



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NOT SOPHISTICATED ENOUGH

I really had a shock. At a luncheon a few of us were passing the time of day. I said rather jovially, "Well, I suppose all you fellows will be in church on Sunday." One said he went every Sunday; two others said most of the time. The rest were more or less Easter Sunday churchgoers. But we got a rather shocking reaction from one man. He showed anger. His face reddened as he growled, Hell, no, not me. Count me out of church for good!"

Startled, we all fumbled for words and embarrassing silence fell. After a moment I ventured, "What's on your chest,

"I'll talk to you per-sonally, later," he replied. That ended the conversation which left us all with an unpleasant feeling.

When I saw him he let me have it straight. He minced no words. It was pretty tough talk, believe me. "The church and all the ministers in my town can go straight to---,"
he said. "Any why not, for
that's just where they're letting the rest of us go. He was very bitter. Scarcely in all my experience had I heard such resentment expressed toward churches and ministers in general. His story was this.

He had worked hard and, as he expressed it, "used my head in business and got ahead and made a pile of dough." He and his wife then decided they should move to surburbia. "I had the money so we got everything: three cars, country club membership -- the works. Before this I had been too busy to go in much

for social life, but now, having got up in the com-pany, I had to make some special big-deal contacts... Big deal!' he spat out con-temptuously.''It all makes me sick. I'd rather have nothing and live in a fourthfloor walk-up as we once did, and have some peace of mind and happiness."

He looked at me with pain in his eyes, "I'm in hell," he said. "Mary and I have broken up. For God's sake, why didn't the church help us before we hit the rocks like this?" He almost sobbed. "The church failed us. They let us down. They let us think that sindoesn't matter any more. I'm through with 'em.''

I sat in sadness. He was unreasonable and full of self-pity. He was floundering badly in his thinking, blaming everyone but himself for the crackup of his life. That he was deeply wounded was evident; and as a spiritual physician it was my duty to cleanse his wounds, reshape his thinking, help him find God's forgiveness, teach him to forgive himself, and help him rebuild his life on a sound spiritual and moral basis.

He finally did grasp that the type of life really happy is the Christian life, and at last he discovered the truth in Jesus' words: "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly."

Maybe this so-called sophisticated generation isn't so sophisticated at all, Sophistication means to know your way around in the world, to be worldly-wise. All too many people really don't know their way around. Lots of them get hurt like Jack and Mary. They can't be very worldlywise to mess up their lives in such unsmart ways.

But there is an answer and it is in a life-changing spiritual experience. Real Christ-centered faith, with emphasis in depth on a faith full of the tremendous joy of spiritual living, can give people zest-packed lives,

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
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HIT AND RUN DRIVER ARRESTED HERE IN CASE




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
