FIRST NEGRO VOTERS REGISTER AFTER 60 YEAR DELAY

St. Francisville, La---The West Feliciana Parish (county) registered four Negro voters here last week for the first time in more than 60 years. There were others who were turned away and one Negro who attempted to register was attacked at his home and threatened with death if he tried to register again.

Two City Women Termed Not Guilty By Jury

Jurors in the 99th District Court and the County Courts-at-Law found the verdict of two local Negro women as being innocent.

Johnell Bryant, 27 year old, was innocent in the knife slaying of a Lubbook man last December 6th. Bryant was accused of murder without malice in the death of another Negro, Mose Jule Roberson, age 33. The murder occured at the Food Bar on 19th Street.

Roberson was wounded in the chest cavity and later died. Bryant said she was 7 1/2 months pregnant at the time of the incident. She did admit to the slaying of Roberson, but said it was in self defense.

Bryant is serving a five year probationary prison term in a felony case at Midland.

The other Negro woman, Wilma Stubblefield, was accused of shoplifting a pair of sandals on July 13th, from Clark's Discount Store.



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

A Baptist minister, the Rev. Joe Carter, was the first of his race to be re-

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gistered in this predominantly Negro area of Southeast Louisiana since the turn of the century. He registered on October 17th, under the watchful eyes of Justice Department Attorney Frank Dunbar and FBI agents. Negroes have not voted in this parish since 1902. Three other Negroes

were registered on October 18th, after successfully passing the state registration examination. Eight others who took the registration tests were told they did not meet the requirements and must wait 10 days before taking the test again.


