Stith Named Speaker For King Celebration

(January 15, 1929 - April 4, 1968)

The Reverend Charles Stith, who was recently appointed senior minister at the historic Union Methodist Church in Boston, Mass., will be the speaker at the annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Celebration at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Sunday afternoon, January 18, 1987, beginning at 6 p. m.

A festive occasion, many activities have been planned for the annual event in the center with a Mass Choir responsible for the music.

Rev. Stith was born in St. Louis and educated at Atlanta's Gammon Theological Seminary. He is a preacher with a political ministry. In 1976, he created Project Over, which helped elect the first Black to Boston's School Committee. Then, in 1979, after earning a graduate degree (Th.M.) at Harvard Divinity School and 18 months of service as pastor at a Boston-area parish, he was appointed as senior minister.

Stith's stirring oratory and sense of vision rekindled a dignity and optimism at his historically Black parish. To enrich his congregation, Stith invited notables like Andrew Young, Rosalyn Carter, Gart Hart, and Jesse Jackson to speak at his church.

By 1980, Stith was recognized as a leader beyond the walls of his church. First, he broadened his bond with the Jewish community, visiting Israel and Paris' Rue Copernic synagogue, victimized by terrorists. Then, in 1982, he led a fact-finding mission to Zimbabwe and South Africa. Most recently he ventured to Nicaragua and Honduras to evaluate this country's policies toward these two nations. Stith's rise as one of the nation's next generation of leaders was marked by Boston Magazine's recognition

of him as "one of the faces to watch in 1985," and New England Monthly Magazine's

citing him as one of its "regional heroes," and by awards from such groups as the National Urban Bankers, the Black Educators Alliance of Massachusetts, and the A. D. L. His civic involvements include his having served in such capacities as an Incorporator of the Boston Bank of Commerce, a member of the Editorial Board of WCVB-TV (an ABC affiliate), and a trustee of the MLK Center for Nonviolent Social Change in Atlanta.

Jesse Jackson was so impressed with Stith that in late 1984 he offered the pastor the mantle of Operation PUSH, Jackson's Chicago-based human rights organization. After months of prayerful deliberation Stith decided to stay at Union. Then, in May 1985, he founded the Organization for a New Equality, better known as O. N. E.

O. N. E. is essentially the embodiment of Reverend Stith's politics of inclusion: the notion that economic justice for all can be achieved from a commitment by all to erase the widening nemesis of national poverty. To date, Stith and O. N. E. have brought business, political, and academic leaders together to address this agenda in conference in Boston and Atlanta. "The primary purpose of O. N. E.," says Stith "is to enable those mirrored in

the economic swampland to swim in the economic mainstream. The solution to this problem requires a cooperative effort by a consensus of leaders from segments of every

the Independence Bell in Philadelphia on January 19th will signal bells ringing across the land and in other parts of the world as a unique neon tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. on the second national holiday honoring his birth.

King Week '87 will be observed January 14th through January 19th with special programs and celebrations in Atlanta, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C. and in 50 states, U.S. territories and in nations around the world marking the 58th birthday anniversary of Dr. King.

Also in Lubbock, Texas, a tribute will be paid to Dr. King January

14th through January 19th, sponsored by the Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration Committee.

The King Week observance will be launched January 14th in Washington, D.C. with a diplomatic reception to be held at the Organization of American States and a rally of federal employees in the auditorium of the U. S. Department of Labor. In Atlanta, several events will be held on the 14th including a program of Rededication to Peace and Justice at historic Ebenezer Baptist Church and a Cultural Night performance at The King Center. Mrs. King said, "we invite

everyone to take part in the activities in Atlanta or in your own city if you are unable to take part in the national events."

Coretta Scott King, Chairperson of the Federal Holiday Commission, as well as President of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change, announced that the Commission has adopted the national theme of "Living the Dream: Let Freedom Ring" adding that the goals of the special effort would be "universal peace and justice, human rights, economic and social progress for all peoples." Mrs. King said, "the theme for the King Center's holiday observance of 'Ending the Violence of Poverty, World Hunger, Apartheid and Terrorism Through Creative Nonviolent Actions' reflects our desire to make the Center's annual holiday substantive as well as commemorative."

