The man on Avenue "A" believes that things are going to get better before they get any worst....

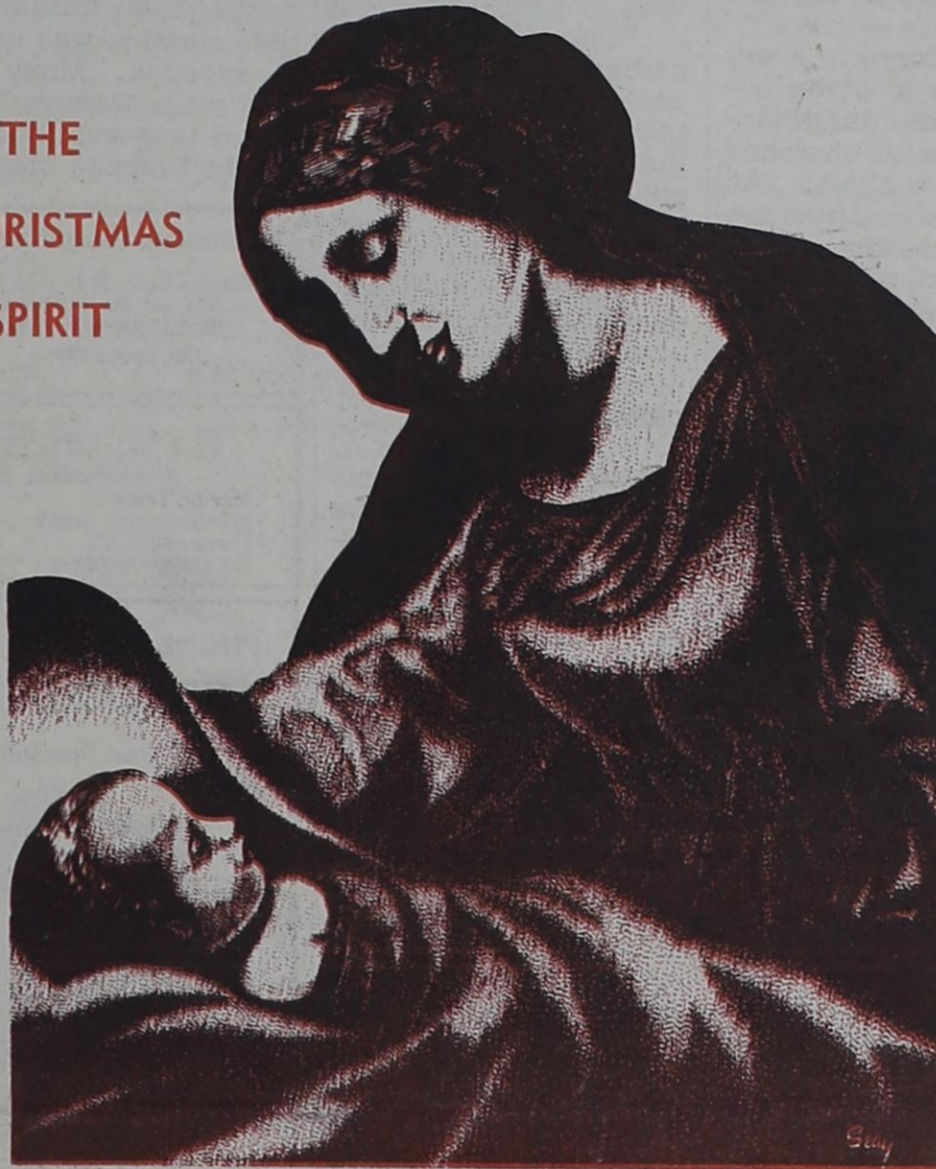

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A SAFE AND HAPPY HOLIDAY

To the very young, Christmas is a time of bright little lights on a tree, of shiny glass ornaments and decorations, of filmy spun glass filaments, and of toys that have sharp, rough edges, and lots of candy, nuts and other rich edibles. All of this is part of Christmas . . . and this is fine—but a few precautions should be taken to insure a safe holiday.

Old strings of lights for the Christmas tree should be examined carefully. If worn-out bulbs are discarded, they should be put where youngsters can't get to them.

