It was learned that the National Education Association, Professional Rights and Responsibilities Commission, has received specific reports of Negro teachers being displaced through ellimination of dual school systems in the Stateof Texas, as well as reports from counties in the

At the same time, the Commission urged all teachers who were displaced or who knew of others being displaced to notify their State Teachers Associations and the National Education Association Professional Rights and Responsibilities Commission as soon as possible.

According to the Executive Secretary of NEA, William G. Carr, "NEA deplores the dismissal of Negro teachers as the result of racial discrimination in the process of transferring Negro stud-

ents to formerly all-white schools."

"The best practice of the teaching profession calls for the most competent available educator in every professional position. The NEA, as always, is opposed to the dismissal of competent teachers, NEGRO or WHITE. The association has a long record of defending teachers who have been dismissed for reasons unrelated to their competence."

In the event that Negro teachers are removed from their teaching posts because of racial discrimination, the NEA will assist them to locate teaching positions by the registration of such displaced teachers and making the register available to school boards throughout the United



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



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MORE JOY IN LIVING FOR YOU

By Norman Vincent Peale

The little city girl sitting by the train window gazed out at the passing scene in fascination. Every few seconds she went into transports of delight." Oh, Mommy, look, a cow!" "Mommy, see the horse in the field! See that pretty horse!" And an instant later: "Oh, what a beautiful big truck! Mommy, look!" The child's high-pitched,

The child's high-pitched, excited voice carried the whole length of the car. The mother was visibly embarrassed. "Shush, shush," she kept saying. Finally she turned toward the people sitting nearby and said, "Please excuse her. She still thinks the world is wonderful."

Now the thing I find significant in this little episode is the mother's apology. It appears that finding the world wonderful is something one expects and tolerates in children only --until they are old enough to know better! If this is just one person's notion we can write it off as some unaccountable idiosyncrasy. But no one wonders to what extent it may typify the unconscious attitude of many people.

Suppose the adult citizens of this nation were to take an association test in which you were supposed to jot down the first thing suggested to you mind by the word "life." Some people would come up with a ssociation words like "wonderful," "precious," "thrill, "joy," glorious" and the like. But I outnumbered by others who uncertain, strenuous, bebewildering, bleak, tough or even "lousy."
