAACP, Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration Committee, Martin Luther King, Jr. Name Change, Roots Historical Committee, various Greek letter, many other committees, organizations, societies, etc. Think what a strong **United Black Community** we would have if all of these groups worked with and cooperated with each other, and united collectively for the good of the total community. These organizations should support Black institutions, schools, churches, each other, and Black businesses with their dollars as well as goodwill and services.

#### NAACP Keeps Blacks Off Back Of Bus In: All Life's Aspects

A permanent home at last has become the official residence of America's greatest organization which has been in the forefront for making the emancipation of Black people not just an idle document but a reality. This is none other than the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

This residence is a large building located in Baltimore, which puts the organization in close proximity to Washington, where laws are made and the NAACP always keeps a watchful eye on the equal enforcement of the constitutional mandates. Dedication of the building was held October 16-19, 1986. At this celebration the history was noted, memorial services for past officials and founders were held, the many achievements were cited and goals were emphasized. Workshops were conducted on the different phases of the goals, with participation by experts and the audience.

At the beginning of the 20th century, freedom of Blacks was a misnomer. They were lynched, beaten and prevented from voting by a combination of laws of poll taxes, literacy tests and the "grandfather clause". Of course White and Black signs were everywhere, which forced inferior accommodations on Blacks.

One particular story involving the lynching of Blacks and riots occurred in Springfield, Illinois in 1908. William Walling wrote the story of Springfield, and in the story he bore down hard on the attitudes of the residents of that city. This revelation moved the hearts of some White liberal thinkers. Among these was Mary White Ovington, a White woman who was living in a tenement in New York City among some Black people. In 1909 she met with Walling and an aide to the then-Mayor of New York. This meeting became the nucleus for the founding of the NAACP. In May of 1909, 40 outstanding people--White, Jews and Blacks--assembled in New York, and the NAACP was officially formed. Moorfield Storey was elected president, and W.E.B. DuBois became publicity and research executive. DuBois brought with him the Niagara Movement pledge: "We will not accept one jot or little less than our full manhood rights, and until we get those rights we will never cease to protest and to assail the ears of America."

The NAACP achieved its first victory when it was six years old. It struck down the "grandfather clause." In 1917, the Supreme Court invalidated segregation of Blacks in residential areas in several cities. This case was argued by Moorfield Storey. In his argument he said, "the question is whether the majority of the people dwelling in any locality may say to the minority 'you shall not have the rights of

other men to live where you please.' In their efforts to rise from slavery to equality with their fellow-men, they are everywhere met by the effort to deny them that equal opportunity which the Constitution secures to us all. If this is possible, the prejudice against which the Fourteenth Amendment was framed to defend the Negroes triumphs over it, and the Amendment itself becomes a dead letter. If it does not protect the rights of all citizens, it does not protect the rights of any, since it knows no distinction of race or color."

The NAACP is continuing to use the Constitution in its battle against injustices, inequality and denial of human rights--a fight it has been engaged in for 77 years. The need is just as great today as it was three decades ago. It was the NAACP that broke down the laws of segregation. It integrated schools, was instrumental in bringing about a Fair Housing law, and a myriad of other laws for justice and rights.

Although laws for justice and equality have now been removed from the books, there are still attempts to implement them in many subtle ways. The NAACP continues to work through the courts and lobbies to eradicate these existing subtleties. It has had many victories.

Executive Director Benjamin Hooks, along with other civil rights organizations, was largely responsible for writing the 1982 Voting Rights Bill. Through its lobbying and testimony before Congressional committees, the promotion of William Bradford Reynolds was denied, and Jeff Sessions of Alabama, whose record showed that he had been unfair to Blacks, was prevented from becoming a federal judge.

The NAACP, together with other organizations, testified and lobbied against the confirmation of Edwin Meese for Attorney General. Daniel Manion's federal judgeship and J. Harvey Wilkerson. All three of these were confirmed.

The organization is very much in the forefront in lobbying for passage of the anti-apartheid act. Many of its members were arrested for picketing in front of the South African embassy. It has been active in preventing funding cuts for social programs, such as health care, student loans and grants for low income housing. Aid to Families with Dependent Children and other benefits for the poor and minorities.

They have been instrumental in preventing Jesse Helms, Chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, from cutting farm credit loans and failure of the Helms Amendment to allow the states the option of acquiring food stamps in a block grant which would enable states to create their own

unitary status. "We had better keep our eyes open, because a lot is going on," said Mr. Berry.

