Hospital sees increase in patient days, visits by Home Health

During a meeting of the Muleshoe Area Medical Center Board of Directors on Thursday, hospital administrator Richard Murphy reported that the number of patient days at the hospital was up in June. This basically means that there are more patients in the hospital.

The board also noted that the Home Health Agency saw a substantial increase in the number of home visits in June. The agency made approximately 1,264 visits.

Also on Thursday, the board heard a report from Rita Walker concerning the HealthCare Center.

Walker reported that the census for the nursing home is down.

"It is really low," She said. "We have a capacity for 56 people and right now there are 46."

The board also discussed setting a date for a joint medical staff and board meeting.

The purpose of the meeting will be for the two groups to look at where they want to go, in terms of the hospital.

Hospital administrator Richard Murphy said he would check with physicians' schedules before setting a date.

The board also set a pre-budget meeting for Sept. 8 at 7 p.m. They plan to finalize the budget at the next regular meeting following that on Sept. 22. The new fiscal year begins in October.

The board also learned that a petition which was circulated last spring in order to call a hospital election was not necessary. Murphy said that there are two ways to go about calling an election, through a temporary board or by a petition. The election was called by the temporary board.

Following the meeting on Thursday, the board conducted an executive session to discuss personnel matters.

City hopes to get grant to pave roads

The first of at least two public hearings by the City of Muleshoe was held on Tuesday to discuss the city applying for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) from the state. The city plans to use the funds for road paving, if awarded.

Dave Marr, Muleshoe city manager for Muleshoe, said the city is currently seeking input from the community in applying for the \$250,000 CDBG grant. The grant will be used to pave roads in a northside area of town known as The Flats, as well as in the

Morrison and northwest additions.

Funds will also be used for activities to benefit low and moderate income persons.

The city received a previous CDBG grant four years ago, which was used to pave roads in the east side of town.

Marr said the CDBG application is due in September and the city could find out by December if it will be awarded.

The city will conduct a second public hearing regarding the CDBG grant this

Free football physicals to be given

Football physicals for Muleshoe High School and Watson Junior High School 1 boys will be given on Sunday, July 31st at 2 p.m. in the Muleshoe High School gym. any athlete did not receive his info and forms, copies are available at the MHS coaches office from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. and 7 p.m. - 10 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Football practices to get underway

Muleshoe High School football practice begins Wed. Aug. 3rd at 8 a.m. All paperwork must be on file before any athlete can participate in any practice.

Missing a workout because paperwork is not completed is normally considered an unexcused absence. Workouts for MHS will be at 8am and 11 am. Each workout is 1 hour, 45

minutes in length.

There is a break in between workouts for chalk-talk and weight training seminar. Varsity candidates will return at 7 pm for a conditioning only workout. Any varsity candidate must report on Aug. 3.

Any varsity football player who is unaccounted for will not be considered for varsity position on the team. Any

subvarsity players must also report for workouts on the third unless there has been a prior arrangement made with Coach Adair as to being absent.

The first four days of workouts are non-contact, in shorts. Contact workouts begin Monday, Aug. 8. One-A-Day workouts will begin on Aug. 15.

In other business on Tuesday, the council discussed the placing of possible yield or stop signs at the intersection of 18th Street and Ave. I.

"This is not a congested area," Marr said. "But we need to let people know that they need to stop and look both ways."

Robert Montgomery, Muleshoe Mayor said, "A lot of people do go through this intersection real fast. The police department said there has never been a reported accident there, but personally, I would like to see a yield sign there. It would be more advantageous for us."

City Councilman Tom Bonds said that another consideration regarding the situation in this area is that "the area is heavy with kids."

Bonds suggested that the topic be placed on the agenda for the meeting next month

and Marr said that he would begin looking at options.

Also on Tuesday, Marr informed the council that the city is trying to determine what to do with trash, in regard to state regulations.

"We need a long-term plan," Marr said. "We plan to look into the possibilities of composting, which is an option. We could be looking at 60 percent of our waste if we did this." No action was taken regarding thematter.



The board will also review student bus routes and take appropriate action and continue discussion of the 1994-95 budget.

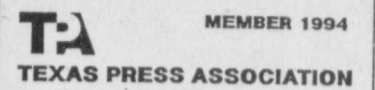

Following an executive session, the board is also expected to receive resignations, consider hiring new personnel and conduct a quarterly formative evaluation of the superintendent.

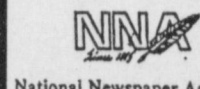

Home Alone?

Summer is a great time for vacations. Unfortunately, burglars don't take breaks. When you head for the beaches or mountains, be sure to take a few common-sense precautions to minimize the chances of your house being robbed.

You'll enjoy your trip more if you know that you took care of things at home. Here are some things to consider before leaving for your vacation.

A vacation to-do list:

Few thieves like to break into an occupied home. So your best defense against robbers is a house that looks lived-in. Don't leave your house looking abandoned while you're away. At a minimum, be sure to do the following:

*Stop mail and newspaper deliveries.

*Double-check all your locks and windows.

*If you have a telephone answering machine, don't say you are on vacation on your message.

*Mow your lawn before you leave. If you're going to be gone for a long time, have someone you trust maintain your yard.

*Leave blinds, shutters or curtains open or partially open. Windows that are tightly covered all day, every day, are a signal to potential thieves.

*Have a friend come by periodically to pick up any circulars or other evidence that you're away. Also, leave your itinerary with a friend and a list of phone numbers where you can be reached in case of emergency.

Some robbers cruise neighborhoods, seeing which houses are dark or quiet night after night. Consider getting a number of timers, and hooking them up to lamps or your TV. Place the timers in different rooms and set them to work at different times.

Another good idea is to leave your air-conditioning on at a higher temperature, rather than turning it off completely. It's a

sure sign that you're out of town if the A/C is off when the weather is hot.

Before leaving, use an engraver to mark all your valuables with your social security number or driver's license number. Some police forces will lend you an engraver and provide you with a window sticker that tells all potential thieves that your house is no easy mark. Many burglars will move on to an easier target once they see this.

Above all, have a trustworthy neighbor, friend or relative check your house occasionally. They can take care of things while you're away, like removing advertising flyers from your front door or seeing that everything looks normal.

It might even be a good idea to arrange for a house-sitter that way, the house will look lived-in because it is. However, avoid mentioning to anyone outside your confidence that you will be away.

When all else fails:

In spite of your best efforts, someone could rob you while you're away. To help settle insurance claims if you are burglarized, have a list of all your valuable items with an estimate of their cost. There are now computer software programs that can help you automate this task. Many insurance companies suggest that you also take photographs of the valuables. Check with your agent for more ideas.

We hope these tips will help you enjoy your vacation with a calmer mind. Be safe, be smart, and have a great vacation.

- State of Texas vs. Elueterio Venegas, Jr. An order of dismissal was filed "considered in Cause No. 1684 in the 287th District Court, an unadjudicated offense pursuant to \$12.45 of the Texas Penalty Code and pursuant to a plea bargain.
- State of Texas vs. Chacon Faliciano Marquez. He pleaded guilty to driving while intoxicated, a first offense, on July 9. He was sentenced to 30 days in jail, ordered to pay a fine and court costs, placed on one year of probation and ordered to complete a Alcohol Offending Program.
