
The pool personnel of the Mae Simmons Swimming Pool entertained Mr. Avon Franklin with a surprise birthday party Saturday, July 13th.

Just for today I will adjust myself to what is, and not try to make everthing over to suit me. If I cannot have what I like I will try to like what I have.