Mrs. Linda DeLeon, school board member

from District One, advised the group to stay involved in their community. "You've got to stay involved, because education is so important. In my district, I have a parent and teacher from each school, and we meet regularly to see what is going on. This is what I will advise Mrs. Caviel. She campaigned on the fact she would do this, but she hasn't."

Persons present volunteered to serve as a committee to have a meeting with Mrs. Caviel and encourage her to

change her vote on the unitary status. Those committee members are: Alice Hicks, Alice Hunt, Stephen Hill, Rev. D. A. Smith, Brenda Page, Shelia Patterson, Rev. Kado Lang, and Mary Hicks.

## Black News Briefs

### Blacks And Whites Take Opposite Views On Reagan, Issues

Washington, DC -- A poll released recently by the Joint Center for Political Studies revealed that Blacks and whites in America have almost identical views on the problems facing the nation but differ sharply on the solutions to those problems. For example, 65% of Blacks felt the government should guarantee jobs for everyone willing to work. Only 24% of whites supported that idea. That's even though Blacks and whites felt unemployment was one of the top three problems facing the nation. President Reagan's popularity among whites remains high - standing 66%. But among Blacks, less than 25% of those surveyed approved of Reagan's overall job performance. On issues affecting the poor, 91% of Blacks disapproved of the president's job performance.

### Tow Blacks Among 400 Richest in America

New York, N. Y. -- Forbes Magazine has released its annual listing of the 400 richest people in America. This year's list includes two Blacks: Chicago publisher John H. Johnson and Motown Records' president Berry Gordy. The magazine estimated Johnson's wealth at \$185 million and Gordy's at \$180 million. However, both Johnson and Gordy had fortunes which appeared small when compared to the richest man in America. That man is discount magnate Sam Moore Walton with an estimated fortune of \$4.5 billion.

### Commercial Costs On Cosby Show Reach Record

New York, N.Y. -- According to Advertising Age magazine the cost of a 30-second commercial on the number-one-rated "Bill Cosby Show" has climbed to a record \$80,000. Last season the same 30-seconds sold for \$270,000. The situation comedy based on the life of a middle class Black family draws an estimated 61 million viewers each week. That's more viewers than any other program on television.

### Unionization In South Wins With Black Workers

Indianola, Miss. -- The over 1,000 mostly Black workers at the Delta Catfish Processors plant voted recently to unionize giving the AFL-CIO its biggest victory in the South in recent years. Despite a massive anti-union campaign, the workers voted 58% to 42% to join the union.

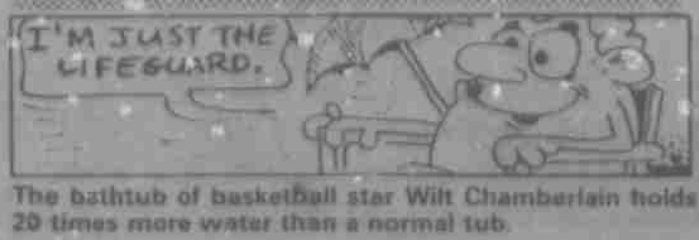
The NAACP has been intensively active in the passage or prevention of bills that are relative to minorities. Realizing the importance of the Black vote, it has conducted a nationwide voter registration campaign. It is a very important source of information on issues that are especially relative to minorities. Althea Simmons, the main lobbyist for the NAACP, is often seen testifying before congressional committees, observing the actions of members of Congress, buttonholing its members and serving on panels of different organizations and being questioned by the media on issues. Without the NAACP, Blacks literally would still be on the "back of the bus" in all aspects of American and international life. The fight continues--that's the reason it is necessary for all Blacks to at least join the NAACP by paying the annual dues of \$10. That's a small amount to pay for our own justice and rights.

### MAURICE CARDINAL OTUNGA



ONE OF FIVE BLACK CARDINALS IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN AFRICA. BORN THE SON OF A CHIEF OF THE BUKUSA TRIBE IN THE WESTERN PART OF KENYA. HE STUDIED CHRISTIANITY IN THE MISSION SCHOOLS AT THE AGE OF 12, WAS RECEIVED IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH, ENTERED A SEMINARY AT 21 AND WAS ORDAINED A PRIEST IN 1946. AT 27 ONE YEAR AT THE VATICAN THEN RETURNED TO KENYA TO TEACH. IN 1957 HE WAS THE FIRST KENYA-BORN TO BECOME A BISHOP. IN 1971... ELEVATED TO ARCHBISHOP OF NAIROBI. ## Creative No-Salt Cooking

In today's Black American home, cooking is no longer the responsibility of one person. Because of busy and varied schedules, usually every member of the family at some time or another has to prepare personal meals or meals for other members of the family. *The Kitchen Beat* is designed to meet some needs of the various cooks in the modern Black family.

