haps some of these facts will enable you to reach your decision in regard to the election.

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"In this election Lubbock is looking ahead in a five year program. Committees were charged with the responsibility to come up with a capital improvements program for the city of Lubbock for the next five years. A total of 75 members were on the advisory committee with 52 citizens taking an active part in planning the five year program. A total expenditure of \$26.5 million was suggested by the city staff. The committee trimmed this to \$22.7 (a cut of \$3.8 millions).

This figure was further reduced by the city commission after a recommendation had been made by a sub-committee studying water improvements to increase water rates at this time (as approved by the voters several years ago) to further reduce the bond issue to \$15,668,000. The increase in water rates is expected to raise enoughrevenue in 30 months to pay for a \$4.5 million water treatment plant so Canadian River water may be accepted into the water system.

Waterworks improvement; Expansion of the water distribution system at \$2.5 million is necessary for distribution of Canadian River water to Lubbock homes and businesses. Water treatment plant . . as previously stated the \$4.5 million for this has been removed from the bond issue. This money will be raised by an increase in city water rates over a period of approximately 30 months. We have known for some time that it is going to be necessary to increase the water rates and by doing this in the next few months it will be a \$1 million saving to the city in interest alone. SERIOUS WATER PROB-LEMS have existed in the metropolitan centers of Texas during the past seven years. Lubbock has always enjoyed an adequate water supply for all purposes.



congested traffic area & represents great deficiency in major thoroughfare system. Traffic signals and control devices and street lighting \$200, 000. The city is building all street lights and lighting major approaches to city such as 19th, College, and 4th St. at a savings of 50% to Lubbock citizens. Traffic signals will be held at minimum need.

Drainage Improvements..\$1,750,000. A major item is the planned purchase of all lake area inside the city of Lubbock. Approximately 3,000 acres are privately owned inside the city limits. Private ownership constitutes problems, such as control of storage, water, and mosquito control.

Some are wondering about the total expenditure affecting the credit of Lubbock. Lubbock is in a position to demand as good or better rate for bonds as any other city in Texas. Our capacity for bonds without disturbing this rating could be as much as \$43 million. Presently we have bonds voted and unsold of \$5.5 million approved in 1946 and 1959 elections. With the bond issue proposed we find that \$21.5 million can be assumed without a tax increase or any other revenue sources. This is based on approval of the