On January 15th, the actual birthdate of Dr. King, "teach-ins" will be conducted in Atlanta schools as well as in schools nationwide focusing on the life and legacy of Dr. King. The U. S. Parks Service has planned a musical tribute and the Atlanta Sub 40 running club will arrive at the King Center having run from Selma, Alabama to Atlanta. Georgia Governor, Joe Frank Harris, will lead an afternoon ceremony at the state capital with Georgia State Holiday Commission paying

honor to native son, Martin Luther King, Jr.

Also, January 15th, the annual Community Service Awards and reception rally will be held at the King Center complex in Freedom Hall. At 10:00 p. m. a special documentary film entitled "In Remembrance of Martin" will be presented by AT&T in cooperation with the King Center, on national public television (PBS). The film includes exclusive film of King Week 1986 and documents the entire civil rights movement and Dr. King's leadership, culminating in the 1986 first national holiday in his honor.

Labor/management/government social responsibility awards will be presented at the 12th annual breakfast on Friday, January 16th followed by a social responsibility seminar. The King Center's yearly assembly is scheduled for Friday evening featuring Mrs. King's annual address and reception.

On Saturday, January 17th, People Against Violence will be the subject of mini-workshops for the day at the King Center and a national college and university students conference entitled "Stand Up For Martin Luther King, Jr. and Nonviolence" will be hosted by Georgia State University and the King

Center.

The yearly "Salute to Greatness" Dinner will be held Saturday evening at the Atlanta Marriott Marquis honoring Mr. Peter Stroth, Chief Executive Officer of Stroth's Brewery and Mr. Earle Graves, founder and Chief Executive Officer of Black Enterprise Magazine. At the same time as the dinner, a rally and candlelight march and vigil will be observed by students and other people marching from Georgia State University to Dr. King's Crypt. At 9:30 p. m. the All People Freedom Gala will begin, described as a reunion and celebration for those who played a part in the history-making civil rights movement led by Dr. King.

A National Action symposium on "Poverty and World Hunger" will be the focus of attention on Sunday, January 18th and a yearly Interfaith Service scheduled for the afternoon and a gospel program at Wheat Street Baptist Church on Sunday evening.

The second national holiday on Monday, January 19th, begins with a wreath laying at the crypt and the traditional Ecumenical Service at Ebenezer Baptist Church which features the awarding of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Nonviolent Peace Prize.

"We Are Still In Bad Shape!!"

(This article ran in a 1980 edition when this newspaper was then the Lubbock Digest. Nothing has gotten any better, if anything, the next seven years were worse. The Dunbar-Struggs High School situation recently only proved we still need to get our act together for survival for all of us. White folks are

not going to come over and take us by the hand and lead us to the promise land. It has to be us by us. If it was not for the Black Press, we would still be in the Dark Ages. The Black Press is still our eyes and ears as well as voice. Support the Black Press!

Here is the article which ran in 1980. It's even more true and more valuable today than then. Nothing has gotten better. Here it is:

With all the talk and speculation of the proposed Reagan cut offs and backs -- it is time we focus and refocus our minds in the direction of self-help and move away from social action.

One of the major objectives of every group of responsible people is to take their rightful place, by reaching out in mutual interdependency roles with other people -- i. e. Chicanos, Indians, Africans and etc. However, a necessary precedent to acceptance of the responsibility and/or privilege of interdependence is independence. Nonetheless, we are faced with the costly and devastating fact that 27 years after the historic 1954 U. S. Supreme Court decision on school desegregation, now over 40% of our nation's Black youth are "functional illiterates." These Black youth, as such and along with many others -- especially minorities -- are forced to be in a dependency role on society as a whole. There must be a re-assessment of or immediate goals and priorities.

Something must be done immediately to change our past and present policies of paternalism, largesse and irresponsibility encouragement that foster dependency, into positive policies that call for, and encourage, excellence in education -- equitable opportunities for achievement and community pride that builds self-reliance or independence.

Our community and nation's urgent priorities during the 1980's call for a shift away from certain kinds of "integration" or reaching-out and immediate emphasis on the things necessary within our communities to save our presently denied youth and millions of others in our community, where there appears for many no other way out than a life of idleness or crime ... all spelling out non-productive and negative dependency.