Low-sodium cooking doesn't have to mean bland, tasteless meals or avoiding some of your favorite dishes.

Even spaghetti sauce can be made with no salt added, relying instead on spices and other ingredients that bring out the natural flavors of the sauce. It can be prepared in quantity and stored in the freezer, to be thawed at a moment's notice.

Following are recipes from *Del Monte Kitchens* for a variety of popular sauces and dressings to enhance appetizers, entrees or salads, each created without adding salt.

### Savory Spaghetti Sauce

- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1/2 cup finely chopped carrot
- 1/4 cup finely chopped celery
- 1 teaspoon crushed oregano
- 1 teaspoon crushed basil
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 cans (8 oz. each) tomato sauce (no salt added)
- 1 can (14 1/2 oz.) stewed tomatoes (no salt added)

Saute onion and garlic in oil until onion is soft. Add carrot, celery, oregano, basil and pepper; saute 5 minutes. Add tomato sauce and stewed tomatoes, breaking tomatoes with spoon. Simmer, uncovered, 30 minutes. (Makes approximately 1 quart, 4-6 servings.)

### Stewed Tomato Sauce

- 1 can (14 1/2 oz.) stewed tomatoes (no salt added)
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1/4 teaspoon crushed oregano

In saucepan, combine all ingredients until cornstarch is dissolved. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened and translucent. (Makes approximately 1 1/2 cups.)

### Low Sodium Cocktail Sauce

- 1/2 cup tomato catsup (no salt added)
- 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon prepared horseradish
- 1/4 teaspoon hot pepper sauce

Combine ingredients; mix well. (Makes approximately 1/2 cup.)

### Red Ruby Dressing

- 1/2 cup tomato catsup (no salt added)
- 1/2 cup oil
- 1/4 cup cider vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon basil
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/4 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Combine ingredients; mix well. (Makes approximately 1 1/4 cups.)

### Imperial Dressing

- 1/2 cup red wine vinegar
- 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- 1 teaspoon celery seed
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon dill weed
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce (no salt added)
- 1 cup olive oil
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 clove garlic, minced

In sauce pan, combine vinegar, sugar, onion powder, celery seed, paprika, dill weed and pepper. Bring to boil; reduce heat and simmer 2 minutes. Pour into quart jar; cool. Add tomato sauce, olive oil, Worcestershire sauce and garlic. Cover and shake. (Makes 2 1/2 cups.)

### FAMILY PICNIC REAS

- 1 pound Polish sausage
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 green bell pepper, seeded, cut up
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 3 cans (1 lb. each) baked beans
- 1 can (20 oz.) Dole Pineapple Chunks
- 1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce

Doesn't it seem that the clock runs faster at dinner time? As long as there are families, traffic jams, friends and changes in the weather there will be time pressures in the kitchen.

No one recipe can stop the clock, but with this week's quick and easy recipes, you can slow it down a bit. Start with the Spanish Meat Loaf, preparation takes only a few minutes. Pop it in the oven and bake for 1 hour. Team the meat loaf with another time saver—Beef Flavored Rice, made from a rice mix and blended with frozen peas. Last, add the Cucumber and Onion Salad and your dinner is ready to serve before the time clock runs out.

### SPANISH MEAT LOAF

- 2 pounds ground chuck
- 1 envelope dry onion soup mix
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1 (8-oz.) package crushed Tostitos® brand crispy round tortilla chips
- 1 can Rotel tomatoes and green chilies
- 1 can tomato paste
- 1 teaspoon dried parsley flakes

Mix first 5 ingredients well. Shape into a loaf pan 9x5x3. Spread top with tomato paste. Sprinkle with parsley. Bake at 350 degrees F. oven for 60 to 70 minutes uncovered. Serves 8.

