A National Championship. eight conference championships, two National Coach of the Year honors, a National Player of the Year and several All-Americans these are just a few accom-plishments Hall of Fame coach Marsha Sharp has achieved in her 23 years at the helm of the Lady Raider basketball program

For 23 years as head coach at Texas Tech, Sharp has been the reckoning force behind all the success the women's basketball program has had. With a career record of 557-175, Sharp has seen the Lady Raider program climb to new heights and continue the successful reputation it has.

Being the longest tenure coach at Texas Tech, Sharp has coach at Texas Tech, Sharp has accomplished what no other team at Tech has done - win a national championship. Sharp guided the Lady Raiders to the 1993 national championship, while Sheryl Swoopes was named the National Player of the Year. Sharp has taken her pro-gram to the next level and it con-tinues to rank among the (no tinues to rank among the top teams in the country year in and year out

Inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in

2003, Sharp not only has had success on the court but also in the classroom. Academics are a priority to Sharp and her staff and the results are there to prove it. San Antonio by a score of 41-31 on Saturday, January 2, 2010. Regardless of what happens during the replacing the coach of the Texas Tech Red Raiders, we are proud of what he has done. He is a gentleman who has done some very outstanding things while serving in the ca-pacity as Assistant Coach at Texas Tech University for ten

years. McNeill, who was born Oc-tober 9, 1958, is the current in-terim head coach for the Texas Tech Red Raiders football team. Before being promoted to defen-sive coordinator, McNeill served the Red Raiders as an assistant head coach, special teams coor-dinator and linebackers coach. On December 28, 2009, he was named interim head coach of the Red Raiders, following the sus-pension and later firing of head coach Mike Leach.

coach Mike Leach. McNeill was a defensive back for the East Carolina Pi-rates for four years, three of which he was a starter and two he served as team captain. In his first year with the Pirates, Mc-Neill helped East Carolina to the 1976 Southern Conference Championship and a berth to the Independence Bowl two years Independence Bowl two years late

McNeill graduated from East Carolina University in 1980. He later went on to Clemson where he earned a master's degree in

McNeill began his tenure at

McNeill began his tenure at Texas Tech in 2000 as a line-backers coach. In 2003, he ac-cepted the role of assistant head coach as well as taking duties of linebackers coach. In 2007, then-defensive coordinator Lyle Setancich stronged down due to then-defensive coordinator Lyle Setencich stepped down due to "personal reasons" after a 49-45 loss to Oklahoma State in which the Texas Tech defense allowed over 600 yards of total offense and three 100 yard rushers.[5] Head coach Mike Leach named McNeill interim defensive coor-dinator shortly after with eight dinator shortly after with eight

dinator shortly after with eight games remaining in the season. On December 28, 2009, Leach was suspended, and fired two days later, by Texas Tech University over the alleged inap-propriate treatment of an injured player. McNeill was named in-terim head coach, and led the team to a 41–31 victory over the Michigan State Spartage in the Michigan State Spartans in the 2010 Alamo Bowl. The **Southwest Digest** rec-



There was an online new at by the AP & others Sun day, January 3, 2010 of an "ef-figy" of President Barack Obama in Plains, Georgia, the hometown of former President Jimmy Carter.