The Lubbock Digest as well as other Black Media Newspapers over America -- more than 65% of all printed media in Black America cooperatively -- is dedicated to eliminate these burdensome needs from within Black America. We have chosen as our overall theme for the 1980's: "Casting Down Our Buckets Where We Are." This new emphasis -- or priority -- will have to involve getting all our Black community organizations and institutions together to encourage our youth and others to take pride in preparing themselves early to be our community's economic builders.

This means new-forms of massive training to take over our Black community's needs for Black bricklayers, Black carpenters, Black electricians, Black street sweepers, as well as Black policemen, Black teachers in Black schools, Black firemen, Black

doctor, Black lawyers, Black merchants, and Black businessmen and women of all kinds. It also calls for new forms of partnerships whereby we, simultaneously can encourage the Black community to selectively support those white-owned businesses and institutions which have policies that tend to build our long denied communities in an equitable manner. The rest lets boycotts or freeze out of our communities.

This new priority of rebuilding our communities from within calls for new roles for all in the Black community. It means that the Black Press - Lubbock Digest -- and others will have to examine every possible way we can "pull up our communities by whatever bootstraps" we have, as we seek the long overdue and deserved support required of the white community.

However, the leadership to make our communities the responsible and self-sustaining market places must come from within our communities! We have a tremendous task before us. We must all take as our personal creed "If it is to be it is up to me!"

It's way past time to sit around and wait on someone else and criticize. We must all become involved in our communities and do our share for the good of us all!!!

Boom or Bust Always Around the Corner

Consumers Continue to Control the Economy

Now that the tax bill is a done deal, do not expect an economic upturn to start tomorrow or even early this year. America and Americans are still going deep in debt. The \$202 billion Federal deficit has not done its oad thing to the U. S. economy but waits in the bushes. Pretty soon the U. S. economy will have to look away to the outside mounting trade deficit which refuses also to go away.

A cheaper U. S. dollar has kept America at least competitive in foreign marketplaces where the Japanese and Germany's currencies are too strong to sell cheaper products. People in this country, however, persist in purchasing foreign produced products, even where prices are higher such as with automobiles.

Thus the \$170 million billion trade deficit will not go

Take Charge Of Your Life!

"Dear Dr. Faulkner: I have lost all reason to live and am continually depressed. My parents (especially my father) want me to fulfill their dreams and expect too much of me. My father sent me away to college where I just don't fit in. My grades have been terrible. Two weeks ago I went to a fashion show on campus and two disappointing things happened. A fellow I admire passed by me and did not speak. Also, I sat there seeing all those beautiful ladies modeling and it made me cry because I wanted to do the same thing. But I have gained too much weight and lack confidence in myself. That night I couldn't sleep and wanted to kill myself. What else can I do? Please answer soon. B. M., Atlanta.

Dear B. M.: The immediate thing that you must do is consult your local American Psychological Association and request reference to a competent counselor who is trained in administering to your problem.

Next, you must realize that you have the power to assert tremendous control over your life and resolve your problems in the process. You identified three areas that have contributed to your depressed state: your college studies, your social life, and your self-image.

Each of these issues is resolvable by you, and your determination. You apparently are a normal young lady. No one is going to give you the success that you want. However, you can give it to yourself. But, first, you must decide whether you are prepared to pay the price. If so, go to work.

away unless America can sell much more overseas to lesser developed countries. Only the consumer in this country continues to spend more and more on foreign made products. Pretty soon the U. S. consumer will buy himself out of a job.

Cheap credit with low interest rates has allowed the U. S. consumer to continue borrowing and buying. A Reagan policy. The Federal Reserve Board is currently considering cutting the discount rate again in order to boost spending in America. But even zero financing will not find homes for all of General Motors already oversupply of cars. Closing of GM plants brings back memories of the old saying, "so goes General Motors, so goes the country."

A lower U. S. dollar may help sell some U. S. car sales in foreign markets, but not enough to offset the loss of sales in the U. S. Consumers spent \$22 billion more in last year's first three months than in the previous quarter. However, they brought imports more than domestically produced products. People's buying habits are only part of the U. S. economic problems.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., who insure your bank savings, estimates a record number of 160 bank failures last year. Bad management of U. S. businesses deserves a bit of the blame for the U. S. economy as well as the Federal Government. Derogulation has not led to strengthening and efficiency in business, but rather a business cycle with quick booms or busts. Bucks have been running out of the country, as well as out of the companies.

