
Church's Father Joseph Augustine of India, spoke of the camaraderie among Muleshoe churches and pastors.

Farm Bill

Q&A with Congressman Combest

Q. If I have not been in the farm program for the last few years, will I qualify for this new program?

A. Any acres that have been enrolled or certified in the farm program or certified as planted for at least one of the past five years will be eligible for the new farm program.

Q. How many acres can I enroll in the new program?

A. Basically, all of your base acres that you would have had as of this crop year under the old program will be allowed to be enrolled in the new program.

Q. Can I continue building base acres? A. No. The amount of contract acres that you enroll into the new program cannot be increased in future years.

Q. Can I reduce the amount of my acres in the farm program in future years?

A. Yes. You can permanently reduce the amount of acres in the farm program at signup or any time during the next seven years. However, you should thoroughly examine the amount of planting flexibility allowed under the new farm program before you make that decision to determine if it is in your best interest to do so (flexibility is discussed further in a later question).

Q. If I have been growing only one crop, can I enter all of my base acres into the new program and still plant all of my acres in that same crop?

Disciplinarian Jones earns regional award

Ronnie Jones, educator for 33 years and assistant principal at Watson Junior High School for the last 20, has been selected as the Region XVII Middle School Assistant Principal of the Year.

"Mr. Jones sets the standard for discipline in our school," said WJHS counselor Brian Arnold: "In a junior high setting, when discipline is in question, everything from academics to athletics is in question."

Jones has served under five principals at the school and has taught many of the adults Please see related story on page 3

in town. "I've lived here a long time and I know a lot of people. That can be a help in school," Jones said.

"Seeing that teachers and students can learn in a safe environment is my business," said Jones, who often visits with the parents and teachers of students who are on the verge of serious behavior problems.

Mainly, he likes to see students try to avoid problems rather than be punished as a result of them. "I ask them to talk to me if there is a problem before it leads to measures that require discipline."

"He's an encourager and a listener," Arnold said.

"He is sensitive to the needs of the students and treats each studentequitably," said WJHS principal Shelia Joyner. "The students don't mind the discipline when they know they're getting a fair shake."

Some of the situations that lead to discipline problems at the junior high level include words that cause hurt feelings, boy/girl relationship difficulties, and other conflicts between two people, Jones

MISD's discipline plan includes trips to the Student Adjustment Center for things like talking without permission constantly - and physical paddling with parental consent for certain offenses.

"We haven't had many fights at school since we started calling the police in on it," he said. Students involved in fights at the junior high school have to visit with the police and the municipal court judge and tive school on Main Street.

Jones has kept in shape for the last 20 years walking up


If I Could Fly

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



A. Yes. You can grow almost anything (except for some restrictions on fruits and vegetables) and get the same farm program benefits.

Q. What will my payment be based on if I have 3 different bases such as cotton, corn, and wheat?

A. The payment will be based on pre-set rates for each crop. For a farm with multiple crop acreage bases entered into the new program (as contract

acres), the applicable payment

rate for each crop should be multiplied by the payment yield and 85 percent of the contract acres attributable to each crop.

Once you have signed into the new program, your total "contract payment" benefits for

the seven year period could be approximated (there could still be some small change in the

exact payment rate over the years because of the effect of changes in farming operations around the country).

Changes in market prices or your level of production of various crops will not affect your contract payments.

Ronnie Jones, assistant principal at Watson Junior High School and an ex-history teacher, says he became interested in movies and history while growing up near Hollis, Okla.

"On Saturdays, my friends and I went to the movies at both theaters in Hollis. They liked the movies, I loved them," he said.

Years ago, Jones started collecting one-sheet and halfsheet movie posters of old B-Western movies. He also has scene cards, title cards, lobby cards, movie stills and other memorabilia lining the walls of his trailer house in Mule-

He is always interested in old theaters being torn down, because collectors' items often are thrown away when people don't realize their value.

