Citizens, ministers, community organization members, and leaders of east Lubbock are asked to attend an important meeting on Tuesday evening. May 8, at 7 p.m. at the Mae Simmons Community Center to give input to the East 34th Street and Southeast Drive (formerly Railroad Avenue) railroad crossing.

The "Lubbock Digest" has taken steps to

contact all citizens of east Lubhock about this imporant meeting. The Texas Highway Department has delcared this crossing, according to Jim Bertram, city planner, as a bad situation. Approximately \$65,000 was immediately allocated to construct a crossing light and a cross bar to control the traffic flow when there was approaching rail traffic in the area.

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



As I look aroung the city of our beloved Lubbock, it is very easy to wonder if we are in or out? As Black people. Looking at the recent position with the city of Lubbock for a Human Relations officer, we see bilingual which is a method of screening out Blacks. Why should the director have to be bilingual, when the language in this country is English. Every country that this writer has visited (either in Military service or as a Civilian) I had to learn to communicate in the language of that country or

This is another suttle way of screening out Blacks as long as the director has someone on his staff that is bilingual (that is another quarm with our beloved City, the lack of Black contracts). For example: A Black sham company is doing the City's newspaper. The West Texas Times, which along with sham companies all across the nation posing as Black. This is one of the problems S.B.A. has had white people posing as Black fronted businesses. This problem has been addressed to the proper sources and our sham Black company is still doing the job. Lubbock Blacks are not benefitting from any Federal Funds in Lubbock except some petty stuff like utilities. But, no contracts. The story is "no qualified ones." That is old hat. I am tired of hearing this. If I do the qualifying for any thing, I can qualify anybody for anything I want to. So that is a bunch of bull. The story....the real true story is Blacks do not know what is available.

Are we really achieving equality? More information on what is really going on should be made well known in Black communities, especially those communities where comfort and integration are mistaken for equality. Wake up middle level Blacks. You are still Black and don't you ever forget it!!! Our path is rough and our pace

Black Americans must be prepared to deal deciseively with such self-serving and insensitive detractors.

For one thing, whites have always been represented in our colleges and universities in far higher proportions than blacks have been represented in white-oriented institutions. Overwhelmingly, the whites in our black schoolswith some few brilliant and highly notable exceptionshave come as superior saviors, as parernalists who have exploited us in a nriety of ways.

Most who have been invelved in the academic and religious life of black America will recognize two batic types of white professionals with markedly different results between the two.

One group is these whites Persons who would cavalierly "barge in," with no as with the author of the humility regarding the im-Chronicle's article and his caustic supporters-who seek plicit hardships to which their presence would contrito foist themselves upon or to bute crucially, could doubtintrude themselves into the lessly be considered for the category of those who "dis-The 'intruder whites' imqualify" for favorable conmediately on the surface

sideration. Such persons reveal, at the very least, that they have some basic first grade homework to make up from quite some time ago.

The other category of whites with which many black professionals are familiar are those who have been invited into the black com-

use all of the positive recources of the white community which they can command. But these positive resources are not generally among the judely intrusive group who would be prone to intrude and then, if found macceptable for any reason, would seek to mai.gn the already far too greatly and

undeservedly demeaned

black community.

By way of summary, blacks do not need-and should see as essentially "unqualified"-any white professional who is insensitive to black housing, employment and other needs as a federally official "affected class." Blacks need white resources; and blacks should seek out most diligerally those who are humble enough to learn from us with openness and to learn appreciatively of what we have to teach.

While the basic provision of MAG is to fill 50% of all job openings where underrepresentation exists with minorities and women, a by-pass or relief from tais requirement was provided

requests must be approved by

the territorial office and are granted where clear evidence shows the unavailability of a qualifiable applicant or incumbent needed to move the facility toward its long range goals. Requests may also be granted in those instances where, because of obviously superior qualifications (e.g., experience, demonstrated ability, length of service), an individual representing the majoraty in a particular job category may be chosen.

The effect of MAG has been to accelerate Sears' progress toward its longrange goals. The flexibility of the plan has enabled Sears to keep the intent of its Affirmative Action Program uppermost in its managers' minds while avoiding the charge of a possibly illegal, fixed quota system. Thus, the use of the term "mandatory" vannot be taken literally.

Sears' Commitment Sears says it believes that underrepresentation of minorities and women is plainly a national problem, permeating all segments of societygovernment, education, the professions, religion, as well as business. The record shows that Sears is approaching the problem in a businesslike manner-setting targets to get minorities and women into management positions in as short a period as practicable-maintaining a reporting system that measures progress and identifies strengths and weaknesses-

just as the company does in

any other important phase of

its business. Quite importantly, Sears has informed all of its managers that future evaluations, compensation, and promotions will be based on how well these equal opportunity responsibilities and other important company objectives are met.

With such an apparently outstanding commitment to —and record of achievement in terms of—affirmative action, why then would Sears and the U.S. federal government be at odds over what is best for black Americans? Next week, this column


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
