Dr. E. C. Struggs Retires After 40 Years

Dunbar Claws Carthage For State

Tommy Ricks, Quincey White, and Clarence, three of the finest shooters to ever grace the AAA State Basketball Tournament at Prairie View, were just too hot to be cooled off by Turner High of Carthage last Saturday as they led the Dunbar Panthers to the State Title.

The trio, who landed berths on the six- man all-state team named at the tournament, ripped the nets for 71 points as they led the Dunbar Panthers to a 81-66 victory in the finals and were instrumental in scoring the winning points in the semi-final victory.

This victory for the Panthers clamped the lid on one of the school's most successful basketball campaigns in the history of the school. This was the first time the Panthers have ever played in the state tournament as AAA competitot, and trailed the team from east Texas by a score of 17-14 at the end of the first quarter.

The Panthers led by a score of 24-13 at the end of the second frame and continued to maitain this lead throughout the contest.

Coach Gipson stated that "The turning point of our successful bid for the State Title was a win over Amarillo in our third district game. We really played good ball after that".

For Coach Gipson the victory over Carthage was sprinkled with a bit of sentimentality. Homer Shepard, Coach of the Turner High Five, was teammate of Gipson's at Butler College in Tyler.

Coach Gipson went onto say, "Homer and I talked a lot about the game together, and we really hated to play against each other, but then we decided that this was the way it should be, the two of us in the finals of the State Tournament."

Edward Cecil Struggs was born in Wallis, Austin County, Texas, the only son of Mr. & Mrs. E.W. Struggs.

He received his elementary education in the Wallis and Marlin Public School; high school work and the Bachelor of Arts Degree, Paul Quinn College at Waco, Texas; Bachelor of Science, Prairie View College, Prairie View, Texas; Masters of Science in Administration and Supervision from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan. He has done additional study at Texas Technologicial College, University of Southern California and the University of Michigan; and was the recipient of an honorary Dortorate from Paul Quinn College.

Mr.Struggs was married to Miss Lillian C. Porter, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. L.G.Porter, Houston, Texas, on December 26,1926. They have one daughter, Judith Ann, a freshman in the school of Music, Howard University, Washington, D.C.

He is happly married to Myrcie D. Brown, and the proud father of three children, two boys and one girl.



Spring of 1931, there were no high school graduates, but Struggs had obtained the concent of the school officiate to add the eleventh grade and the Spring of 1932, Dunbar held its first formal graduation exercixes for six members of the eleventh grade. One member of this class, Mrs.Odessa Long, is employed as teacher of cosmetology in the Dunbar High School.

Since 1932, Dunbar's graduating classes have flucheated from 6 to 1 to six, five and gradually increased to as high as seventy-seven; the student body has grown from approximately 125 in grades 1-10 to 1030 in grades 7-12; and the faculty from three in grades 1-10 to 54 in grades 7-12 including such special teachers as boy and girl counselor, nurses, librarians, attendance officer, and special education personnel. The colored school has been enlarged from one building containing three rooms to three separate school plants with the fourth now under construction.