A historian in his own right, Jones has written a book called Saturday's Heroes about the life and movies of Allan Rocky Lane. Lane was a B-Western movie star of the 1940s and early 1950s, who later became the TV voice of Mr. Ed, the talking horse.

Jones has a work in progress about Charles Starrett (the Durango Kid), who was a B-Western star from 1935 to 1952.

Jones has shared his collection of Alamo movies, John Wayne and Harry Truman books, A and B Westerns, serials and other movie memorabilia with the public on television stations in Dallas, Lubbock, Portales and Muleshoe's Channel 6.

One of his favorite movies is Trail of Robin Hood, starring many of his favorite Western movie stars.

His favorite Western star is "probably John Wayne, bût many others run a close second," Jones said.


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
"Father Joe" said he was admitting in "public confession" that he is concerned that people might not understand his Indian accent, especially when he is speaking Spanish.

Eagle earns Embry 2-3A title

MHS golfers earn sixth consecutive trip to Regionals

Through 12 holes, Kyle Embry was surviving a so-so round and the brutal cold that hovered near-freezing Friday morning in his showdown with Justin Payne of Floydada for the District 2-3A title Friday in the third and final round at Muleshoe Country Club.

Embry and the weather warmed up at 13, when the Muleshoe junior used a friendly wind to card an eagle 3 on the par-5, 450-yard hole, Embry hit a down-wind 200-yard 5 iron to within 30 feet. Embry, trailing by two strokes at the time, made the putt while Payne stumbled with a double-bogey 7. The four-stroke swing gave Embry the lead for good. Embry finished with an 80 and a three-round total of 243. Payne shot an 82-245.

"That's what got me started," said Embry, who like most of the other golfers, wore gloves throughout the round. "I just played steady after that."

Muleshoe won the team title handily, earning its sixth-straight trip the Region I tournament at ing second behind Friona. Littlefield had shaved Ratliff Country Club in Odessa April 22-23. The top two teams from regional advance to the state tournament.

'That's the best we played ally season," MHS girls coach Robin Welch said. "They were hitting shots in the tournament that they hadn't hit all season."



Death Need Not Be the **Final Word**

I'm told that a feature article appeared in a newspaper several years ago with this headline: "Here's a Profession That Used the Last Word." The article was about a professional stone-cutter in Canada who over the years has chiseled out hundreds of epitaphs for gravestones.

"His tools," the article explained, "are hammer, chisel, words from the Bible and the great poets, or whatever people may order inscribed on a gravestone." "Nowadays," the craftsman reported, "most people are very brief-not more than four or five words, and usually I have to help them find those."

It's a shame that most cemetery headstones now are the small, flat headstones with no real room for anything but a name and a date. An epitaph can say a lot!

Some are humorous. Supposedly somewhere there really is an epitaph that goes like this: "I knew if I stayed around long enough something like this would happen." And, in a similar vein, another one is purported to simply say, "I told you I was sick."

Some are well-written and make powerful points. I've always liked the inscription Benjamin Franklin is said to have penned for his own tombstone: "The Body of / B. Franklin, / Printer; / Like the Cover of an old Book. / Its Contents torn out, / And stript of its Lettering and Gilding / Lies here, Food for Worms. / But the Work shall not be wholly lost: / For it will, as he believ'd, appear once more, / In a new and more perfect Edition, / Corrected and amended / By the Author." I like that!

I will never forget the painfilled, despairing words I saw etched in the cold stone bearing witness to the tragic death of a 16year-old girl and the utter despair of grief-stricken parents who had buried their hopes with their daughter: "Oh, God, why?" Certainly, the Father who listened in agony as His own Son cried out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" would not blame them for their asking.

An epitaph can be a very poignant-or pithy-final word. But, since the final word at Jesus' tomb was this: "He is not here; He is risen!", the Easter hope shared by all who wear the name of the living Lord is that death itself need never be the final


