### U.S. Cash For Roads Ready Says Bureau

Texas Share Largest; Contracts To Be Let In January

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23. (AP)—State highway departments were notified today that their respective portions of the \$60,000,000 emergency highway construction appropriation is available immediately. The Texas share of the fund is \$5,000,000.

The federal aid money is to be apportioned today by Secretary Hyde. The action will make all of the \$60,000,000 available to the states for use in matching their federal aid appropriations, including those for the fiscal year 1932.

Captain C. D. Curtis, chief of the central of the bureau of public roads, pointed out that the extent that states have plans ready for work, the appropriation would mean nearly double that amount of \$120,000,000 of new highway construction.

He estimated more than one-half of the money would go directly to labor and that a large portion would go to labor indirectly. The amount of the federal aid which will be applied to the states will vary with the amount of work done in 1931. Within the limits of the emergency appropriation.

Captain Curtis said in informal talks with the states highway departments that the states may want to be prepared to accept the emergency appropriation together with a like amount of the federal money.

Who remembers "way back when" it was considered clever to pipe up during a conversation about shoes with something like, "Well, I admit I have a good understanding..."

This ally was usually greeted with shrill adolescent giggles of appreciation for a pair of adult approval.

The atrocious pun is all too frequently widely at variance with fact. A good understanding is a pair of healthy, well formed, strong feet, unmarred with some defect of corn or bunion or weak arches or distress of some kind.

One of the greatest mistakes—the greatest mis-understandings—of which woman-kind are guilty is that of wearing shoes that are too small.

And here goes up a hue and a cry. Mild persuasive protests of innocence. Vexatious denials. Argumentative brownings. It seems that the damsel does not live who judges even the tiniest bit on the size of her shoe. Oh dear no!

But ask any shoeman. He will tell you that from here to eternity there are number six feet wearing number five shoes, and number seven wearing size six.

Or at least a half size too small. All from the erroneous belief that a small foot is pretty. That is far from the truth. The beauty of the foot is its size in proportion to the size of the body.

A size five foot on a woman five feet and six inches tall and weighing a hundred and thirty pounds is a monstrosity. It is out of proportion. It amounts almost to disfigurement, as if hegin ears were the size of a twenty-five cent piece or her mouth an inch in diameter.

A foot that is crowded into a shoe that is too small is immediately ugly. It spills out over the top of the shoe. A precipice appears on top where the vamp ends. The design of the shoe is lost in a knobby bulge. It loses its shape.

The difference between a size six shoe and a size six and one-half is not perceptible to the observer. The shoe man himself has to look at the number in ink to know the difference. Yet that much difference in size will make the difference between hurting feet, threatened with corns, bunions, ingrown nails, blisters, a bad disposition and a happy smiling feet that go willingly on their way in comfort and beauty.

Bad disposition? Yes, indeed. Have you ever watched a poor dejected lady with size seven feet and size six shoes? The tortured nerves of the feet, pressed upon, constricted, bruised, told all the rest of the nerves about how they were being used; and the last one of them rebelled! That's how it happened!

And pretty soon the poor dear just HAS to burst out somewhere, and so she jumps on the butcher and the baker and scolds Johnny when Johnny hadn't been so bad after all, and won't let Pa smoke his pipe or read his paper in peace. Or maybe she takes it out in a good cry.

And her digestion gets had—it surely will if you do such things to the nervous system. And then Dinah gets her share of temper.

And she has headaches, and everybody has to be quiet, and special broth has to be made—or special strawberry tart! One of the chief nerve centers lies at the base of the brain, and when those nerves are in bad humor they HOWL!

And all because she would not—would NOT—have that number seven instead of the six and a half, or that B width instead of the A.

Incidentally, sizes six and a half and seven are quite average sizes these days. They sound huge, don't they? But really, the best people, my dear!






