A total of \$165. was collected in this effort. This total plus monies already collected bro-

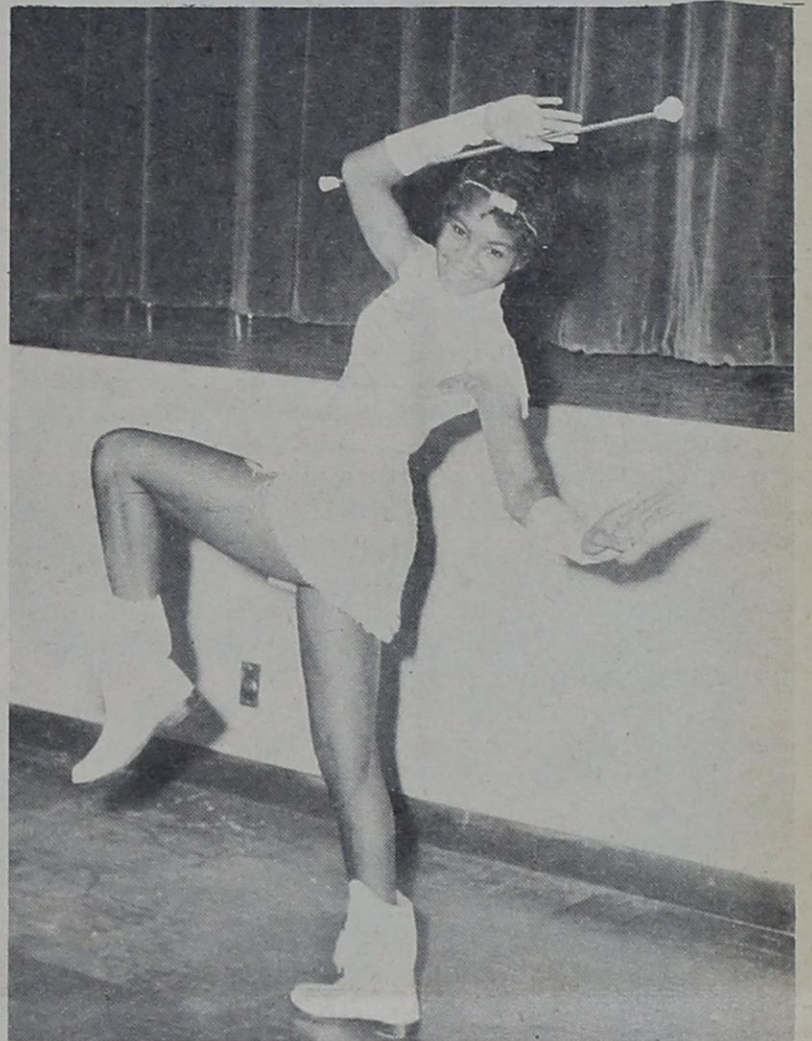

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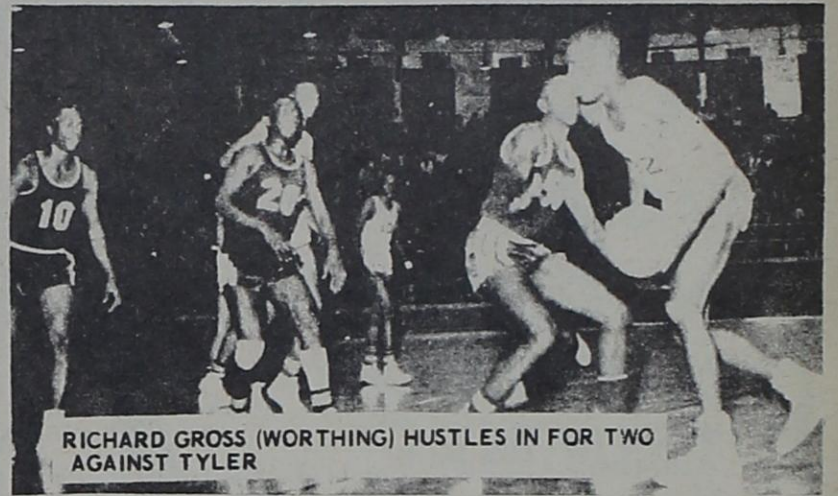

