## R. J. & Octavia Givens, Husband & Wife, Honored By Texas Tech Black Faculty & Staff

With the theme, "Uniting to Stop the Violence in our African American Community, Our Country, and Our World," at the Annual Black History Month Celebration at the Texas Tech University School of Law, on Saturday evening, February 2, 2013, R. J. Givens, Jr. and Octavia Middleton-Givens, husband and wife, were honored as Outstanding Businesspersons of the Black Community.

This special recognition was sponsored by the Black Faculty and Staff of Texas Tech Univer-

Keynote speaker was Mr. Brandale Randolph, Executive Director of Project Poverty & Curator of Lubbock, reminded those in attendance of our responsibility as citizens of the community. "It takes all of us working together for something positive to really happen," he said. "Working together, we can deal with the crime which happens in the community," he continued.

R. J. attended Lubbock Public Schools, and graduated from Dunbar High School. He also graduated from Hutson-Tillotson University in Austin, Texas with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration. He is a member of Omega Psi Grande Consistory Number 24.

R. J. has owned and operated Givens Real Estate Agency for 40 years. He became the first Black to join the Lubbock Board of Realtors and is a member of a Multiple Listing Service. Over the years, many individuals have worked as agents for Givens Agency, with many others employed in clerical positions, including college students. Givens-Agency was the stepping stone for his son, Ron, to become the first Black Republican in over 102 years to serve as State Representative in the Texas Legisla-

R. J. retired from the Lubbock Postal Office with 32 years of service. He was the first Black to sit on the Lubbock Avalanche Journal Editorial Board, was an Equal Opportunity Counselor for the Lubbock Region Postal Workers, and served as President of the Postal Workers Union.

R. J. has served on various community and city committees and is a Deacon at New Hope Baptist Church.

Octavia is a graduate of Dunbar High School, and of Peoples Business College in Austin,

Phi Fraternity, Inc. and was Texas. She became the first President of his class. He is a 33 Black cashier for Starks Broth-Degree Mason of the Rio ers Grocery in Austin, which opened the door for others to follow. Upon her return to Lubbock, she worked as the Secretary at Wheatley Elementary School.

In 1965, she became the first Black to serve as a cashier for Southwestern Public Service, now known as Excel Energy. In 1970, she became the first Black female Realtor with the Lubbock Association of Realtors which provided access to the West Lubbock Real Estate Market. In 1974, she opened Givens Employment Agency, a State License Private Employment Agency which allowed her to place individuals with State Government, Southwestern Bell, IBM, and several other businesses. She was associated with both National and Local Private Employment Agencies.

Octavia assisted in the formation of the Lubbock Black Chamber of Entrepreneurs. The Chamber was organized to aid and assist minority businesses to be competitive in the modern market place.

She is a member of New Hope Baptist Church, is involved with the Board of Deaconesses, Usher Board, multiple church committees, and is a member of the State and National Lubbock Association of Realtors.

R. J. and Octavia were childhood sweethearts. They are parents of Ron Givens and Cheryl Givens- ens-Wiley, several grandchildren, and greatgrandchildren.

#### Henry Dewberry Proud To Be **Black Businessman In Lubbock**

One of the many proud Black businessmen in Lubbock is Henry Dewberry, who is owner and operator of Dewberry Appliance Service, 8511 Valanca Avenue. "It is just great to have an opportunity of being a Black businessman in Lubbock," says Dewberry.

Dewberry Appliance Service March of was opened 1959, and is the only Black owned appliance businesses in Lubbock and surrounding

He will tell you he worked on speed appliances, and he decided he needed to go into business for his self so he could make some money, and at the same time help others.

"It wasn't hard to establish this business. I had my mind already made up before I entered this business. I was just determined," he said.

There have been some difficult times, but said, "You must hang in there and never give up. Put it in the hands of God, and continue to your very best! He'll be there for you!"

Mr. Dewberry enjoys working on various appliances. "I work on washing machines, dryers, gas and electric stoves," he continues.

In your opinion, Mr. Dewberry, is there room for more Black businesses in Lubbock? "Yes, there is room for more Black businesses in Lubbock!"

"In Lubbock, there are a lot young Black people who have a lot of talent. They need to know what they can do and become willing to work hard in order to be successful. When you go into business, please be reliable in the business you have established," he said.

He will tell any young person entering business, "You must be responsible in what you say and do. In other words, just be truthful in what you do. You must be honest in all your transactions, no matter what the outcome may be," he said.

