OPERATION HEAD START

Dear Parents:

We have been given a grant by the Office of Economic Opportunity to begin a "HEAD START" program in the city of Lubbock. This should prove to be most valuable asset to the children of this City. We beg your assistance in this venture.

We have room for five hundred children in the program. The children must be those who will be entering first grade this coming fall, they must be sixby September 1. The children will be given pre-school training. They will be given meals and medical attention.

This program differs from the Lubbock Public School Pre-School Program and will not interfer with it.

There must be absolutely no sectarian or racial differentiation in this venture. The consideration here is the good of any child who can benefit. Our endeavor is to give the needy children some little start so that there is less chance of drop-out and subsequent delinquency.

Classes will begin June 28 and continue for eight weeks. Any text books used will be those approved for Public School use. Addresses of the school centers are:

ladies who are intere sted in becoming a nurse, you must keep in mind that nursing is an open field and more are needed, but one must work hard to acquire success..one must be dedicated."



But still J was a failure. I asked the advice of the group and one man suggested, 'Maybe you are neglecting that middle word, hope. Why not work at developing a hopeful attitude?'

"So I began to practice thinking hopefully. I worked at this from morning to night. It didn't come easily but it came. If I got with people who were talking negatively about something, I would try to counter by talking hopefully about it. After a while I goy my mind so filled with hope that everything around me came to be touched by hope. And that was when I was set free from my failure tradition and began to live a lot more effectively.

"In fact," he concluded, "I was literally saved by hope." So it seems that hope is an important factor in being an effective and successful person. To become a person of hope you have to cultivate it. You do not become hopeful just by saying, "From now on I'll have hope." It takes practice, It takes real thoughtconditioning.

"But there is one encouraging fact about the human mind. If you dwell long enough upon any quality and practice it you will develop it. Think hope -- practice hope -- and you will have hope.

Ernest Hemingway in "For Whom the Bells Toll' tells of a certain brigade in the Spanish Civil War. This man "never knew when anything was lost and if it was, he would fight out of it." That is the way with people who have the quality of hope. It keeps them going no matter what. Hope gives courage, strength, vitality, power; and somehow hopeful people always seem to come through.
