Plainview -- A city less than fifty miles from the city limits of the "Hub City" received a shock Monday night when an explosion ripped a crowded Negro church on Plainview's north side, killing one wona n, Mrs. E.A. Duke of Pampa, Texas, and leaving fiftyeight injured.

Plainview hospitals were jammed with the injured and ambulances were pressed into service from Hale Center, Petersburg, Olton and Lockney to supplement the Plainview ambulance service.

It was a miracle that more of the 200 persons inside the church were not killed.

HAYNES' CHURCH TO GO

It was learned from an official in the Church of God in Christ #2 which is a part of the district that their pastor, choir and members were to have been at this meeting, b u t due to the fact that Bishop W. D. Haynes, pastor of their church, was in Waco, Texas conducting a revival.

As it has been in the pass years, Bishop Haynes was to deliver the

opening address.

The crowd was attending a revival which was given in connection with the opening session of the District Convacation which is held each year at Plainview.

The district is composed of three areas, namely; Lubbock, Plainview, and Evangalist.

A.Y. Lauterdale of Ralls, one of the witnesses, was uninjured, but was able to give a good des-

cription of the explosion. He said that singing had begun to end the service when the blast came, knocking out the back wall of the one-story structure and allowing the roof to cave in. The pipe organ fell on its back, he went on to add.

Local firemen said the explosion apparently came from under t h e floor of the building. This is the conclusion reached by the fireman since many of the injured suffered leg injuries.

The director of public safety, Hoyt Curry, said that early investigation indicated the blast "was natural." "Indications are that it was a gas leak, possibly set off by an electric organ, " he continued.

The theory that the explosion may have been caused by a collection of gas beneath the floor was backed up by statements from those who survived the blast.

The Rev. E.N. Givins, pastor of the church, was reported to be among those injured.

One of those in the church who w a s baffled by the blast was the Rev. Charles Williams, 'who was conducting the revival at the demolished church, said he did t know what happened.


"To tell the truth, I don't know what happened. When we knew anything, it seemed like we went up and then came floatir back in the air."

"I was up at the front, right next to the back wall, facing the congregation. There wasn't any flash or fire, but there must have b e e n an explosion somewhere though because I knwo some got burned."

"It threw me out, but I got caught under the frame of the building," Williams said. "My head was out, but my legs were caught," he added.

He agreed that there were approximately 200 people attending the opening service.

This incident which happened in Plainview coudl have happened anywhere in these United States. Let's thank goodness that the pews were strong enough to hold the collapsed roof, if not for this, there could have been more dead.