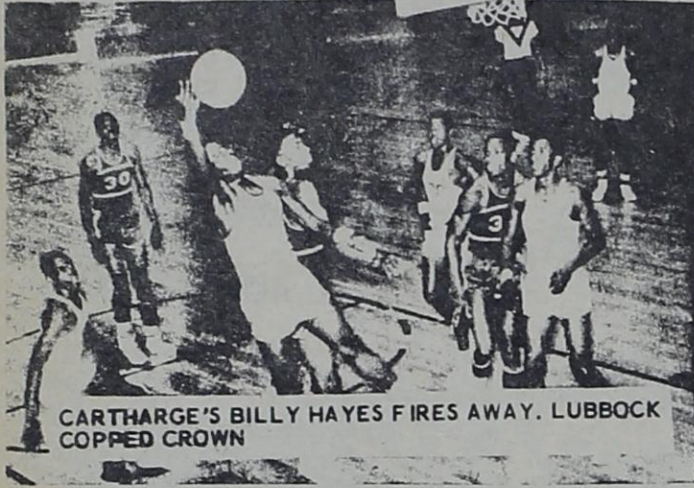

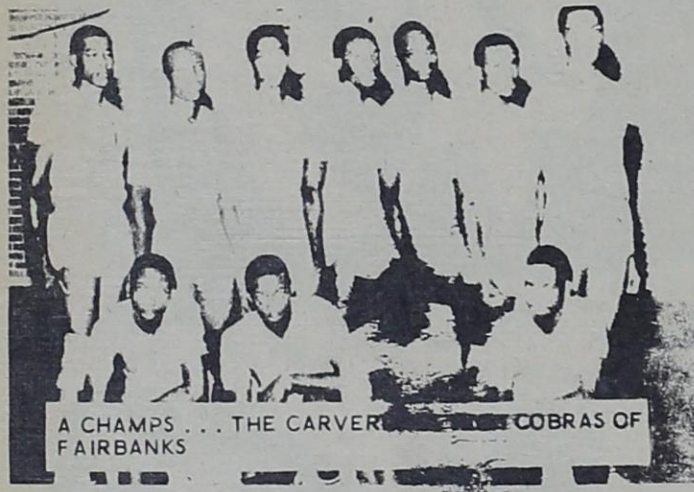

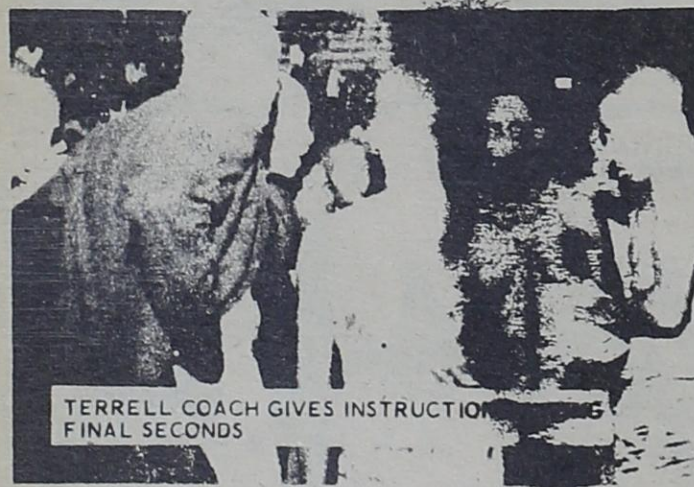

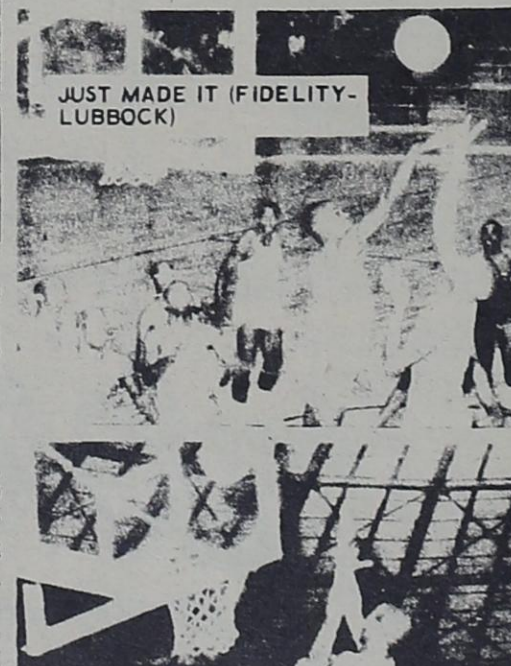

