# Tech Studies Show Runoff Waters "Not of Acceptable Quality" for Local Canyon Lakes Project Purposes

A team of eight Texas Tech University students slogged through Lubbock rains in 1971 to study the quality of water which would supply Lubbock's Canyon Lakes Project.

Eight students participated in the study. Dr. George O. Elle of the Department of Agronomy was faculty adviser. Agronomy Profs. B. L. Allen and Daniel R. Krieg were consultants.

The students reported Friday, February 25th, that "if the secondary supply of water, which is to be used for maintaining water levels, is of good quality, then the lakes may be suitable for the purposes proposed."

The runoff from rainwater in the area is not of acceptable quality, their report indicated.

The project proposes the construction of a series of seven lakes in the Yellowhouse Canyon in Lubbock. The project would contribute new park acreage with impounded water which could serve recreational and possibly industrial, municipal and agricultural purposes.

An engineering study has reported that the project is feasible, and it has received funding.

The National Science Foundation sup-'ported the students' study of six of the

lake sites with an \$8,780 grant through the NSF Student-Oriented Studies Program. The program encouraged college students to express their concern for the American environment by contributing constructively to its improvement. It provided support for the work of students who demonstrated both a readiness and capability for their own educational development in the area of environmental quality control. The Texas Tech students submitted a proposal which won support in national competition with other student proposals.

When rains provided runoff, the students collected samples at seven representative stations in the proposed area of the lakes. Rainfall intensity and duration were measured at the same time.

The water studied by the team eventually runs into Buffalo Springs Lake and beyond to the eighth in the lake series.

during last year's campaign, and used the 10-Volume International Library of Negro Life and History as an incentive to stimulate gifts and otherwise aid the program. It will be used again in Phase One.

The International Library was produced under auspices of the resprected Association for the Study of Negro Life and History which was founded in 1915 by Dr. Carter G. Woodson at a time when there was very little interest in the Black experience in America. The Association subsequently initiated Negro or Black History Week, which was celebrated last month.

By special arrangement with the publisher (United Publishing Corporation; Washington, D.C.), for the first time, the 56-Volume Journal of Negro History will also be offered to institutions and the general public by pargicipating Pre-Alumni Councils. (United publishes both the Journal and the International Library).

The Journal is the premier work of the Association. Over 55 years in the making, it and the International Library have been referred to as American "History's Missing Pages." Written largely by Black scholars, these publications are highly regarded and make valuable and useful additions to the home or other library.

Mr. Veale indicated that dissemination of the International Library of Negro Life and History and the Journal of Negro History during Phase One will further the cause of education and understanding, as well as aid UNCF schools.

Phase One has caught on with Pre-Alumni Councils and students everywhere. Under a plan developed with the publisher, students may elect to receive financial incentives toward college expenses; United is offering part-time employment; and, in addition to generating funds for all member schools, the school attended by a participating student may directly benefit from these efforts.

# Dr. Leon H. Sullivan Appeals for Unity in OIC Key Dinner Speech Here Friday Evening





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

Now who would be stupid enough to predict a five-way tie for first place in the Southwest Conference basketball race? Don't you DARE

So, as forecast, SMU won its final two games and Texas got hot and did the same thing, thus creating the tie that resulted in Tuesday night's playoff, It also killed off the hopes of three teams.

The 1971-72 race only proved to the satisfaction of fans everywhere in Texas that the "experts" are not even as sharp as Ivory soap, which claims to be 99.9% pure. They were half right by picking Texas, but teams they had picked to finish second and third wound up fifth and seventh. And teams they had picked for sixth and eight tied for third.

It was, in short, a most unusual conference race, one to be remember-

ed.

There were other unusual things. For instance, SMU was the only team that didn't lose a series (both games); Rice was the only team that didn't win a series; and Tech was the only team that didn't split a series.

Texas and the Raiders won the most series, four each, and this should have been the key to victory. But Texas lost both games to Tech; Tech lost both games to SMU, TCU and A&M; TCU lost both games to A&M; and A&M lost both games to Texas.

SMU used the tried and true formula to success; the Ponies were 7-0 at home, won three on the road. Texas and TCU were 6-1 at home, but the Horns won four on the road, while TCU could do no better than 3-4.

Tech, formerly almost unbeatable in Lubbock, posted identical 4-3 home and road marks.

The Raiders, although in contention all the way, for some strange reason slipped in attendance. Crowds dipped under the 100,000 mark for the first time in three years, 92,603 according to Tech's announced figures.

And in the hot conference chase, Tech drew only 58,099, the first time under 60,000 or better in three years. Still the average for conference games probably was the highest in the league with 8,299.

For the season, Tech played to 172,538 fans at home and on the road. New Mexico's 13,541 was the largest crowd, Colorado's 1,746 was the smallest. Texas drew the largest home crowd 9,672, and SMU the second largest, 9,547. Those were the only 9,000 or better crowds here.

The Roundup-"That Gerald Myers!" A&M Coach Shelby Metcalf exclaimed before last Saturday night's game. "He coaches just like he played. He's a real competitor." . . . . Ronnie Littleton got the kind of ovation reserved for All Americans Saturday night, but he hasn't signed yet . . . . Randy Prince, whose father, Jim, was a Silver Bat honoree during his pro baseball days, lost no time. He played against A&M Saturday night in the Coliseum, pitched against Arizona Monday afternoon . . . . 

Continued From Page One Yellowhouse Fork, where Loop 289 crosses the Yellowhouse Fork of the Brazos River; North Ford, northeast of Lubbock where U.S. Highway 82 crosses the North Fork of the Brazos; Avenue H, a storm sewer in northeast Lubbock, just south of the intersection of Avenue H and U.S. 82; 14th Street, a storm sewer near the intersection of 14th and Hickory Streets; 26th Street, a storm sewer fed rrom southeast and southwest portions of the city, discharging into Mae Simmons Park; and Water Reclamation, a site in east Lubbock at a creek crossing north of Lubbock's Southeast Water Reclamation Plant.

During the rain, water samples were collected at about 30 minute intervals for the first two hours. As the flow started to diminish, samples were taken every hour until the flow was negligible. Water samples were taken to a Texas Tech laboratory for study as soon as the runoff quit.

hydrogen ion concentration; the soluble phosphorus; nitrates; dissolved calcium; dissolved and absorbed mercury; the chemical oxygen demand or COD; the soluble salts; calcium carbonate, or hardness; total organiz solids; and suspended solids.

John Loudermilk, a chemist who is working on his master's degree in business administration, said the water quality got worse as runoff moved downstream.

The upstream sites which would flow into the first two of the series of lakes were the best, he said, and the 26th Street site was the worst.

The first two lake sites depend primarily upon agricultural runoff, Loudermilk said, and the others supplied depend upon urban runoff

The study showed that "acidity" and the mercury criteria exceeded standards for four lake sites. The nitrates, phosphorus, total organic solids and biological oxygen demand or BOD (estimated at 10 per cent of the chemical oxygen demand) exceeded acceptable levels for all six of the lake sites studied.

Loudermilk said he and research teammates believe additional studies are necessary to determine the source of pollutants.

"If sources are altered to reduce the pollutants," Loudermilk said, "not only would the Canyon Lakes within the city system be better protected but the results could contribute to improving the water quality of Buffalo Lake,"
