## Charges Filed In Overstreet was kn

Murder Case Here

Several months ago an article was published by the Manhanttan Heights Times entitled, "Do you know who killed this man?" Well, late last Saturday night the Lubbock Police Department said they had solved one of the most mysterious murder cases lodged on their records in recent years.

The Police Department stated that two suspects are in custody who were connected with the slaying of a 33 year old Granvel Alexander Overstreet, 2819 East Broadway, and a third man who is in the State Prison at Huntsville was reported involved.

On Sunday morning, Lubbock Police Lt.John Arnold, who has been working continuously on the case for nearly four months, went to Huntsville to talk with the man identified in signed statements given by the two suspects arrested on Saturday.

According to the records, Overstreet's decomposed body was found last September 5th, 1964 near the City of Lubbock Cemetery by three youth: Areador Thompson, Don L. Phillips, and Gerald Nathan, all about fourteen, while hunting.

Up until last week the Lubbock Police Department had not developed any concrete information relating to the

The final pieces to the puzzle came to light on Saturday in a quick succession of events when Detective Sgt. Willis Clark received information that a Lubbock negro had bragged regarding the mysterious death before the body was ever found.

After further checking into the case Clark
and other Police officials found the Lubbock
negroes connected with
the case and the third
party convicted of an
armed robbery last August charged in Lubbock

identified as the suspected slayer.

Overstreet was reported missing on July 20, 1964, and his car was found later near the Mae Simmons Park. According to his wife, earlier in the morning he had gone to pay the rent and buy a pair of hose. Police found the hose he purchased under the front seat.

According to the two suspects who later confessed that they were present of the time of the slaying—the information began to fit the unsolved puzzle perfectly. They told the ploice that they met with Overstreet and the suspected slayer in Huntsville in a resturant near 18th and Avenue A.

There was a drinking party, and all four men drove laong the road near the cemetary. After several minutes of driving along the side of the rao d the car stopped and two of the men got out--while Overstreet and the driver of the vehicle remained inside. Several moments later Overstreet got out of the car.

that Overstreet was knocked in the head with the pistol, stomped, and shot one time in the head by one of two men outside of the car. The slayer dragged the body about forty-five feet under a fence into a shallow ravine where it was discovered several weeks later by the three youths.

At the present time there has been no real motive uncovered for the slaying, but it was reported there was an argument several minutes before the slaying.

## Widow Awarded Insurance Suit

Jurors in 140th District Court on last Wednesday returned a verdict favoring Mrs.Odessa Peace in a civil action on an insurance policy.

The Reliable Insurance Company brought the suit against Mrs. Peace, a widow, and Leo W. Sedberry, owner of Sedberry's Funeral Home. The insurance company sought to have declared void a thousand dollar policy insuring the life of Ieon Peace, late husband of Mrs. Peace.

The insurance company stated that Peace died July 26 and that when issued the policy nearly a year earlier, he had represented that he was not suffering from any illness or disease.

Jurors ruled that the deceased was in sound health at time the policy was issued and was entitled to the thousand dollar amount of the policy.

## The Challenge of The New Era

Several people have commented and expressed disagreement with the column last week, entitled "the duty of the businessman," and this disagreement is cordially welcomed and helpful.

My only purpose in writing is to help cast greater light on some of the many subjects which are not properly illuminated, and not to simply reflect that which is agreeable or comfortable to hear. For, if you will stop to think, much of the trouble that confronts and has confronted us has been the over-attention on the part of many to simply abide by and go along with what is, or seek popularity through agreeableness.

We speak of business, which is often "unkind", and for me to paint rosy pictures of it would be to mislead those people who look to a writer for honesty and fact. Still, there is a better side to business and this too will be shown as the discussion continues, as was intended.

By the expression of honest dissent, when it is indicated, to help in any way possible toward the greater achievements of America by aiding the men, women and children of my race in the assumption of a just place in this country, is my reason for writing.

This goal of the Negre, I believe, cannot be done

by making the difficult appear easy or the recky smeeth.

So, each subject is calculated and written to involve
you; to urge you to think of another point of view.

For this I began writing, and for this, I will continue.

Today, America grapples to preserve Free Enter-

prise.

While one-third of the world embraces the practice of socialism and another half of the world has succumbed to communism, this nation searches for ways in which to meet the challenge.

The growing demands of the poor are daily becoming more vocal, and upon the doors of American business life, twenty million black Americans are pounding, demanding entrance.

This group—the men of the world of business—historically the guardians and protectors of the status quo, must answer that challenge or perhaps see that order which has been of the essence to private enterprise pass away.

The question is whether or not the practice of private enterprise can adopt and include elements which will give it renewed thrust. But in order for this to be accomplished, it will be necessary to recognize and account for the growing aspirations of men as increasingly each man seeks fuller realization of himself

We need not discuss the need for jobs or the economic benefits which dictate that private enterprise be lent greater imagination and justice. It should suffice, here, to say that if America continues to waste 30% of her manpower (10% of its population, who are Negro and 20% of its white population who have been victims of a system they have often nurtured), then such a course invites disaster.

Nor do we need to my that men—white and Negre — need more and better jobs, for this theme has been belabered at length.

This part of our discussion will deal with men as creators of jobs, for increasingly, in this frenzy we are witnessing, few men are saying what should be said. The lecturers and speakers are talking only of employing men; of making jobs which men will fill.

