## FREE HOUSING ADVICE SERVICE HERE

A free counseling service to help persons who are having difficulty finding housing within their financial means was introduced here Monday, according to Glenn Bailey, director of the Lubbock insuring office of the Federal Housing Administration.

"This service is especially beneficial to low and moderate-income families minority groups and others vexed with housing problems," Bailey added.

Families will be interviewed by housing counselors in the FHA office. Information concerning family circumstances, including income, debts and credit data will be taken by the counselors. All of this data will be kept confidential by FHA.

This information will be used to guide FHA's counselor in advising families on the type and location of housing available. Persons will then begin to inspect housing that is for rent or sale. This property will be within the financial means and in line with individual circumstances, needs and desires of persons seeking a place to live.

The service has been tested in 15 cities and has proved useful in helping people find decent housing, according to Bailey.

The service is located in the FHA insuring office at 1601 Ave. N and appointments for interviews may be made by calling POS-8541, Ext. 286.

## DUNBAR CAPTURES REGIONAL TITLE

Those fighting Dunbar Panthers before many Dunbar rooters, defeated Andrews 81-52 last Saturday afternoon at Municipal Coliseum and captured Region I AAA title before 2,500 fans.

Aside from winning the right to play in Austin tonight in their first year in the TIL, the Panthers completely dominated the All Regional Team by placing sharpshooters James Skief, Jerry Phillips and Marc Wilson on the squad. Andrew's Rickey Laminack and Wichita Falls Roosevelt Manning rounded out the squad.

Dunbar moved to the semifinals by defeating Washington 90-86 Friday night. Although the Panthers led the Leopards by 30 points in the first half, the game became closer during the final minutes of play.

In the clinching game against Andrews, Phillips had 20 points; John Hollins 16, Skief and Robert Williams settled for 14 each. Wilson an upcoming sophomore, missed double figures mark by one.

Dunbar now takes a 27-5 reading to Austin tonight, joining Lake Highlands, Seguin and Conroe as AAA victors. Clear Creek was expected to come to the finals with a 34-0 mark, but was upset by Conroe.

Hot shooting Williams sparked the Panthers each time it seemed they needed points and Hollins also came up with key brackets.

The Panthers lead 19-15 after eight minutes of play and went on to increase their lead through the first half, gradually pulling away to win easily over the Mustangs of Andrews.

## TIME GROWS SHORT TO GET CAR STICKERS

Time left to get 1968 state vehicles inspections before the April 15 deadline is growing short, and for motorist who will have to have seat belts installed to get their sticker, the time left may actually be shorter.

At this report, only 48 per cent of the 112,314 vehicles registered in Lubbock County have been inspected, according to Captain Alan Johnson, motor vehicle inspection supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

It is possible that many motorist who wait until the last day for the safety inspections may not get their cars inspected because of shortage of seat belts.

The last legislature passed a law requiring that front seat belts be installed in all vehicles in which seat belt anchors were a part of the manufacturers' original equipment. Because of this, many dealers may exhaust their supply of belts before all motorist who need them can buy the belts.

Seat belts anchors, which are threaded holes in the vehicles structure suitable for receiving seat belt attachment fittings, are part of the manufacturer's original equipment on all American passenger cars beginning with 1962 models. Seat belts also will be required on foreign-made cars in which seat belt anchors were original equipment.

Many 1962 model cars had anchorages, but no seat belts were attached. Also, belts were removed from many 1962 and later models when they were traded in on newer models and were never replaced.

The expected belt shortage will develop because dealers are reluctant to build up stocks of belts