Confusing as the U. S. economy is, one thing is emerging clearly. Jobs in goods producing industries fell 105,000 in one month. Service industries are beginning to dominate the U. S. economy with their corresponding high costs and low wage scale. Some shift back to production oriented operations of the U. S. economy is necessary if the U. S. expects to remain a superpower providing the highest standard of living for its citizens. Consumers if left alone to choose from continued consumption or saving for capital investment or the public good will over eat everytime.

Black News Briefs

Black New York Mar. Killed Fleeing Attack By Whites

Queens, N. Y. -- A 23-year-old Black construction worker was struck and killed by a car as he and two friends attempted to flee a group of whites armed with sticks and baseball bats. The three Blacks, who were seeking help for a car which had broken down, were apparently attacked because they were Blacks caught late at night in the predominantly white Queens neighborhood of Howard Beach. New York City Mayor Edward Koch labeled the attack "a racial lynching" and "the most horrendous incident of my nine years in office." Four white teenagers were charged with assault in connection with the incident. But the crowd which attacked the three Blacks was believed to have included over a dozen youths, including several teenage girls. The death of Michael Griffith prompted several demonstrations by New York area Blacks. In one such demonstration the Rev. Herbert Daughtry warned, "this incident has created the potential for racial conflict and an explosion."

Dallas Gets Black City Manager

Dallas, Texas -- In a surprise move the Dallas City Council has appointed a Black man to the post of City Manager. 41-year-old Richard Knight, Jr. became the first Black in Dallas history to hold the position. Knight's appointment, in part, reflects demographic changes in the generally conservative, business-dominated city. Since 1960 the Black population has grown from 19% to around 30% of the total. The city also has a large Hispanic population. Many are looking for Knight to help bridge the gap between affluent most white North Dallas and the growing Black and Hispanic populations. However, Knight's appointment comes at a time when the Texas economy is in a slump.

Arizona Governor Angers Many With Bid To Drop King Holiday

Phoenix, Arizona -- The recently elected conservative governor of Arizona has angered most Blacks and many whites in state with his announced intention to drop the state holiday honoring slain civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Governor Fva Mechem, a Mormon known for his strongly conservative views, charges that repealing the holiday will save the state money. In addition, he accuses the former Democratic Governor Bruce Babbitt of illegally establishing the holiday after the state legislature rejected it by one vote. However, civil rights groups have accused Mechem of racism. Among those vowing legal action against the Mechem move is the Rev. Warren Stewart, Sr., who charged, "Mr. Mechem has a racist mentality."

New York's Hulan Jack Dead At 79

New York, N. Y. -- Hulan E. Jack, who became the first Black Borough President of Manhattan in 1953 and later one of the best known Black political figures in America, died last week at the age of 79. Jack, a native of the West Indian island of St. Lucia, was a leading advocate of human rights and civil rights legislation. His political career began to decline in the early 1970's following a federal indictment on corruption charges.

Louisiana Sheriff Said To Get Support For Racial Comments

Jefferson Parish, La. -- Several newspaper reports suggest that Jefferson Parish, Louisiana sheriff Henry Lee is getting widespread support from area whites after making comments which have labeled racist. In early December, Lee, a Chinese-American, created an uproar when he directed his officers to stop any Black young Black men driving through white neighborhoods. According to Lee, such Blacks were "probably up to no good." Lee later rescinded the order and apologized. However, Lee apparently generated support for his re-election bid with the comment. Hundreds of calls to his office and to radio talk shows suggest widespread support for his rescinded order which Blacks labeled "a South African-style law."

Quick & Easy Meals

This week's recipes feature Chicken Chalupas, an excellent way to turn an otherwise plain chicken dinner into a south-of-the-border feast.

In fact, it would be fun to plan a festive Mexican dinner. First, set a colorful table by beginning the meal with a big basket of tortilla chips and Easy Guacamole Dip. Next, serve Chicken Chalupas as the entree along with your favorite refried bean and Spanish rice recipes. For dessert, try the Pralines recipe, it's the perfect ending for a south-of-the-border feast.

Until then, good cooking.

