T w o spent shells were found in the gun. Mrs. Reed had been shot three times, forehead, shoulder, and right side.

It seems as though the entire country is concerned about the repeal of Section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act. Here are some facts in regard to the act on the national level.

As the majority of us know the spolight is on the labor legislation proposed in this Congress is based almost entirely on the bill to repeal Section 14 (b) of the Taft-Hartley Act-the section which permits the states to pass Right-To Work laws forbidding compulsory union membership as a condition of employment. The repeal bill, which is NUMBER ONE on organized labor's list of priorities, passed the House and for a time it was believed it was certain to go through the Senate. The heaviest kind of political pressure is being used to that end. However, there is very powerful opposition to repeal, on the grounds that there can be no justification for forcing a man to join and pay dues to a private organization in order to be able to hold a job. There is a strong possibility that the bill will be passed over until next year.

We will soon learn whether that is the case or not. Meanwhile, there is other labor legislation up for consideration which has been given little or no public attention. It is important legislation, too. One measure would amend another section of the Taft-Hartley Act to permit the building trade unions to direct strikes against secondary employers at construction sites. It would amend the existing provisions which curb secondary boycotts at those sites.

This is not so technical a matter as it may seem. Construction projects differ from most other businesses in that a number of different employers-contractors and subcontractors-may be engaged in work on the same project. The unions want to be able to do what is forbidden now--strike against a secondary employer, such as a subcontractor, even though their dispute is only with the primary employer.

The unions say the bill would give construction workers a right comparable to that exercised by other unions; openents say that to the contrary, it would give the building trades unions very special privileges and coercive powers. Proponents say it would increase industrial peace and the opponents say it would increase industrial disruptions.