### BEEF FLAVORED RICE AND PEAS

- 1 (10-oz.) package frozen sweet green peas
- 1 (7-oz.) package beef-flavored minute rice mix
- 2 cups water
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 tablespoons diced pimento (optional)

Combine peas, contents of seasoning packet from rice mix, water and butter in a saucepan. Bring to a full boil over high heat. Reduce heat and simmer about 5 minutes or until peas are tender. Stir in rice mixture. Mix well. Stir in pimento. Cover, remove from heat and let stand 7 minutes. Stir well before serving. Serves 6.

### CUCUMBER AND ONION SALAD

- 2 cucumbers, thinly sliced
- 1 medium purple onion, thinly sliced
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 1/4 cup red wine vinegar
- Salt & pepper to taste

Place cucumbers and onions in a bowl and set aside. Combine salad oil, vinegar and salt and pepper; mix well. Pour over cucumber mixture and lightly toss. Serves 6.

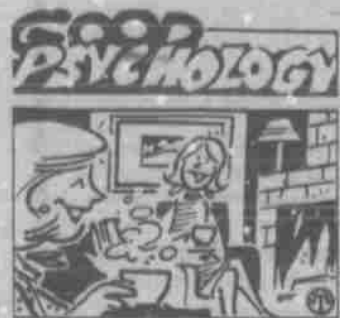

### THE CREATION

We believe in the Genesis account of creation, and (a) that it is to be accepted literally, and not allegorically or figuratively; (b) that man was created directly in God's own image and after His own likeness; (c) that man's creation was not a matter of evolution or evolutionary change of species, or development through interminable periods of time from lower to higher forms; (d) that all animal and vegetable life was made directly, and God's established law was they should bring forth only "after their kind."

\*\*\* (a) Gen. 1:1. "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth."

Ex. 20:11. "In six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them is."

Acts 4:24. "And when they heard that, they lifted up their voice to God with one accord, and said, Lord, thou art God, which hast made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and all that in them is."

Genesis 1-3 reveal what God created. This portion of Scripture has been denied by liberals, modernists and unbelieving scientists. If the Bible cannot be literally believed at this point, how can we be sure it is correct elsewhere? It is all the verbally inspired word of God and it must all stand together or fall together. #### I. THE GENESIS ACCOUNT OF CREATION TO BE ACCEPTED LITERALLY.

##### A. Facts About Genesis 1:1. (a)-1

- The word for God is "Elohim" a uni-plural noun, which fits the trinitarian view of God. It means the Almighty One.
- The word for created is "bara" and is only used in relationship to God's work for He alone can create. It is a singular verb and requires a singular subject.
- In Gen. 1:1 we have the beginning of time, space, and matter.

##### B. The Days Of Creation Were Literal Solar Days.

- (a)-2 Ex. 20:11  
The Hebrew word for "day" or "days" is "yom" or "yamin" and is found over 700 times in the O.T. When it is accompanied by a number (first, second, third, etc.), it always means a literal solar day. There are no exceptions. In some instances the singular "yom" is used to indicate an indefinite period of time, but never when it is accompanied by a number.
- The six days of God's creation, likened time wise to man's six days of labor. (a)-3 Ex. 20:11

##### C. God Did Not Use Evolution In Creation.

- We do not accept the gap theory taught by Scofield.
- We do not believe that each day was a long geologic age. This would be contrary to the use of "yamin" for day. Adam was a fully developed man, and had named all the beasts and fowls (Gen. 2:18-20), before Eve was made from Adam's rib (Gen. 2:21-24). Adam was created the sixth day and lived through the seventh day and on to be 930 years of age (Gen. 5:5). If each one of the days of creation were long ages then he would have been many thousands of years old when he died. Perhaps he would have been from 500,000 to 750,000 years old. See (c)-1 Gen. 2:7; (c)-2 Gen. 2:21-23
- Each living thing was to reproduce after its kind. (d)-1 Gen. 1:11; (d)-2 Gen. 1:24. This is why the missing links will always be missing. There is variety within the specie, but there is no evolution of specie or changing to another kind.

