

Employers add 3,800 Jobs in Lubbock MSA Year Ends with Positive Annual Change of 2.9 Percent

Statistical Area (MSA)* ended the year in December 2013 with the addition of 3,800 total nonfarm jobs for an annual growth rate of 2.9%.

The Lubbock MSA unemployment rate continued to decrease from 4.5 to 4.3 percent over the last month. It re-mained below the national unemployment rate of 6.5 percent and the state's rate of 5.6 percent.

Over the month, Trade, Transportation, and Utilities continued adding jobs in the Lubbock MSA with the addi-tion of 400 jobs. The industry expanded 1,100 over the year, more jobs

The Lubbock Metropolitan added than any other major industry in the area. The greatest percentage growth by any industry over the year was Professional and Business Services, reporting an annual change of 6.3 percent.

> "It is a positive sign for our area's economy that eight out of ten major industries added jobs over the year, and that our unemployment rates have continued to fall, and remain well below the state and national rates," said Workforce Solutions South Plains CEO Martin Aguirre.

> Texas industry growth rates reflect the Lubbock MSA area and reported Trade, Transportation,

and Utilities ex-panded by 8,100 positions over the last month, more jobs added than any other major industry in Texas. This industry also added more jobs over the last year-68,200- than any other major industry, and had an annual growth rate of 3.1 percent.

"Our year certainly ended on a positive note, with private-sector employers adding 243,200 jobs over the year, and 18,900 jobs in December," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Hope Andrade. "It is another positive sign that Texas is a top choice for business."

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History and Literature Week in 1920. In 1926, Woodson changed the name to Negro History Week. He selected the month of February for the celebration as a way to honor of the birth of two men whose actions drastically altered the future of black Americans. Abraham Lincoln, the U.S. President who isthe Emancipation Proclamation was born on February 12th and Frederick Douglass, one of the nation's leading abolitionists was born on Febru-

Dr. Carter G. Woodson died in 1950, but his legacy continued on as the celebration of Negro History Week was adopted by cities and organizations across the country. This observance proved especially

important during the Civil Rights Movement of the 1950s and 1960s, a time when the inhumane and unequal treatment of black people in America was being challenged and overturned. Black Panther Badge: Power to the People The Black Power Movement of the 1970s emphasized racial pride and the significance of collective cultural values. This prompted the ASNLH, now called the Association for the Study of African American Life and History, to change Negro History Week to Black History Week. In 1976, they extended the week to a month-long observance.

Black History Month is now recognized and widely celebrated by the entire nation on both a scholarly and commercial level. The Association for the Study of African American Life and History continues to promote, preserve and research black history and culture year-
