Dunbar Edges Hamilton Park-Gallile Next

The Dunbar Panthers came from behind twice to defeat the Hamilton Park Bobcats 27-20 at Richardson, Texas. This defeat advanced the Pan-

thers to the Regional Playoffs.

The Panthers who were state finalists last year will play Galille of Hallsville, Texas this weekend for the Region 1-AA title. Dunbar defeated Galille in an earlier game this year by a score of 54-12.

The first score of the game in the first period was made by Hamilton Park, when Richard Bonner tossed a 23 yard pass to Rossevelt Griffith for the tally. They missed the conversion, but led 6-0.

Dunbar came right back in the same period to score when James Jones swept around left end for a 65 yard touchdown. Clarence Hawkins kicked the extra point and Dunbar led 7-6.

Once again with the same combination the Bobcats used to score earlier in the game, Bonner passed for another tally. Then Bonner hit Billy Conger for a two point conversion and took a 14-7 lead.

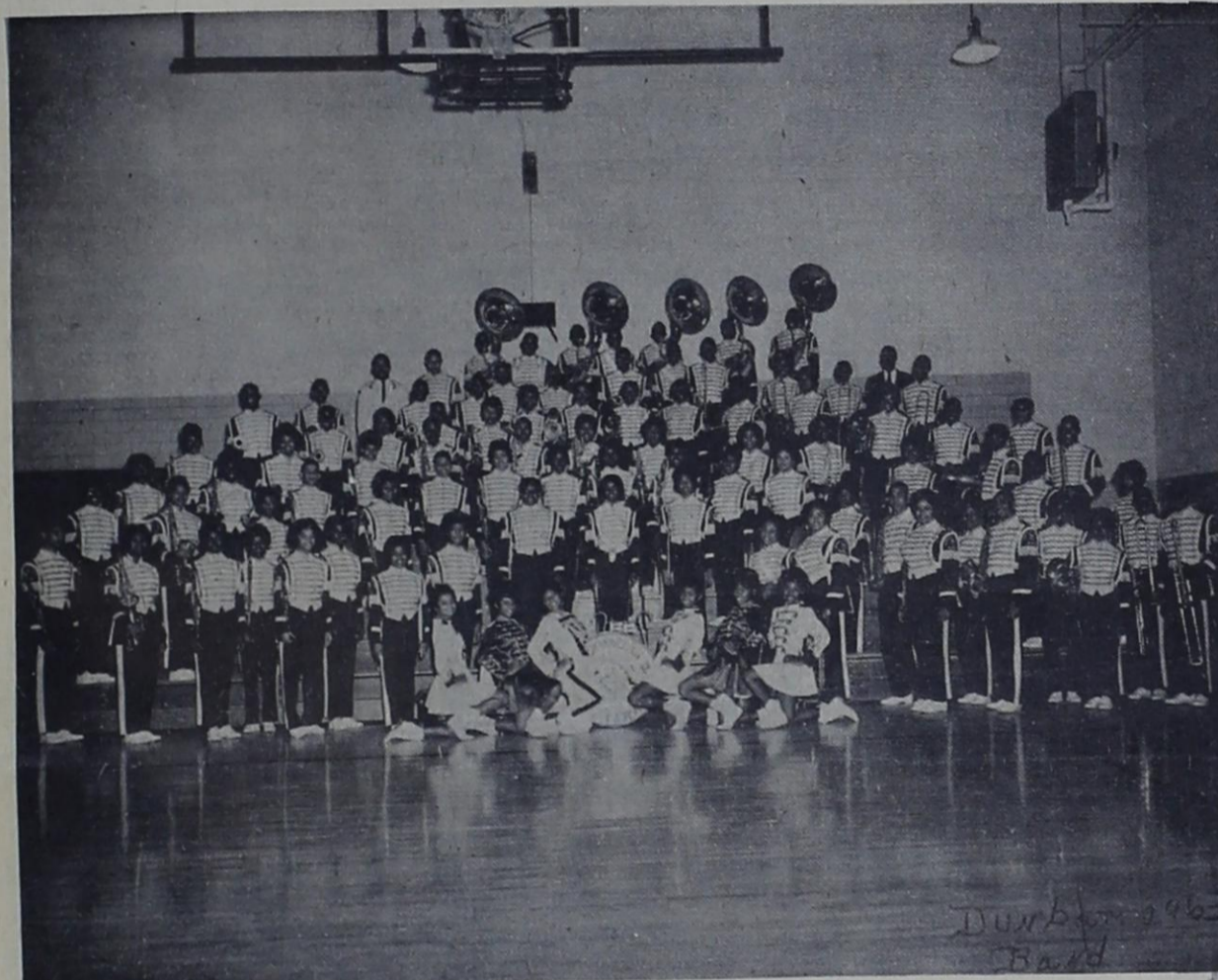
The Panther's, Ernest Stevenson, broke loose from the Bobcat defenders for a 35 yard run to

the Bobcat's three yard line, and in the next play they scored. The try for the two point tally was missed.