CHICKEN CHALUPAS

- 1 (8-oz.) package Doritos® brand tortilla chips, lightly crushed
- 2 cups diced cooked chicken
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 onion, finely diced
- 1 tablespoon picante sauce
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can evaporated milk
- 2 cups longhorn cheese, grated

In a greased 9x13x2 casserole, place ½ crushed Doritos®. Sauté onion until tender, add both soups, milk and picante sauce. Cook over low heat until well blended. Spoon half of soup mixture over Doritos then sprinkle with 1 cup chicken and one half of cheese. Repeat layers. Bake at 350 degrees until hot and bubbly, about 20 to 25 minutes. Serves 8

EASY GUACAMOLE DIP

- 4 ripe avocados
- 1 can picante sauce
- 2 tablespoons lime juice
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1½ tablespoons Jalapeno peppers, seeded and chopped
- 2 cloves, minced

Halve avocados; scoop pulp into a large bowl. Mash with fork. Add picante sauce, lime juice, parsley and garlic. Stir to blend. Serve at room temperature with tortilla chips. Makes about 1 quart.

PRALINES

- 1 cup brown sugar, packed
- 1 cup white sugar
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 cup milk
- ¼ cup butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup pecans, chopped

Combine sugars, salt and milk in medium, saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring only until sugar dissolves, then stir occasionally. Cook until mixture reaches soft boil stage. Remove from heat, add butter and vanilla. When luke warm, beat with beaters until creamy and add pecans. Drop by spoonfuls onto wax paper. If candy becomes hard reheat slowly until workable. Makes 2 dozen.

Here are two great dishes that travel well and can be prepared in advance. *Apricot Wheat Germ Bread* combines the sweet taste of apricots with the nutty flavor of wheat germ. Serve it with cream cheese, butter or jam, and complete your meal with fruit and a tossed salad.

Or treat yourself to *Crunchy Vegeloaf*, a protein-packed main dish which can be served hot or cold with your favorite tomato sauce. The protein in this meatless dish is provided by eggs, Cheddar cheese, peanuts and wheat germ. Serve it with fresh fruit for the perfect portable lunch.

We thank the makers of *Kretschmer Wheat Germ* for sending us these recipes for our readers.

Apricot Wheat Germ Bread

- 2¼ cups unsifted all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup sugar
- ¼ cup butter, softened
- 1 egg
- ¾ cup milk
- ¾ cup chopped (dried) apricots
- ½ cup vacuum packet wheat germ, regular or brown sugar & honey

Combine flour, baking powder and salt; set aside. Cream sugar and butter until light and fluffy; add egg, mix well. Add milk; blend well. Add flour mixture; beat until just combined. Stir in apricots and wheat germ. Turn into greased 8 x 4 x 2-inch loaf pan. Bake at 350°F. for 50-55 minutes or until bread tests done. Cool in pan 10 minutes, remove and let cook on rack. (Makes 1 loaf.)

Crunchy Vegeloaf

- 3 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 cups finely chopped onion
- 4 eggs, slightly beaten
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon chervil leaves, crushed
- ¼ teaspoon tarragon leaves, crushed
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- 2 cups finely chopped celery
- 2 cups shredded carrot
- 1 cup finely chopped green pepper
- 1 cup finely chopped peanuts
- 1 cup fine fresh bread crumbs
- 1 cup regular wheat germ
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- Tomato sauce

In a large skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Sauté onions until tender. In a large bowl, stir together eggs, lemon juice, salt, chervil, tarragon, garlic powder and pepper. Add sautéed onions, celery, carrot, green pepper, peanuts, bread crumbs, wheat germ and cheese; mix well. Press mixture into a well-greased 9 x 5-inch loaf pan. Bake at 350°F. for 1 hour or until a knife inserted in center comes out clean. Let cool 15-20 minutes before removing from pan. Serve hot or cold with your favorite tomato sauce, as desired. (Makes 6-8 servings.)

BREAD BAKING BASICS... AN UPDATE



Bread Remedies

- Even the best bakers occasionally experience a baking failure. Here are some common causes of trouble and advice from the experts at the Fleischmann's Yeast test kitchens.
- **Adding too much flour when kneading:** The dough should be soft and slightly sticky. Too much flour will result in a stiff dough and a dry, dense bread.
- **Under-kneading the dough by hand, or over-kneading the dough in a food processor (60 seconds maximum),** yields a loaf with a dry crust. Follow recipe directions.
- **Water temperature too warm, or too cool for activating the yeast:** Bread won't rise.
- **Rising time was too long,** if bread falls flat and the crumb is doughy.
- **Baking time was too short** if a good crumb is evident, but bread has a doughy center.
- **Free form doughs** risk spreading too much when rising if dough is too soft. They should be firm when shaped.