Glass ornaments and glass "angel hair" should be kept out of baby's reach. The ornaments crumble readily into sharp slivers.

Most manufacturers now avoid lead-based paint, but be sure the toys that come into your home do not bring the threat of lead poisoning when a child chews on the toy.

Select toys with a minimum

of sharp edges and avoid toys constructed of materials which are quick to burn—and see that the toys are large enough so that baby can't swallow them.



How do you remove Christmas stains? The best trick to remember is to work fast. Don't let the stain set in the fabric. Even a short delay can be disastrous.

Following are directions for treating washable fabrics to remove the stains you will most probably encounter during the holidays.

Ballpoint ink — use carbon tetrachloride to remove the stains. Soak in warm soap or detergent suds, then wash and rinse in clear water. If discoloration remains on white or bleached material, use a mild bleach and launder again.

Candle wax — scrape off excess wax with a table knife. Place stained spot between blotters (white) and press with hot iron. Then rub spot gently with turpentine and wash in warm suds.

Glue — soak in warm suds until dissolved; then launder in fresh warm suds.

Chocolate or cocoa — wash in hot suds. Treat any remaining stain with a weak solution of household bleach or hydrogen peroxide and launder again in hot suds.

Meat juices — soak in cool water; then wash in hot suds.

Gravy and white sauce — soak in cool water then wash in hot suds.

Paint — if fresh, use lots of suds. Otherwise, apply turpentine or kerosene and then wash in hot suds.

Alcoholic beverages — soak or sponge with cool water promptly; then wash in warm suds.



Eggnog's popularity is such that at Christmas and New Year's, the drink can be found in nearly every average American home.

It is generally believed that Eggnog came to us from the Old English sack-posset, a hot drink which contains the same ingredients — milk, eggs, sugar and nutmeg. No one really knows who invented Eggnog. Researchers just say that it goes 'way, way back and like Topsy it "grewed and grewed."

The flavorful taste of Eggnog is not the only reason for the drink's popularity. Eggnog is easy to make, it goes a long way, and it allows the hostess to have as much fun as anybody else without having to worry about the guests. Eggnog is a serve-yourself drink, and most folks seem to prefer to fill their cup themselves.

Eggnog is flexible. That is, you can make a lot of it in one batch if you've got a large enough punch bowl and your refrigerator is particularly spacious. On the other hand, Eggnog can be made in smaller quantities — which are equally delightful and flavorsome.

A typical recipe would include:

Beat egg yolks and sugar until thick and lemon-colored. Beat in cream, milk, salt, and vanilla. Beat egg whites until they hold stiff peaks; fold into egg yolk mixture. Served in chilled punch bowl; sprinkle with nutmeg. (Makes 2 1/2 quarts.)

Allow eggnog to warm to room temperature. Drain fruit cocktail; spoon 1 cup fruit into 9-inch ring mold. Combine gelatin and cold water; heat gently, stirring until gelatin is dissolved. Stir gradually into eggnog. Chill until mixture mounds on spoon. Whip cream; add 2 tablespoons rum and vanilla. Fold into eggnog mixture; spoon into mold. Chill until firm. Combine remaining fruit and rum. Chill. Turn mold out onto serving plate; pass chilled fruit to spoon over servings. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

PLANS FOR MILLION DOLLAR ANNEX TO COUNTY COURTHOUSE

Plans have been announced for immediate construction of an annex to the Lubbock County courthouse, costing an estimated one million dollars.

To contain at least four floors, possibly six, the annex will be the first phase in an expansion program which is expected to include the purchase and remodeling of the present downtown Post Office building.

The annex, to be built between two existing courthouses, will become part of a governmental office complex in the city's central core. A new four million-plus federal office building also is planned.

The new courthouse facilities will be financed from special funds already set aside which will total about one million dollars by Jan. 1. No bond issue will be required.

As an interim step, the fourth floor of the existing "new" courthouse, completed in 1950, will be remodeled to provide temporary facilities for a non-jury trial room and to provide space for a new jury "pool" system which goes into effect Jan. 1. To cost an estimated \$20,000, the interim work was necessitated by the creating in Sept-
