Dunbar Student Victim Of Fatal Mishap

Collins Family Reunion Held

Mr.Ellis C. Collins was host to a family reunion of last Saturday and Sunday, March 6 and 7. The reunion was held in the home of Mrs.L.H. Crawford, where he is a long time resident. Mr. Collins has three brothers, L.C. (his twin now living in Denver, Colorado), David Lee of Midland, and Richard, Jr. of Littlefield.


Each brother, joined by his wife, and family, motored into Lubbock on Saturday afternoon and spent the night and all the day Sunday. It was the first time all of the Collins boys had been together since January of 1958, at which they were called to attend the funeral of their father, Mr. George Allen Collins.

The Collins family originally comes from Marlin, Texas. They moved to the west in the fall of 1939, making Tahoka their home; later in 1942 they moved to Lubbock where they became engaged in the cleaner business.

The Collins boys are very talented; they once made up a singing group known to many as the original"Holy Gospel Singers, " and were knothroughout the state of Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico. They are former members of Rev. W.D. Hayne's church , Holiness#2, where they served as Sunday School Superintendent, Deacon Board, Assistant Se cretary, and member of the church choir.

Jesse Collins, their father's youngest brother, was with them for the reunion. Even though he is a shut-in he seemed to have really enjoyed the occassion along with the many friends of the family who were present for this joyous occassion.

Mr. Ellis C.Collins climaxed the affair with a very lovely Sunday dinner. There were family pictures taken and the family worshipped together on Sunday evening.

Honored With Party



"I was surprised when I entered the room", smiled Mrs. Josephine Sneed, a very happy viticm of a surprise birthday.

This party was given by Mr.S.T. Sneed of 1503 East 25th street last Saturday evening at the Mæ Simmons Party House. There were approximately forty people present at this gala affair.

Mrs. Sneed, mother of seven children, Joyce, Linda Kaye, Ocquinetta, Sue Kim, LarryD., Mae Ellen, and Sandy Todd; received many lovely gifts from her family and friends. The dining area of the party house was decorated with many beautiful baloons, and the delicious cake and punch really topped off the affair.

A seventeen year old Dunbar High School Sophomore, Evelyn Johnson, was killed Friday afteenoon when she was thrown from a car as it careened from a collision at the corners of East 28th and Redbub Avenue.

This death was labeled the third in the city this year and the second in less than a month on city streets.

Evelyn was a passengerina car driven by her brother, Rayfield Johnson age 20, of 3504 East 15th street. They were enroute from school when a collision occurred with another car driven by Melvin Earl Hicks, 17,1722 East 32nd street.

The car driven by Hicks was traveling south on Redbub and the Johnson's car, a 1954 convertible, was heading west on East 28th street. The front of Hicks' auto struck the right rear side of the other vehicle, spinning it around.

Hick's car then careened to the southwest corner of the intersection, stricking the corner home of Mrs. Viola Clark, 1714 East 28th street. Johnson's car also in the same state careened to the southwest corner of the intersection, unmarked by traffic signs. Jumping the crub and coming to a complete halt in Mrs. Clark's front lawn.

The only passenger, Evelyn, was thrown out and landed in the yard about half-way between the vehicles. The dammage to the vehicles were not as great as would have been expected for such a tragdey. Damages to Johnson's car were minor, while the car driven by Hicks was damaged when it struck the corner of the home.

The girl was dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital.

Time has come now citizens for such actions to be taken to inquire about safety equipments in these hazardous areas. We must protect our children's welfare as well as ours. It is our total responsibility to see that all types of safety percautions are taken for protecting each person-

young or old-rich or poor. The death of the young school girl, Lubbock's third fatality of the year, was an omen for our civic and social fraternal and religious organizations to work closer together for the betterment of our community. Accomplishing any type of constructive achievement is not solo fete-nor is it glory for an individual of organization.

Not only are "stop signs" needed, but there is a neccessity for pedestrian crossings-our children are also members of city organizations, namely; boys club, and they do cross heavy traffic areas in route to commercial areas after school hours.

Let's quite playing the game of Rip Van Winklewake up and finding out that some tragdey has struck down one of our youth or even you. By all means let's guite whispering in a group about what would be done about anything. Why not do something about it?

One of the most popular quotations heard after the incident which occured on last week was:"I told you there is a great need for a stop sign at this intersection!

Don't you think that "stop signs and other type of safety equipment are really needed? "Why not do something about it?

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




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WOMAN KCIKED AND BEATEN

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

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PHARMACY

House Bill 393, designed by the Houston Board of Realtors to protect deed restrictions, was introduced into the Texas legislature last week with the endorsement of 11 of Harris County's 12 Representatives.

The Bill also has the support of State Senator Criss Cole,

"At present, it is up to one or more homeowners in a subdivision to bring court action if they find a violation of deed restrictions, "K.E. Antone, chairman of the Board's residential protection committee, explained. "Under the proposed law, the machinery of the state's judicial system would be thrown behind deed restrictions, so that the courts would enforce deed restrictions and would grant injunctions against apparent violators while suits were pending."

In many instances of deed restriction violations, it has been necessary for a civic club to collect a "war chest" to stop an infraction, it was explained by Grant Webster, Realtor president. In some cases, he added, violators take advantage of this time consuming process to complete a construction project in violation of the restrictions.

"Other homeowners and owners of land have been unable to obtain a temporary injunction because of the legal expense.