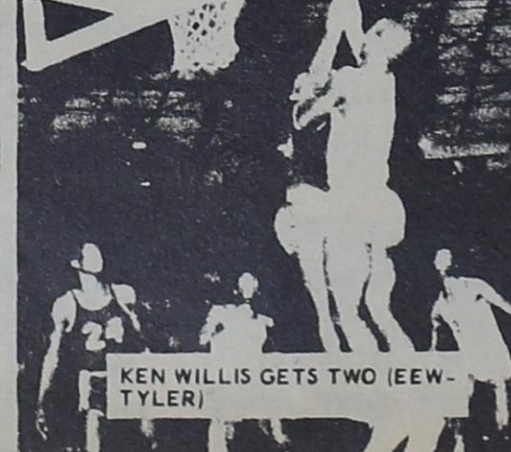

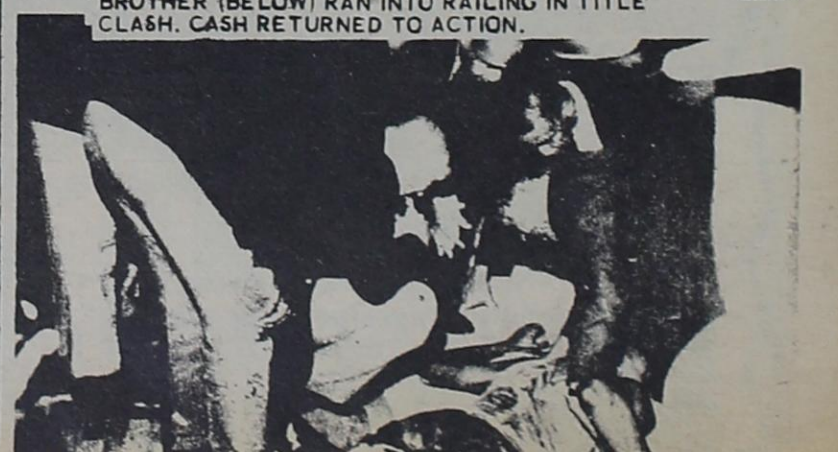

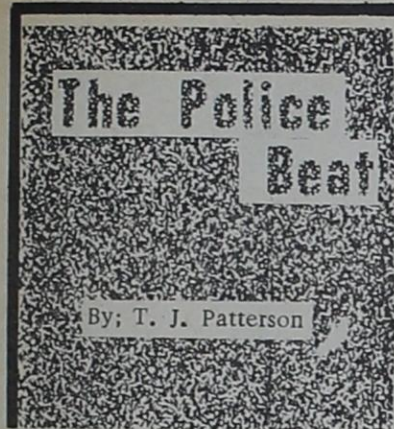


DUNBAR HIGH (LUBBOCK), 3-A CHAMPS, RECEIVE TROPHY
