## DRIVER EDUCATION IS IMPORTANT FOR TEENAGERS

Every state in the nation should have a law affecting every student between the ages of 16 and 18. The law should require all new drivers under the age of 18 to complete a Driver Education course before applying for a driver's license. Further, it should provide for faster suspension of the licenses of all drivers under 18 years of age for oiving violations.

Why do young people have to have such special attention? In the first place, they are our worst drivers. Drivers between the ages of 16 and 18 represent 2 percent of all drivers in the nation but they are involved in 8 percent of all our acci-dents---four times as many fatal accidents as their proportion justifies.

The answer is very clear. To fight this rerrible loss of life in this age group, there are two very effective tools. First of all, a complete course in Driver Education, taught by competent teachers, and paid for out of state funds

EDUCATION FIRST---because surveys show that groups which have completed a course in Driver Education have fewer fatal and non-fatal accidents than other groups.

Second, STRICTER LAW ENFORCEMENT against these youngsters is required. Youngsters fear the loss of their drivers' licenses more than they fear the loss of their lives.

The ideal for every state would be universal Driver Education. Every new driver should be required to complete a standard Driver Education course, taught in every high school, and including thirty hours of classroom instruction, six hours of actual experience behind the wheel and twelve hours of observing other drivers in the car. Such course would help the student understand $t h e$ seriousness of our traffic accident problem. It would help them develop desirable attitudes, teach them the laws and regulations governing drivers, and give them a better understanding of how they can work toward the solution of our traffic accident problem.

To complete a course, the student should be required to attend each scheduled class session. Students missing a session should be dropped but permitted to enter a later course. To pass the student should have a grade in excess of $75 \%$. Upon completion the student should receive a certificate enabling him or her to take the examination required by the state's driver licening division.

There are approximately $93,000,000$ licensed drivers in $t h$ e nation. 6,450,000 are under 20 years of age. They were involved last year in 6,600 fatal accidents ( $13.2 \%$ ) and 2,800.000 nonfatal accidents ( $14.7 \%$ ) while they represent only $7.1 \%$ of all our drivers. These young people average a fatal record of 102 per 100,000 drivers, while the nation averages 55 per 100,000 drivers.

## DRIVER EDUCATION IS IMPORTANT FOR TEENAGERS

Every state in the nation should have a law affecting every student between the ages of 16 and 18. The law should require all new drivers under the age of 18 to complete a Driver Education course before applying for a driver's license. Further, it should provide for faster suspension of the licenses of all drivers under 18 years of age for oiving violations.

Why do young people have to have such special attention? In the first place, they are our worst drivers. Drivers between the ages of 16 and 18 represent 2 percent of all drivers in the nation, but they are involved in 8 percent of all our acci-dents---four times as many fatal accidents as their proportion justifies.

The answer is very clear. To fight this rerrible loss of life in this age group, there are two very effective tools. First of all, a complete course in Driver Education, taught by competent teachers, and paid for out of state funds.

EDUCATION FIRST---because surveys show that groups which have completed a course in Driver Education have fewer fatal and non-fatal accidents than other groups.

Second, STRICTER LAW ENFORCEMENT against these youngsters is required. Youngsters fear the loss of their drivers' licenses more than they fear the loss of their lives.

The ideal for every state would be universal Driver Education. Every new driver should be required to complete a standard Driver Education course, taught in every high school, and including thirty hours of classroom instruction, six hours of actual experience behind the wheel and twelve hours of observing other drivers in the car. Such course would help the student understand $t h e$ seriousness of our traffic accident problem. It would help them develop desirable attitudes, teach them the laws and regulations governing drivers, and give them a better understanding of how they can work toward the solution of our traffic accident problem.

To complete a course, the student should be required to attend each scheduled class session. Students missing a session should be dropped but permitted to enter a later course. To pass the student should have a grade in excess of $75 \%$. Upon completion the student should receive a certificate enabling him or her to take the examination required by the state's driver licening division.

There are approximately $93,000,000$ licensed drivers in $t h e$ nation. $6,450,000$ are under 20 years of age. They were involved last year in 6,600 fatal accidents ( $13.2 \%$ ) and $2,800.000$ nonfatal accidents ( $14.7 \%$ ) while they represent only $7.1 \%$ of all our drivers. These young people average a fatalrecord of 102 per 100,000 drivers while the nation averages 55 per 100,000 drivers.