- bread possesses its individual characteristics, here are some guidelines to use as a comparison for signs of a well-made loaf.
- **Loaf:** Take a look at the loaf as a whole. It should be symmetrical with a well-rounded, smooth top.
- **Crust:** The color should be warm, rich and even. Careless brushing when glazing will result in an uneven crust color.
- **Crumb:** Once the loaf has cooled, examine a slice of bread. The inside air cells throughout should be bright and light, and have a texture that won't tear when buttered.
- **Aroma:** You should be able to smell that great nutty yeast aroma even when the bread cools down.
- **Flavor:** A sweet nutty flavor is typical of yeast breads.

THE CREATION

We believe in the Genesis account of creation, and (a) that it is to be accepted literally, and not allegorically or figuratively; (b) that man was created directly in God's own image and after His own likeness; (c) that man's creation was not a matter of evolution or evolutionary change of species, or development through interminable periods of time from lower to higher forms; (d) that all animal and vegetable life was made directly, and God's established law was they should bring forth only "after their kind."

*** (a) Gen. 1:1. "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth."

Ex. 20:11. "In six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is therein."

Acts 4:24. "And when they heard that, they lifted up their voice to God with one accord, and said, Lord, thou art God, which hast made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and all that is therein."

Col. 1:16-17. "For by him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible, whether they be thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers; all things were created by him, and for him. And he is before all things, and by him all things consist."

Heb. 11:3. "Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of things which do appear."

John 1:5. "All things were made by him; and without him was not anything made that was made."

Rev. 10:6. "And swear by him that liveth for ever and ever, who created heaven, and the things that therein are, and the earth, and the things that therein are, and the sea, and the things which are therein, that there should be time no longer."

Rom. 1:20. "For the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even his eternal power and Godhead."

Acts 17:23-26. "Whom therefore ye ignorantly worship, him declare I unto you. God that made the world and all things therein, seeing that he is Lord of heaven and earth, dwelleth not in temples made with hands; neither is worshipped with men's hands, as though he needed anything, seeing he giveth to all life, and breath, and all things; and hath made of one blood all nations of men."

Jer. 10:12. "He hath made the earth by his power, he hath established the world by his wisdom, and hath stretched out the heavens by his discretion."

Neh. 9:6. "Thou hast made heaven, the heaven of heavens, with all their host, the earth, and all things that are therein, the seas, and all that is therein, and thou preservest them all."

*** (b) Gen. 1:26-27. "And God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness. So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them."

I Cor. 11:7. "Man... is the image and glory of God."

*** (c) Gen. 2:7. "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul."

Gen. 2:21-23. "And the Lord God caused a deep sleep to fall upon Adam, and he slept; and he took one of his ribs, and closed up the flesh instead thereof; and the rib, which the Lord God had taken from man, made he a woman, and brought her unto man. And Adam said, This is now bone of my bones, and flesh of my flesh: she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of man."

*** (d) Gen. 1:11. "And God said, Let the earth bring forth grass, the herb yielding seed, and the fruit tree yielding fruit after his kind, whose seed is in itself, upon

the earth; and it was so."

Gen. 1:24. "And God said, Let the earth bring forth the living creature after his kind, cattle, and creeping things, and beasts of the earth after his kind: and it was so."

Genesis 1-3 reveal what God created. This portion of Scripture has been denied by liberals, modernists and unbelieving scientists. If the Bible cannot be literally believed at this point, how can we be sure it is correct elsewhere? It is all the verbally inspired word of God and it must all stand together or fall together. The Bible does not set out to prove the existence of God. "The fool hath said in his heart, there is no God." Psa. 14:1

I. THE GENESIS ACCOUNT OF CREATION TO BE ACCEPTED LITERALLY.

A. Facts About Genesis 1:1. (a)-1

- The word for God is "Elohim" a uni-plural noun, which fits the trinitarian view of God. It means the Almighty One.
- The word for created is "bara" and is only used in relationship to God's work for He alone can create. It is a singular verb and requires a singular subject.
- In Gen. 1:1 we have the beginning of time, space, and matter.

