The attendant said he opened the cash register to oblige the customer when the hijacker pulled a black pistol while demanding, "Give me your money.


Fant said the bandit repeated his remark two other times in rapid succession, cursing as he reached for the money. He did not bother the silver.

LOOK AT HISTORY

It's quite interesting to look back at early American history and reveal some of the historical events during the time of slavery.

By careful study, one will discover that the freedom of the slaves was pushed into the background by the trouble which began between the American Colonies and England. You see...there was bad feelings between the Mother country and the Colony, and it had been increasing for about ten years --- but the first clash of Americans with British soliders took place on the 5th of March 1770, and this incident was important for two re-

First, it marked the break of the colonies away from the British Empire. Second, it was in this clash that the first man to die in the war for American freedom. He happened to be a NEGRO.

Perhaps many of us are not fimiliar with this great American, but his name is written on the pages of many outstanding history books as a great American.

His name was CRISPUS ATTUCKS.

His death came on the evening of March 5, 1770, when seven British soldiers on State Street in Boston with pointed bayonets took his life... If you would look into your history books you'll find that a group of Americans, forty or fifty in number, waited near the head of the street in the heart of the city. They were led by this man Attucks, more recently employed on a whaling vessel. Their weapons were clubs and stones. As the soldiers drew near, Attucks shouted, "The way to get rid of these soldiers is to attack the main guard."

At this signal the Americans filled the air with rocks and sticks. The red coats opened fire. The tall mulatto in the foreground was an easy target

and he was the first to fall.....

Despite the patriotic example of Crispus Attucks, however, the American colonies were slow to accept Negroes into the army. Perhaps they wondered about holding a man in slavery after he had risked his life for his country. In 1775 the British governor of Virginia offered freedom to all slaves who would join the King's army in its fight against the American revoluntionists, and thisform rced the colonies to change their minds. They quickly realized what it would mean to their cause if the British were able to enlist numbers of Negro slaves, and it was to offset this move by several states to arrange that military service from slaves be accepted. Arrangement for the slaves were made by owners and they would receive payement for the slaves from the public tre-

It is remarkable to know that several thousand Negroes took advantage of this opportunity, and more more might have served if another plan had been successful according to history.

It is really true there were Negro soldiers at Valley Forge, and there were others in most of the important battles of the American Revolution.

From the time of Crispus Attucks until the prsent you'll find that the Negro has contribute d a great deal toward his country on the military aspect of life. You may ask why is this important? WellI'lltell you ... It doesn't matter who you are, White or Black, you can still serve your country..... This is your COUNTRY

As the late President Kennedy said, "Don't ask what your country can do for you, but what you

can do for your COUNTRY."

From The Fireing Line

I got my freedom 'Way over yonder And I got my dignity 'Way over yonder

The "Way over yonder" we so ofetn shout about is not so far distant in the Alabama future. A rejuvenated Marego Movement is on its feet. In my territory, Demopolis, three organizations, the Demopolis Civis Club, the Demopolis Youth League, and SCOPE, will spearhead the program. Two targets---racism in hiring and racism in politics --- will occupy our summer efforts.

Two proposals have been enacted to remedy these two Alabama ills. Intensive registration efforts have, in the last five weeks, quadrupled Negro registration, in this, a county where 176 dead whites are still on the voting lists. An employment service established and run by the youth group has already begun placing Negroes in jobs opened for them by the 1964 Civil Rights Act. Where the service finds a clear-out case of racism in hiring, it will file suit on susiness concern involved.

Classes are conducted daily in four communities. As a rule, hygiene is taught on Mondays, Negro history on Tuesdays, Political science on Thursdays, while literary classes are held on Fridays. Sundays and Wednesdays are dates re-

served for spirited mass meetings.

Simultaneously, we are tightening up our security measures. Several incidents have called for the action. Three regional churches where masses have been conducted recently were burned to the ground. Following a Klan rally in the Greensboro High School Stadium last week, three Negroes were shot in neighboring areas by night riders. One victim has expired. Jimmy Collier, our second in command, was yesterday beaten at Linden as whites sought to block the courthouse doors. Shortly afterwards Ruth Levin, a SC OP E worker assigned to the town was fired upon.




