For generations there has been an ebb and flow of debate concerning the pros and cons of changing from our system of weights and measures, which is based on the inch, pound and gallon, to the metric system, which is based on the meter, gram and liter. Nothing at all conclusive has so far resulted. But now, due largely to the increase in trade between the nations, interest in the matter has reached a high-water mark. Indeed athorough study is in the works designed to appraise "the desirability, practicability, and cost of a general conversion to use the metric system of weights and measures in the United States.

If we look back in our history books we'll find that our system of measurement came to us from the English--who in turn got it from the Egyptians and others -- and now the English have announced that they plan to convert to the metric over the next ten years. The system grew in a haphazard fashion. A discussion of it by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States points out that much of it goes back to man's attempt to use his ownbody as a reference point. For example, the original inch was the distance three barleycorns placed end to end of the thumb. By way of contrast, the metric system was rationally developed | times. and the result being that the units of length, mass and fluid capacity are all related to each other, and smaller or larger units of these basic measures are computed in units of ten, or on the decimal basis.

The practical meaning of this found in the metric system's simplicity. For instance, to change 3.7 kilograms to grams, the decimal point is moved three places to the right, and the answer, 3,700 grams, is immediately found. By way of contrast, as the Chamber also points out, to solve a similar problem by the English system is much more complicated. To convert 3 7/8 pounds to ounces requires multiplication of 3 7/8 by 16. One teacher of mathematics is quoted as saying that two years of elementary mathematics could be dropped from the high school program if the inch and pound system were replaced by the metric

The big problem is the cost that would be involved in a change over. Estimates vary widely, but it is certain that the bill would be extremely high. It is said, for example, that just to make necessary changes in the drawings alone used by machine tool industry would cost \$18 million. The head of the engineering staff of a major auto company has said, "We would dissipate something between one-sixth and one-fifth of the total value of the company in the conversion to the metric system, and we would have accomplished nothing at the end of it."

It is argued that adoption of the system would offer great advantages to our producers in increasing world trade, inasmuch as most of the other advanced nations use it. This is disputed. Some think that the economic advantages would accrue mainly to European producers, who now use the system and have lower labor costs, instead of to

in any event, much more, it seems certain, will be heard of this matter in the relatively near future, as the cases for and against are developed. As of now, know one really knows, we are a long way from anything resembling a general agreement. *********