With the score at half-time being 14-13 in favor of the Bobcats, they continued to hustle again for another score and went on to lead in the early minutes of the third period 20-13.

The Panthers came back again to score again in the same period, and the try for the extra point was good. The Panthers led 21-20.

With less than five minutes in the final period, the winning touchdown for the Panthers, came, when quarterback James McCormick, sneaked from 3 yards out, the try for the extra point was good, and Dunbar went on to win 27-20.



The Dunbar Marching Band is indeed behind their fighting Panthers. They traveled to Richardson, Texas last weekend to perform at half-

time at the game between Dunbar and Hamilton Park.

The band is under the direction of Mr. Roy Roberts. The young ladies

out front of the band are Madlyn Travenia, Drum Majorette; Winnie Taylor, Feature Twirler; and Dora Crockett, Billie Edkins, and Sandra Alford, Majorettes.

FOUR ARRESTED

Respective warrants were issued last week for four local Negroes. They were Lester Jo (Mooring) Locke and Lafayette Locke both of 1614 Avenue "D", Estee Benton 1907 Ash Street, and Robert James Carpenter 1725 Avenue "A".

These warrants were issued as to the results of investigations by FBI of Narcotics and the Lubbock Police department, which had been conducted for the last several weeks. A series of purchases by an undercover agent of the FBI revealed all necessary information to make the arrest. Benton was the first of the Negroes to be charged in Lubbock to be rounded up by the agents.

James Jackson (Jack) Bennett was also arrested in Midland on the same charges as the above named people. He was arrested in his father's home in Midland on a warrant issued at Hobbs, New Mexico, where he is accused of sale of 4.3 grams of pure, uncut heroin valued on the illicit market at \$2,000 to the special narcotics agent October 28.

Bennett, who says he is an automobile dealer, also has served a five-year term in the old Alcatraz Prison in California on a federal conviction in a Mann Act (white slavery) case in Alaska.

Carpenter was arrested on a state charge of the sale of Marijuana, also Nathaniel Holmes a 32 year old Negro who is accused of the sale of Marijuana, which is still the object of a police search.

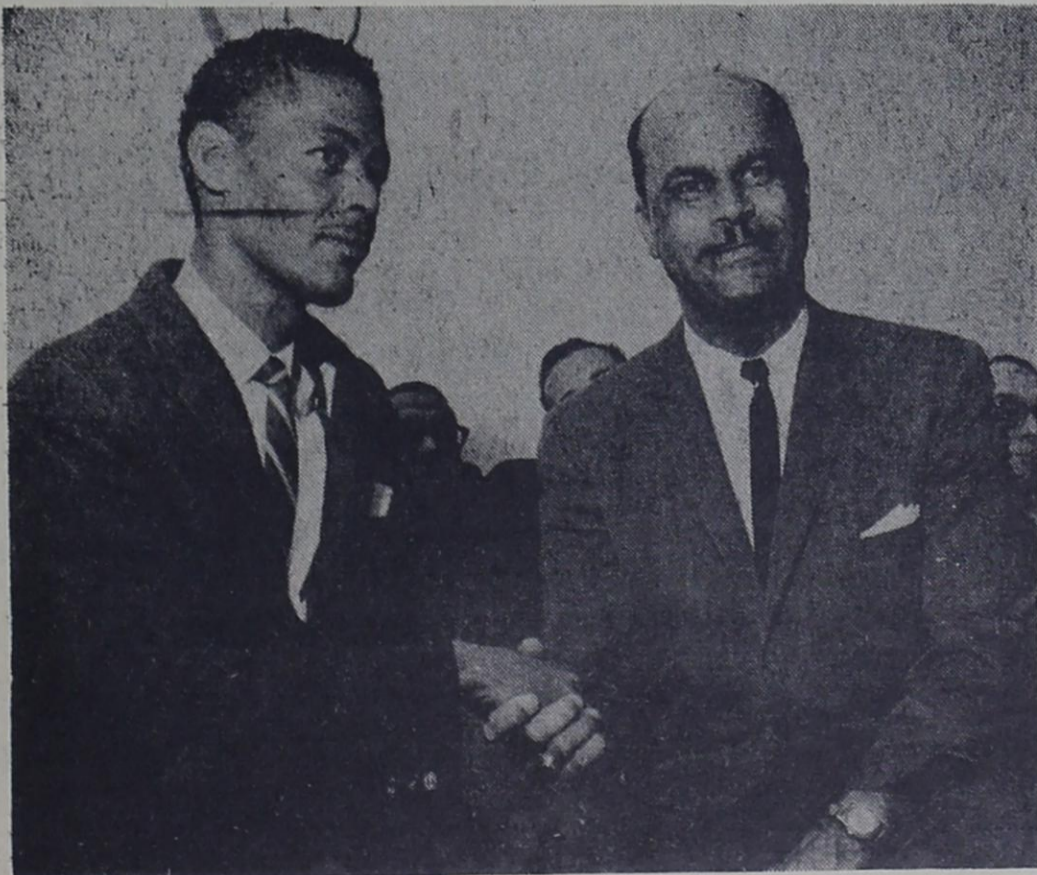
Benton and the Lockes were arraigned before a U.S. Commissioner. Their bonds were set at \$25,000 for each of the accused.

