Preventable Hunger in **Our Land of Plenty!**

While many American families gather around the Thanksgiving table this week, some of us combining this year's traditional dinners with Hanukkah feasts, a too quiet group will be left out of the national celebration. The nearly 49 million Americans-including nearly 16 million children-living in food insecure households will be struggling to afford the food they need. These families won't be choosing between apple or pumpkin pie this holiday season but will face choices about paying for groceries or rent, heat, electricity, medicine or clothing for their children as they do each month-choices no family should have to make in our nation with the largest Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in the world. Congress will be choosing how many of these desperate families and children in need to cut from life-giving and life-sustaining federal nutrition programs. In the middle of this season of gratitude for plenty, Congress has put the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, often called food stamps) on the chopping block while leaving largely intact subsidies for rich farmers and even some non-farmers. With the decision deadline just weeks away Congress is working to bridge the gap between two dramatically different Farm Bill proposals which both include unjust funding cuts for SNAP. The Senate Bill cuts \$4 billion from SNAP over 10 years while the House bill slashes more than \$40 billion-denying food to as many as six million people, including children, seniors, and veterans. The House proposal would also drop 210,000 children from school meals and cost our economy 55,000 jobs in the first year alone. Any agreed upon Farm Bill cuts to the already meager SNAP food benefits will come on top of the \$11 billion cut over the next three years that already began on November 1st and affected every single SNAP recipient. This recent cut was equivalent to a week's worth of meals for a nine-year-old. SNAP benefits now average a mere \$1.40 per person per meal. Imagine preparing your family Thanksgiving meal on that budget.





A Tax Debate Should Embrace Facts, Jettison Rhetoric



This is in response to a recent article by Congressman Charlie Rangel entitled "We Ain't Broke".

It wasn't the first time that incendiary campaign-style rhetoric attempted such a bold masquerade as public policy prescription. Nor was it the first instance of extensive "economic data" being manufactured out of proverbial "whole cloth." This IS Washington, after all.

Neither is it rare for a Congressional staffer to pen a piece in his boss's name. And, certainly, America's oil and gas industry - daily derided as "Big Oil" - couldn't have been shocked to once again find itself maligned in the furtherance of some political operative's ideological agenda. Nope.

The only surprise inherent in, "We Ain't Broke," the error-riddled oil industry hit-piece that recently ran in some papers, was the caliber of the elected official to whom it was attributed: the esteemed Charlie Rangel. Few in Washington can lay claim to a public service career that rivals Charlie Rangel's. A combat-wounded Korean War veteran, Charlie Rangel earned a law degree, counseled pioneering civil rights activists, marched on Selma, was appointed Assistant U.S. Attorney under Bobby Kennedy, challenged a well-known and powerful incumbent and won election to Congress with a bipartisan 88 percent of the vote -

and, once there - became a founding member of the Congressional Black Caucus. All this before his 32nd birthday.

Charlie Rangel is now the third-longest currently serving member of the U.S. House of Representatives, having devoted 43 consecutive years of his life to his constituents' concerns.

He is universally regarded as smart, charming, and likeable. And, with a seat on the powerful Ways and Means Committee since 1975 - chairing or serving as the ranking member for nearly 14 years - as well as experience at the helm of the Joint Committee on Taxation, Charlie Rangel is also a bona fide authority on the Federal budget, a man thoroughly versed in even the most intricate details of U.S. tax-code minutia. Which is why it was impossible to reconcile the man with the article to which his name was affixed.

If the congressional staffer responsible for writing the piece in Congressman Rangel's name still has a job - and in this market, he should count himself fortunate for it - a crash-course in economics and current tax law is definitely in order. Especially considering that 2014 will feature a long anticipated overhaul of America's bloated, arbitrarily punitive, and counter-productive

A western Pennsylvania man, DeWayne Calloway, has been acquitted of all charges he faced for allegedly conspiring with a mother Shana Brown, to drug, rape and impregnate her 13year-old daughter.

The girl's 34-year-old mother pleaded guilty to criminal conspiracy and other charges last month and agreed to testify against DeWayne Calloway, her sexual partner at the time. Calloway took the stand to deny her the man tried to assault her, but she awoke and fought off Calloway.

Pastor Accused Of Spreading HIV Takes Witness Stand

The trial for Pastor Craig Lamar Davis (pictured), who was arrested back in 2012 and charged with reckless conduct for allegedly knowing he had HIV and spreading it to several of his congregants, continues in Clayton County, Ga. On Thursday, Davis was placed on the stand to testify in front of jurors, according to CBS Atlanta.

The preacher, who testified he was diagnosed with the virus that causes AIDS back in 2005, reportedly denied having an unprotected sexual tryst with one of two women. According to Davis, he told the unidentified woman about his HIV status. The woman, on the other hand, insists that Davis is lying, because she never knew he was infected with the virus.

One of his other alleged victims, Ronita McAfee, who claimed she even had sex with Davis at his marital residence at the time, revealed to the court the many alleged details of their affair. McAfee also testified that she never knew about Davis' HIV status but learned a year after their affair that she, too, had contracted the virus.

with McAfee, though. He also claimed that the woman is unbalanced, telling jurors, "When I found out how crazy she was, I cut her off on my Facebook page."

John Turner, Davis' attorney, told jurors the state can't prove that the alleged sexual encounter between his client and McAfee occurred, "It's his [Davis] word against her word," Turner said. The attorney also told jurors McAfee is delusional about her relationship with Davis stating, "In fact what I'm going to show you and the evidence is going to show you that the woman is a nutcase."

Turner also made a brow-raising statement in the courtroom even after his client had already openly admitted to his HIV status and treatment process for it, you are still going to have birth-"When they tell you that he days, need school clothes, hair that African Americans love. tested positive for HIV. What that means is that there is an assumption that he is HIV-positive. There is no test that can measure that on the face of this earth."


