The Dunbar Marching Band was represented in a 3AAA competition meet at Canyon, Texas, Tuesday.


The Dunbar Panthers are idle this week, but you can bet your boots they are making extra preparations for the contest next Saturday, November 11, with Lakeview of San Angelo.

Chicago-(LDA)-All of the current criticisms directed toward the shortcomings of our children in the important area of communications involving reading skills can directly be traced to their roots and tenacles. These roots reside in the inability of the educators themselves to perform adequately in the field of communications. Put more simply: our educators cannot read either!

There is more to reading than just vocally uttering the written word and recognizing some of the meanings to which words lend

themselves. Words are also the building blocks for important ideas. They are the tools of correct reasoning. They also provide the key to the solution of some of our most perplexing problems. This can readily be seen in the exact sciences, but so far, is lacking in the social sciences.

At their level of comprehension, our children are no more retarded than are our educators at their level of comprehension. Our children struggle with their artificial homework created by the teachers but the teachers absolutely refuse to struggle with the homework problems created by themselves and society, of which they are supposedly the most educated members. These problems are low wages, wars, crime, poverty, and unemployment.

Are we to depend on our children to solve these problems? If the educators cannot solve these problems now, what value is the reading skills they are passing on to our children? I say all of this to impress upon everyone the fact that there are solutions to the above-mentioned problems but our educators are more retarded than the children they are charged to teach.


To demonstrate the fact that 90% of our educators are retarded readers unworthy of the wage scale they are now getting, I propose a test for our educators and the various boards of education throughout America.

How many of our educators are able to read "Progress and Poverty" by Henry George and, upon completion, give a categorically correct "yes" or "no" answer to the contents within this book?

I am a high school drop-out (freshman year), but I will wager \$500.00 that not even 50% of the nation's teachers can begin to comprehend it, much less give a definite answer to its contents. Here is one possibility for providing the necessary funds for our schools that has not even been considered, much less exhausted.

The one remaining problem is just how many parents are concerned enough to put this wager to the test? I will provide the money if you parents can possibly plead, beg, or do a little persuasive arm-Continued on page three

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
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