B. The Days Of Creation Were Literal Solar Days.

- (a)-2 Ex. 20:11
- The Hebrew word for "day" or "days" is "yom" or "yamin" and is found over 700 times in the O.T. When it is accompanied by a number (first, second, third, etc.), it always means a literal solar day. There are no exceptions. In some instances the singular "yom" is used to indicate an indefinite period of time, but never when it is accompanied by a number.
- The six days of God's creation, likened time wise to man's six days of labor. (a)-2 Ex. 20:11

C. God Did Not Use Evolution In Creation.

- We do not accept the gap theory taught by Scofield.
- We do not believe that each day was a long geologic age.
 - This would be contrary to the use of "yamin" for day.
 - Adam was a fully developed man, and had named all the beasts and fowls (Gen. 2:18-20), before Eve was made from Adam's rib (Gen. 2:21-24).
 - Adam was created the sixth day and lived through the seventh day and on to be 930 years of age (Gen. 5:5). If each one of the days of creation were long ages then he would have been many thousands of years old when he died. Perhaps he would have been from 500,000 to 750,000 years old. See (c)-1 Gen. 2:7; (c)-2 Gen. 2:21-23
- Each living thing was to reproduce after its kind. (d)-1 Gen. 1:11; (d)-2 Gen. 1:24. This is why the missing links will always be missing. There is variety within the specie, but there is no evolution of specie or changing to another kind.

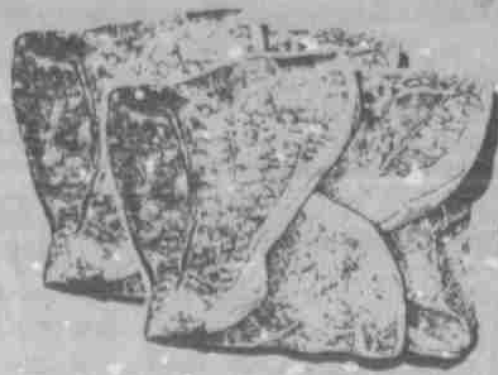

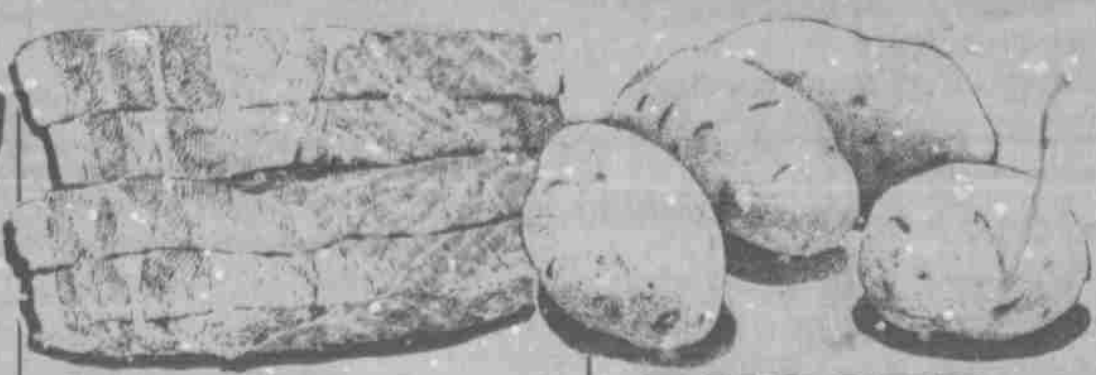

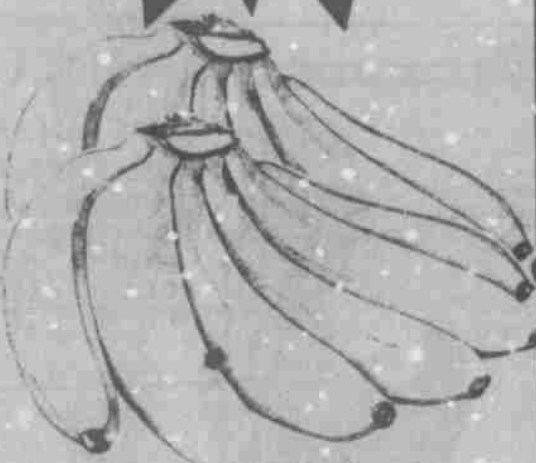
