
A crisis is beginning to appear on the scene in the Wichita Falls area as far as publishing the "Times" is concerned.

EDUCATION FOR MARRIAGE A 'MUST' FOR STABILITY

When young couples start having babies soon after marriage, and before they've been able to establish stable relationships with each other, they are heading for marital shipwreck. This is what Prof. Ethel Nash, President of the American Association Marriage Counselors, told the Women's Medical News Service at a recent meeting.

Not only is the marriage endangered, but an atmosphere is created in the home in which the children feel neither wanted or understood.

What are the possible consequences for these children when they grow to adulthood? Professor Nash believes that "there is a very real danger that such unhappy family situations tend to perpetuate themselves. People whose own childhood and family relationships have been unsound, " she says, "tend to find marital partners with similar unfortunate backgrounds. Having no pattern of happy marriage to follow, being full of unresolved conflicts that originated in childhood s u c h couples are often quite unable to build stable marriages. The result is another generation of unhappy marriages, and unwanted children.....

Canthis cycle be broken? This is the sixtyfour dollar question... It can be according to Mrs. Nash, but only if we face up to the reasons behind the breakup of one in two teenage marriages within five years of the wedding date, and usually after the birth of one or more children.

One reason is faulty or inadequate education on human sexuality, conception control and family living. The marriage counselor points out that young people generally go for nursery school through college without being taught about the h u m a n reproductive system, sex drives, and differences between male and female sexuality.

Young people are surrounded by sexually stimulating ads, stories, movies, and TV shows, Mrs. Nash notes. They observe values which seem to place a higher worth on sexually attraction model or movie star than on any other person. "Is it any wonder," the marriage counselor asks, "that young people have faulty notions about what sex is, how and when it can be best expressed, how it can be guided and controlled to achieve maximum happiness.'

It was noted by Mrs. Nash that one sixth of all marriages, a n d one half to one third of all teenage marriages, take place with the girl pregnant at the marriage ceremony.

EDUCATION FOR MARRIAGE A 'MUST' FOR STABILITY

When young couples start having babies soon after marriage, and before they've been able to establish stable relationships with each other, they are heading for marital shipwreck. This is what Prof. Ethel Nash, President of the American Association Marriage Counselors, told the Women's Medical News Service at a recent meeting.

Not only is the marriage endangered, but an atmosphere is created in the home in which the children feel neither wanted or understood.

What are the possible consequences for these children when they grow to adulthood? Professor Nash believes that "there is a very real danger that such unhappy family situations tend to perpetuate themselves. People whose own childhood and family relationships have been unsound, " she says, "tend to find marital partners with similar unfortunate backgrounds. Having no pattern of happy marriage to follow, being full of unresolved conflicts that originated in childhood s u c h couples are often quite unable to build stable marriages. The result is another generation of unhappy marriages, and unwanted children.....

Canthis cycle be broken? This is the sixtyfour dollar question ... It can be according to Mrs.Nash, but only if we face up to the reasons behind the breakup of one in two teenage marriages within five years of the wedding date, and usually after the birth of one or more children.

One reason is faulty or inadequate education on human sexuality, conception control and family living. The marriage counselor points out that young people generally go for nursery school through college without being taught about the h u m a n reproductive system, sex drives, and differences between male and female sexuality.

Young people are surrounded by sexually stimulating ads, stories, movies, and TV shows, Mrs. Nash notes. They observe values which seem to place a higher worth on sexually attraction model or movie star than on any other person. "Is it any wonder," the marriage counselor asks, "that young people have faulty notions about what sex is, how and when it can be best expressed, how it can be guided and controlled to achieve maximum happiness."

It was noted by Mrs. Nash that one sixth of all marriages, a n d one half to one third of all teenage marriages, take place with the girl pregnant at the marriage ceremony.