But this course, untempered, can become one of the greatest tragedies of our age, unless it is done with foresight.

And this is one area where the Negro businessman may make a lasting contribution to the nation and the people whom he seeks to help.

The business of the future must provide more for a man than most of the businesses of the present day. It is not enough to say that Negroes need jobs. This is obvious.

Rather, a look should be taken at what now does exist in business, and it should be done in a critical manner, extricating each negative factor that exists, holding it up for study, in order to avoid or circumvent the mistakes of former ages.

Look at the jobs; look at the men; look at the people who make their living in the business offices, the factories and firms.

Ask—and seek to answer for yourself—why the men with "good jobs" are sometimes the most frustrated. Is it the poor who maintain the psychiatrists and overload the mental wards?

Why are ulcers and bald heads so prevalent among business men and executives?

Then, ask yourself where a man spends the greatest part of his waking life. Is it not working?


If a businessman says that he would help the people, then this is where he should begin—by looking and noting what does exist.

The problem then becomes more than the creation of jobs. It becomes the creation of jobs for people—jobs which will allow a man integrity within himself and kinship with his higher aspirations as a rational being. More simply, the businessman must realize that jobs are to be created for people; not people for jobs.

Undoubtedly, much of the frustration and neurosis which exists in the world of business has been caused by inept attempts to bend men and women to con-

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

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

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## Negro Community Given Reprieve

WASHINGTON -- (NPI) -- Beleagured residents of Toby Town, a "pocket of poverty" in Marylan affluent Montgomery county. have been given an extension until April 1, to comply with county demands to construct minimum sanitation facilities.

Toby Town residents have been in the spotlight for nearly a month now, since a law suit was filed, revealing that one of the residents may have been defrauded in his land, Until then, Toby Town had been forgotten and neglected for nearly a century.

Fifteen families live in the area, sharing one (non-working) central well, and an outdoor privy. All are descendants of

two freed slaves who were given the land after the Civil War. In recent years Toby Town has been encircled by an expensive housing development.

Montogomery County filed suit to recover funds paid in welfare assistance to an aged resident of the community, who had at one time owned a large tract of land. The county charges that a "benefactor" of the resident illegally obtained the old man's property, and must repay the county for assistance given.

Pulpit And Pew "NEITHER BLACK NOR WHITE"

"Black Religion" and "Southern White Protestantism" are titles of two books recently debated by a panel of Negro and white theologians at Atlanta's Interdenominational Theological Center. Reports of the debate are summed up in a statement by Dr. Charles Cofer, ITC Dean of Instruction, who served as moderator. He said, "just as the white Protestant has not represented the religion of Jesus Christ, the Negro has not represented the religion of Jesus Christ."

At first glance, either in the North or in the South, one might get the impression that the Ne-gro's religion is different from that of the white man. A large segment of the practiced religion of the Negro is highly emotional, aided and abetted by those ministers who assume that they have not really preached until they've made people shout. The Negro's God has been, for a long time, a somewhere in-the-sky based Grand Santa Claus who is to be asked for food, jobs, clothes, cars, houses, winning numbers in policy or what have you. Some Negro worshippers even offer "God" a thank-you prayer when their number hits, testifying to their friends that "God" has blessed them.

The average white man's religion is cold by comparison. He has just about all the things the Negro has been praying for for years, hence his prayers are not "give me" prayers. Rather, he thanks God, much like the Pharisee in Jesus' parable - "God, I thank thee, that I am not as other men are..." He considered God "his" partner, in business, farming, war, etc.

With the upsurge of the Negro's "stride towards freedom," both Negro and white religion has taken on a different character in many quarters. The Negro's religion became active and militant when he began to discover that his "Santa Claus god" was not going to come down in person to give him ligion can be neither black nor white, his rights. A new God was born in the Negro's mind;

a-God that now became the One who "created all men to dwell in the face of the earth." With his "new" God, the Negro marched, fought, bled and died to prove his kinship with the rest of mankind.

White religion was not ready to accept this new God of the Negro as being their God too. White religionists resisted as their preachers preached on such moral sins as drinking, gambling, womanchasing, etc., with deaf ears towards the cry of God's dark skinned children. The inevitable happened when not only white Protestants, but also white Roman Catholics and Jews recognized that the suffering Negro, dying on pagan altars of hate, was THEIR brother too; created by THEIR God. There this has happened, religion is neither black


One panelist said that "churches always take on the coloring of the community....the community tends to create the church in its own image and it is a two day interacting process." With this we can

And in the context of ensuing discussions, this point will be repeatedly raised because of its importance . . . because it is a statement of the challenge to the businessman.

We speak glowingly and fearfully of tomorrow, but seldom believe ourselves, for it is hard for most of us to pitch our minds into the future. Yet, it is not difficult to look at the progress which has been made during the last 20 years and estimate that the world is growing in number, achievement and tension-which points to an ultra-dynamic future.

If this is so, then, much of the progress and change will be made and created by business. It, therefore, becomes increasingly necessary for b ple in their efforts to meet tomorrow, for this is only a more developed concept of self interest.

The creation of jobs, of itself, is not the answer to such a challenge, for the fact is that business and businessmen will not be successful if they only initiate, sustain or fester the outmoded concepts of yesterday.

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