When asked what kind of problems has he encountered while in business? He said, "I have been encountered with people wanting credit and some have been slow about honoring their commitment," he made known. "There are those who will want to beat you down about the price should be. But you as a business person must stand tall and continue to do what is right," he continued

Mr. Dewberry says he sees more Blacks wanting to enter business, and I think this is great. But I warn them to not be in a hurry, just have pa-

"Over the years, I've learned all could about the appliance business, and this been a tremendous help for me," he said. "I will always stand behind the work I do. This is very true when it comes to selling appliances to my customers. You see, I didn't want to put merchandise in my customers' home that I don't want in my home. I just don't want to sell anyone something I wouldn't want for my house," continued Mr. Dew-

When asked what are plans for 2013, he said, "I want to get more business in year of 2013, which will enhance the financial posture of my business, so it will help my family and community," he concluded.

He is married to Mamie Dewberry, a retired teacher in the Lubbock Independent School District. They are parents of two boys and four girls.





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
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#### SPC to host Black History Month event on February 26

LEVELLAND - Quincy White, Lubbock's assistant City Manager, will deliver the keynote address during South Plains College's Black History program, "Reaching Back and Moving Forward," slated for 6:30 p.m. on Feb. 26 (Tuesday) in the Sundown Room.

Admission is free and the public is invited to attend. Refreshments will be served.

"I think it's necessary to celebrate the legacy of those who have come before us and left footprints for us to follow," said Maria Lopez-Strong, Diversity Coordinator for SPC. This event reminds us of the struggles of our leaders and their sacrifice should never be forgotten."

The evening will feature musical entertainment by the King Sisters, a skit featuring the fourth grade class of Ruby Brackens of Levelland ISD and the keynote address by White.

White is a Lubbock native and a 1965 graduate of Dunbar High School. He attended Prairie View A&M University and Wenatchee Valley College. Hired by the Xerox Corporation in 1973, he spent 11 years with the company. In 1990, White returned to Lubbock where he began his public sector career. He served as Drug Elimination Program Coordinator and Executive Director of the Lubbock Housing Authority, Executive Director of the Lubbock Black Chamber of Commerce, Youth Services Coordinator and Assistant Director Human Resources. Delta Sigma Theta Sorority named White its 2003 Man of the Year and the Lubbock Black Chamber of Commerce honored him for his commitment and involvement in the Lubbock community.

The annual presentation of the Spirit of Martin Luther King, Jr. Award will be given to Dr. Sharon Bogener, professor of History and Government at SPC, and Mary Nell Leaks of Workforce Solutions in Littlefield.

13, 2013 at First Baptist Church.


Interment followed at Peaceful Gardens Memorial Park under the direction of Griffin Mortuary & Funeral Home of Lubbock.



From the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith "A Defender Of The Poor, Dies At 103!"

An article by Douglas Martin that was emailed to me by one of my friends caught my attention. The caption was "James R. Dumpson, a Defender of the Poor Dies-at 103."

Mr. Dumpson was described as the first black welfare commissioner in the "nation's history and the first social worker to oversee welfare in New York when Mayor Robert Wager appointed him in 1959.

The writer noted soon afterward his appointment he made known his views about welfare in response to an editorial in the Daily News, which asserted, "Ladies have babies by assorted gentlemen so as to keep the relief checks growing fatter each year."

Mr. Dumpson said the only test for public assistance was a citizen's need, not morals. With only a few exceptions—and he acknowledged there were exceptions-people on welfare, particularly children, desperately needed the support, he said. He argued that virtually every adult would rather work and that most considered employment as element of personal dignity. "There's no comfort in living on subsistence level," Mr. Dump-

son said. "There's no comfort in constantly having to establish eligibility. No comfort in the necessary intrusions into your private life to find out if you qualify for assistance."

He also spoke on the national stage. In 1964, when Senator Barry M. Gold water of Arizona, who would soon be the Republican presidential nominee, suggested that welfare recipients were lazy, Mr. Dumpson said such statements had "no place in the kind of war on poverty I am advocating." He called Mr. Goldwater "the wealthy cowboy" without mentioning him by name.


Besides Mr. Wagner, Mr. Dumpson held high posts under Mayors John V. Lindsay, Abraham D. Beame, Edward I. Kock and David N. Dinkins. He was the second black commissioner in New York City government. (The first was Arthur Ford, whom Mr. Wagner appointed commissioner of water supply, gas and electricity in 1954.) And he was the first black dean of a nonblack school of social work, at Fordham University. Mr. Dinkins, who appointed Mr. Dumpson to two cabinet posi-

fluenced the city's antipoverty polities for more than a half century. "We don't realize what history is being made until later," Mr. Dinkins said. "We look back on it and now and say, 'Damn, he was a hell of a cat'-and indeed he was."

Worried about welfare costs, Mr. Dumpson strived to combat welfare fraud. In 1975, as administrator of the city's Human Resources Administration in Beame's administration, he set up a computer system to ferret out welfare recipients who were on city and state payrolls or receiving unemployment benefits. He eliminated 2,599 people from the welfare rolls.

James Russell Dumpson was born on April 5, 1909, in an area of Philadelphia known as Hell's Half-Acre. His father was a bank messenger, and his mother, who had been a teacher before marriage, pushed her five children to get an education.

