Mr. Craven was employed with the U.S.



Your Social Security And You

If you are getting monthly Social Security benefits. here is an important unnouncement. As of 1983, earnings after the month you reach 70 will not affect your Social Security check. There is no limit on the amount you can earn and still get your full payment.

K you are a working mother, you have an important stake in Social Security. Your children have the same protection on your Social Security earning record as they do on their father's. This means if you become disabled, retire, or die after working long enough under Social Security, your children can get monthly Social Security payments until they are 18. For more information, ask any Social Security office for a free copy of "A Woman's Guide to Social Security."

If you didn't sign up for Medicare medical insurance when you were eligible, you will have another opportunity. There is an open enrollment period every year from January 1 through the end of March. You can enroll any time during those 3 months. However, your premiums will be 10 percent higher for each year you could have signed up but didn't.

If you get monthly Social Security disability benefits, the law now requires that your condition be reevaluated at least every 3 years. This is to determine if there's been any change in your condition. You will be notified by mail when your case is scheduled for review and you'll be asked to fill out a form that will help in the re-evaluation

Tired of standing in line every month to get your Social Security check cashed? Here is a suggestion. You can have your check sent directly to wherever you have a savings or checking account and it will be deposited to your account. Just fill out a direct deposit form where you do your banking, and they'll take care of the rest. No more waiting in line, and no worrying about your check getting lost or stolen.





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

CBC Gains 2 in Election & Savage Tours Middle East

Everyone of the 18 Black Members of Congress were reelected except Shirley Chisholm, who retired, and she was replaced in Brooklyn's 12th District by an outstanding former State Representative Major

Incidently, New York became the second city with 3 Black Representatives in Congress by electing, in addition to Owens and the astute veteran. Charles Rangel, Edolphus Towns from Brooklyn's 11th Congressional

In addition to Towns, 2 more Blacks won seats in Congress formerly held by whites: the able former State Senator Katle Hall of Gary, Indiana, and the young former State Representative Alan Wheat from kansas City, Missouri, I was reelected to my second term by a 9-1 landshide, and found the time to also campaign a bit for Owens and Hall.

For the next three weeks, my column will originate from the Middle East, where I will be filing a series of on-the-scene reports to alert and aducate the public to what is happening in that war-torn-area.

As the only Black representative taking part in this Congressional fact-finding mission, I am looking forward to having an opportunity to discuss important foreign policy issues face-to-face with Middle East

The trip, my first to the Middle East, will take me to Israel, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Jorday, Syria, Lebanon, Tunisia, and Cyprus with stops in France and England on the way to and from the region.

I will meet with foreign official, to discuss the Middle East peace process, security in the Persian Gulf. negotiations aimed at solving the Lebanese crisis and the removal of American and other foreign troops from the country. American economic and political bilateral relations will also be discussed.

I am going to the Middle East rather than take a well deserved vacation because of my great interest in foreign affairs and particularly peace in the world and justice for the Third World Nations. As a Member of Congress, I am interested in this because 1 of 3 of your tax dollars go for defense and foreign 'd. Moreover, as Black Americans, we should expand the horizons of our political interests, since we should understand the feelings of the oppressed of the world better than any

It's estimated drunk driving accidents cause \$17 billion a year in economic losses, as well as, taking 26,000 lives annually at J injuring 757,000 people. There are no such statistics available for maining caused by marijuana drivers. Doing nothing about driving while under the influence of marijuana and other harder drugs is a dumb act.

A strict penalty for drunken driving is a good idea whose time has long come of age. An equally nunishing ruling for marijuana and hard drug driving would be a modern approach to a growing problem. People have apparently forgotten the high use of dope in Black American ghettoes in the past when people were unemployed in the 1940s. Unemployment in this country at 10.1 percent is the worst since 1940.

For the sake of the children of this country regardless of their color it must be recognized that there is a great danger of life and limbs when driving under the influence of alcoholic drink of some other form of dope.

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

year there, Cal State-LA placed sixth in the AIAW Track and Field Championships.

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


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