**Pointers For Do-It-Yourself Painters**  
Here are seven bright ideas to help you do yourself proud next time you paint:  
\* Use slow even strokes to spread paint on the wall. Do not remove the roller from the surface when spreading paint from the zigzag to the other areas.  
\* Always look at paint-chip samples in the room you'll be painting, under both day, light and night lighting.  
\* If you use a brush, be sure the bristles are split at the ends to hold more paint and spread it more evenly.  
\* If you use a roller, look for one with beveled ends to reduce trail marks and to give a smoother finish. Synthetic fabrics work best.  
\* Start painting with the ceiling. Use a 2-inch brush to paint a stripe where ceiling and walls meet, then use a roller in the center.  
\* Always paint from unpainted area into painted areas.  
\* When buying an exterior paint, look for one that's spatter free and tolerant of rapid temperature drops. It should also be stain and leach resistant, water and mildew resistant, quick drying, easy to clean, non-toxic, fire safe and has low odor, such as the new Weather King II from Fuller-O'Brien Paints.  
\* When buying an interior paint, consider the surface being painted. Choose latex water-based paint for high-alkali surfaces, such as fresh cement, and for soap-and-water-cleaning, low odor, and fast drying. Choose oil-based paint for abrasion resistance and exceptional smoothness.

# Editorial

## White Establishment Lubbock's Double Standard

There's a double standard when it comes to the political operations of white, establishment Lubbock. The double standard appears whenever the white power brokers of Lubbock see any minority office holder engaging in effective tactics during the course of a political struggle. How does it work? Like this.

When an establishment politician is interested in any political, economic, religious, educational or other issue, he or she gets together with any and all other like-minded persons in the city, county, or state, and attempts to build a coalition of power in order to be heard effectively. Such coalitions cut across party lines, and they cut across lines of governmental responsibility. City council members work with school board members. County commissioners work with city council members. All of them work with our state senator and representatives, and with our Congressman if necessary.

The perfect example of this was presented when establishment Lubbock decided it wanted Thompson Junior High School destroyed and a shopping center put in its place in the Overton South neighborhood. Remember what happened? The state senator got into the act with the Texas Antiquities Commission. The President of Texas Tech University put in his

opinion, along with the Mayor of the city. The *Avalanche-Journal* pulled out all the stops and used personal contacts as well in pushing the establishment position, running editorials, talking with people, and generally advocating what was desired by establishment Lubbock. The school board of the LISD was in the thick of it, of course, because the board is the governmental body with direct responsibility for the school.

But what happens when a minority politician is interested in an issue, and attempts to do something about it? Why, then we hear cries of "improper meddling in the affairs of other governmental entities" from our southwest Lubbock friends. For one of our city council members to talk to a school board member, or even to listen to citizens talk about school matters, is to violate some sacred principle of southwest Lubbock's establishment. The sacred principle, of course, is applicable only to minorities, not to the power of the establishment. That's the hypocrisy of their double standard.

When they want to get everyone together, and cut across all boundary lines to do it, that's fair and square, as they see it. When we do it, they see some sinister violation of lines of authority between governmental units. Well, do your thing, ladies and gentlemen of the establishment, but don't think we are taken in by it. **You are applying a double standard, and everyone in Lubbock knows it.**

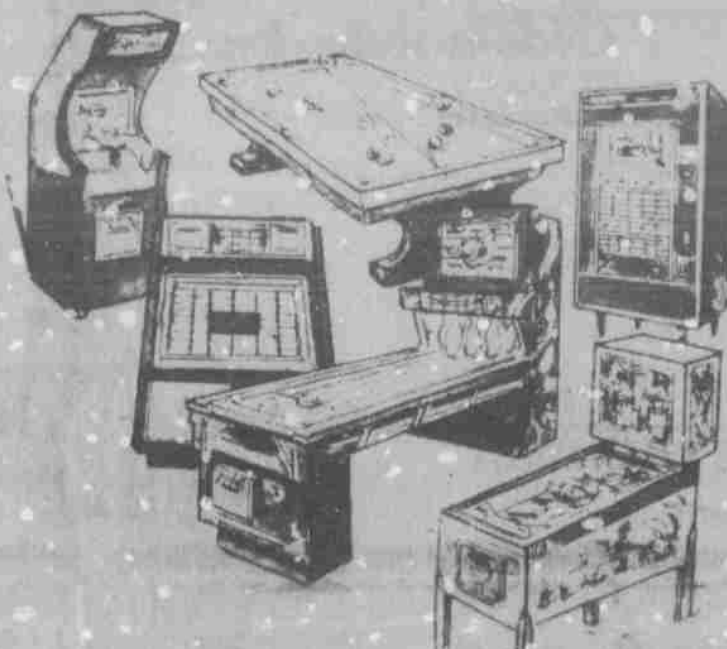