Officers said the buys of Narcotics here were made at homes and business establishments involving the named people above.

The subject, Lafayette Locke, gave officers a hard time while trying to be taken into custody. The arrest of Locke started when he was seen walking South on Avenue "D" to his residence. He said "I will kill any officers who try to arrest me". It took several cars of officers to capture the subject. During his capture, while in handcuffs, he continued to threaten officers, and the use of vile obscene language. At the police department he continued to use vile language, refusing to give information for his arrest.

During his interrogation, he struck an officer and a Sgt. of the police department aside of the head with handcuffs.

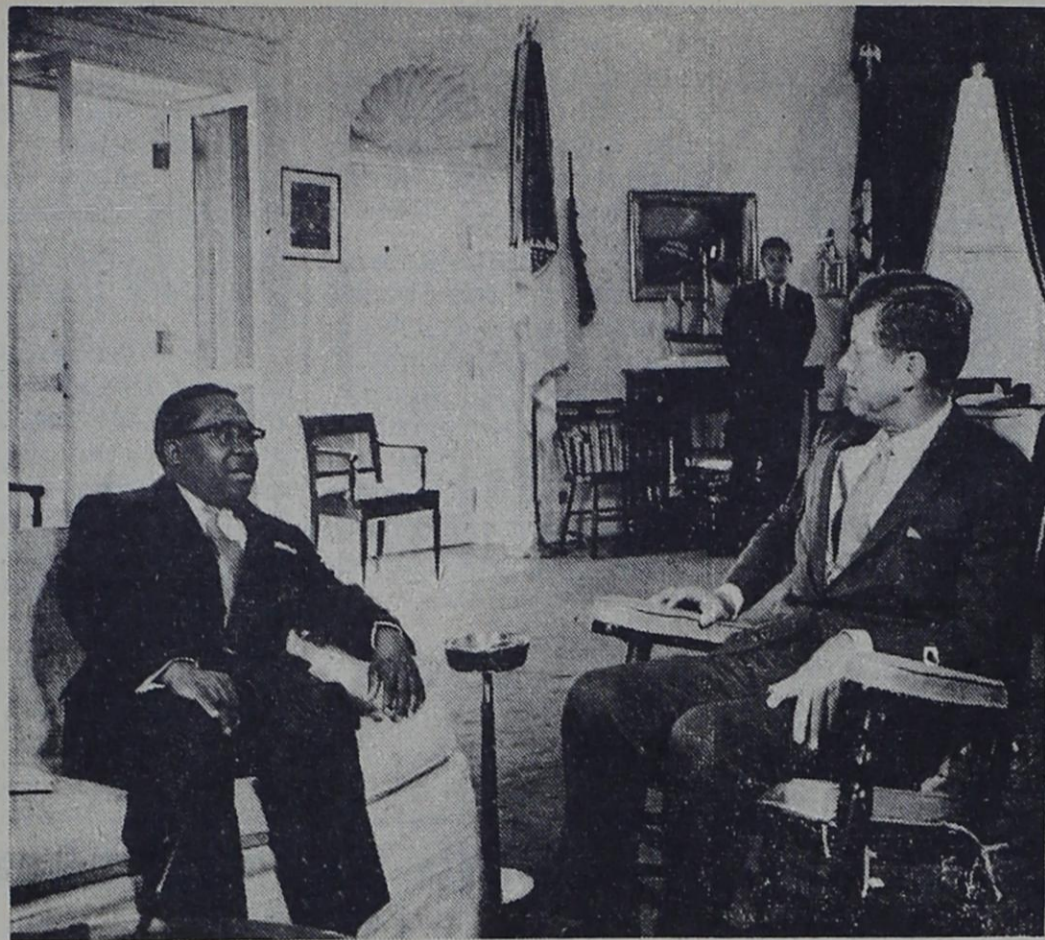