To finance his own education, at several colleges, Mr. Dumpson worked summers as a waiter in a hotel in Cape May, N.J. He earned a bachelor's and master's degrees from the New School in Manhattan. Afterward he taught

He was 40 years of age, and his wife was Great-Great-Grandmother Alice Jackson. She was 30 years of age. Their first child was our Great-Grandmother Millie Jackson. She was 9 years of age. She's the Mother of our Grandmother Mama Susie, and Papa Bill's wife of who we know, and on line 35. Papa and Grandma Alice had other children; namely, a Daughter, Lois, 8 years old; a son, Henry, age 2 years of age; and a son, Fulip, one years old. Also in Date!

the house was a nephew named

Then I was Blessed to find that on April 18, 1910, Great-Great-Grandmother Alice Jackson who was living with a family named Hill. She was a Boarder. She was the Mother of 11 Children, and 7 were living at that time.

Then in 1900, Page 3, the Lord Blessed Me to find Great-Grandmother Mattie Tate's side of the Family. There is also Great-Great-Grandfather Bille Tate. He was 56 years of age. His wife is Great-Grandmother Cynthia Tate. She was 5 years of age. Their son' name is John W was 28 years of age. Also another Don, Vincent G., age 20, Son, Ollie, age 14; Daughter,, Willie, age 13; Son, Lovie, age 10; Daughter, Joe, age 8. And for some reason, we have found Our Grandfather Bill. 

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

# In Cinque

This is a new year in a new millennium and just when we get the idea that things are looking up, especially during Black History Month, shortly after the second inauguration of the first United States President of color, we find that a very crude and rude awakening occurs. I could not believe the news that someone had the audacity to slap a nineteen month old baby on an airplane.

According to the ABC News, the child Jonah Bennett who was in his mother's arms starting crying because of the pressure in his ears, according to his mother and the stranger, a 60 year old man who was occupying the seat next to her, allegedly told the mother to "Shut that n-word baby up." He was supposedly so drunk until when she asked him what he had said, that he fell onto her face to tell her directly into her ear, what he had said, then smacked Jonah.

The 'smack' allegedly left the child's eye swollen and bleeding, causing his mother to be 'scared to death.' According to the report another male passenger in another row of seats heard the derogatory language and witnessed the slapping of the child. The perpetrator, one Joe Hundley is the president of an aircraft parts company in Idaho and he has been charged with assault in an Atlanta federal court. His attorney has promised that he would be pleading not guilty.

A crime committed in an airplane is a federal crime. Slapping a baby anywhere, should be a federal crime. Slapping a baby of color by an individual of another ethnic group because he is of color should be a crime of hate. The way I see it, this individual should be charged with at least three crimes: slapping a baby; slapping a baby in an airplane and slapping a baby because he is Black.

Further, it should be illegal to board an airplane while intoxicated, as I recall there is a limit to the number of drinks one can have which are purchased on a plane. Those two are allegedly not enough to become inebriated if consumed on the airplane if one was sober when boarding the plane. It appears that inebriation is more lethal than firearms at this point. While scanning for contraband, there needs to be a mechanism to scan for inebriation when boarding a plane. Sitting next to a drunk on a plane is bad enough without being assaulted by one. Sitting in front of one can be a problem.

I recall being banged in the head by a drunk who was in the seat directly behind me from Chicago to Memphis one holiday. I thought a child was playing and hitting me to discover that it was a female who was drunk and should have deplaned in St. Louis. She had to be taken off the plane on a stretcher. It was a relief.

Alcohol and Drunks is not my cup of tea. I have no statistics, but I feel certain that way too many unpleasant occurrences are the results of the use of alcohol by someone who does not know his limits and should not indulge. It is like hatred, passing laws against it does not cause it to end. Let us get 'in cinque' and pray for more help and education for those individuals and groups who are not aware of their limits.

#### 15-Year Old Girl Killed in Chicago After Performing At President Obama's Inauguration

Hadiya Pendleton, a 15-yearold girl who performed at Presi-Obama's inauguration, was shot and killed in Chicago as she talked with her friends. Witnesses say she and her friends were in a park when suddenly a man opened fire on the group, and Hadiya was shot in the back as she tried to escape. Witnesses believe she was mistaken for the wrong person.

Her father, Nathaniel Pendleton, spoke at a news conference that was held in the same park where his daughter died. He commented, "He took the light of my life." Then speaking directly to the killer, he said: "Look at yourself, just know that you took a bright person, an innocent person, a non-violent person."

Hadiya was indeed a bright person. She was an honor student, a contributor to her community, and ironically, a spokesman against gang violence. In 2008, she was featured in a YouTube public service announcement against gang activity. The family and the Chicago police are offering an \$11,000 reward for information about the gunman
