
The Dunbar Panthers captured the State Class AA football championship on last Saturday afternoon by defeating the Booker T. Washington Bulldogs of Conroe 19-14.

For the last 10 years Lubbockites have been looking forward to boasting about a state championship. The last championship was in 1952 when Lubbock High Westerners captured the Class AAAA crown.

The Panthers scored the third and fourth times it had possession of the pigskin. They led by a score of 13-0 at halftime. With victory on the Panthers minds they scored twice in the first period of play. The hard running Billy Jones received an 18 yard pass from their quick thinking quarterback, James McCormick, for the first score. Fullback be Newman took the pigskin over from the three yard line on the next possession of the ball.

Conroe scored their first time when Gipson, quarterback, connected with a seven yard pass to halfback Willie Moore for the tally.

James McCormick and Joe Newman combined efforts for the Panthers, accounting for the bulk of Dunbar's 210 yards gained in the rushing department. Newman was the leading individual rusher for the game with 81 yards in 26 carries. Mc-Cormick carried only four times, but one was for 50 yards. The Dunbar Panthers picked up 15 first downs, 13 earned by rushing, 1 by passing, and 1 by a penalty; while Conroe had only 9 first downs, 6 by

hnson presented the nation's highest civilian honor authorized in peace time to the Americans and foreign nationals in the State Dining Room which was draped in mourning for the man who conceived of the unprecedented awards.

The late John F. Kennedy, whose idea it was to honor the group with a new Presidential Medal of Freedom, had wanted to present the awards himself. President Johnson did so instead.

President Johnson announced that he was adding his assassinated predecessor and the dead Pope to the list of winners of the new medal. This dimaxed the White House ceremony which had been planned by Kennedy himself.

Each of the 31 other winners of the Freedom Medal had been design-
