There were an estimated 400 people in attendance this year.


There were bounce houses, games, hot dogs and drinks. Bags filled with library information, school supplies, books, coloring books, toys and candy were given away.





Dr. Conrad Murray, Michael Jackson's Doctor, To Be Released Early From Prison

Dr. Conrad Murray, the former doctor of pop star Michael Jackson, will be released from a Los Angeles County Jail on October 28th, three years ahead of schedule. A source close to the Jackson family says they are "devastated" that he is getting an early release.

In November 2011, Murray was sentence to four years in prison on involuntary manslaughter charges. In 2009, he allegedly gave Jackson a fatal overdose of Propofol, a sleeping anesthetic, to help him prepare for his "This is It" comeback tour.

So just why is Murray getting out early? According to legal analysts, Murray is receiving an early release because of good behavior and a overfilled jail system. "He has been a model inmate and the authorities have

granted him an early release due to that good behavior and theovercrowded California jail system," comments a friend of his.

Regarding the early release.

Michael's mother Katherine Jackson, commented, "It is not right I will never be able to see my son again, while his mother can see him."



From the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith **NAACP Mourns Death Of** William (Bill) Lynch, Jr.!!

New York, New York -The NAACP mourns the loss of civil rights leader and New York City political adviser William (Bill) Lynch, Jr. Lynch was a mentor and adviser to many prominent politicians and causes in New York City and across the nation, including many leaders in the NAACP. He passed away Friday afternoon.

"Bill Lynch always embodied the spirit of the NAACP," stated NAACP Chairman Roslyn M. Brock. "He was a tireless worker, dedicated to social justice, and never sought the spotlight. He will truly be missed, but his legacy lives on in the many young organizers and activists he mentored."

"Bill was the godfather of the black organizers in the civil and human rights movement in the United States. He was also my stated personal mentor," NAACP President and CEO Benjamin Todd Jealous. "In the fifteen years I knew Bill, there was not a single major decision I made that I did not consult him on. He was a leader's leader, the one to whose judgment we all deferred.

"He made David Dinkins the first black mayor of New York City, David Patterson the first black governor of New York, and paved the way for the first black president of the United States," added Jealous. "He played an immeasurable role in fostering the spirit of cooperation that defines the relationships between major civil rights leaders and between the civil rights movement and the labor movement. Bill may have been the greatest living organizer still active in our times."

"Not many men would embrace a young street kid that never graduated college but believed he could change the world," stated NAACP Region 2 Director Marvin Bing, "Bill was like a father I never had, he believed in me when many laughed. He walked me through my mistakes and gave me confidence. He always said keep organizing and be true to the community. I will spend many nights crying but I will do my best to live up to the Rumpled Genius mission - to bring economic justice and social change to people and places where they

never believed they had a chance. I will always love him and remember him."

"This is a sad day, not just for the Lynch family but for me and for the country as a whole," stated NAACP New York State Conference President Hazel Dukes. "Bill's political advice and wisdom has reached across this nation. He was a compassionate, visionary individual who leaves a void for us in the community, but we will continue to carry on his legacy by doing the things he taught us."

Lynch spent several decades advising political candidates and mentoring young organizers in New York City. Some of his clients have included Nelson Mandela, Dinkins and Patterson. During the 1990's he served in Mayor Dinkins' cabinet as Deputy Mayor for Intergovernmental Relations. In 1999, he founded the political consulting firm Bill Lynch Associates, LLC (BLA), where he has served as chairman since its founding. In 2013 the NAACP created an award in his honor.





In Cinque

I know that there are not many people around who can remember the 'good ole days' when you went to the doctor and if you were really very sick, he would give you a prescription unless he was like my childhood doctor who would take an envelope and cut it into four parts and put the pills he wanted you to take in that corner pocket. If you needed a liquid medicine, he mixed it up and put it in a bottle which you had to wash and return to him when you were better. Of course this same doctor made house calls. If you were too ill to visit his office, someone will let him know and he came to see you. You did not have any insurance and he usually charged three or four dollars and your parents paid him when they could. Some patients paid the doctor in kind with food items or whatever valuable item they could part with.

Things are vastly different now with the advent of technology, pharmaceutical companies wooing doctors and insurance companies making the law. The situation is now beyond ridiculous. It is good though that because of technology, more doctors are having fewer mistakes to bury. We are aware however, that those free samples of medicines which we are given are the fruits of the pharmaceutical companies wooing our doctors. Sometimes we have to wait to see the doctor because of office time spent with company representatives.

Most medicines are very expensive and often when a less expensive one is available, we get the prescription for the brand named which often cost twice as much as the generic substance.

Truth is that the insurance companies decide which drugs you can have and how long you can

When it comes to our health, the insurance companies have the last word. With the advent of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act which will take effect on October 1, 2013 unless there is derailment somewhere along the way some things will change. This program is often referred to as Obamacare. It promises subsidized insurance for everyone who is unable to afford health insurance and as a result some of the largest insurance companies are refusing to sell insurance to individuals and will cater only to

The program sounds as if it will definitely be rewarding to those individuals who are not now insured for any number of reasons. There is great opposition to it being instrumented in a timely manner by the opponents of the program who are not interested in everyone having insurance to cover medical problems and upkeep for many political as well as economic reasons. We used to think in terms of single, double and triple digit dollars for medical services, but now a thousand dollars is common. A dentist wants a hundred dollars to verify that you have or do not have teeth. Getting an examination is likely to be a couple hundred of dollars. A routine visit to your primary doctor can cost a thousand of more when our co-pay is now about what a regular visit used to cost. It is time for us to get 'In cinque' and discover what Obamacare' is really about and how it will impact our lives.


America's ugly secrets begin with the untold histories and lies like Columbus discovering America -- not only did he not discover America, according to




