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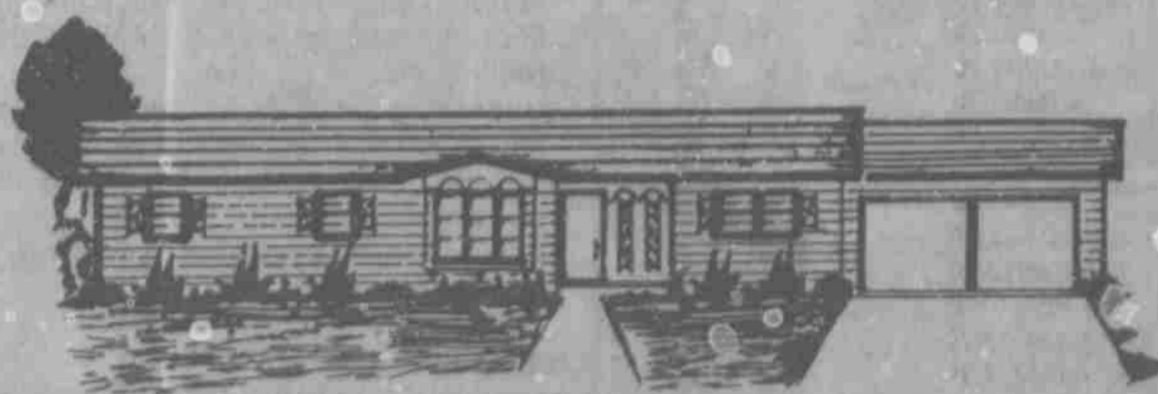

## It Needs To Be Said

**WHAT IS WRONG WITH OUR YOUNG BLACK ADULTS?** Have they gotten completely out of control? Is drugs really the bottom line to the problem?

The recent Butler Park incident clearly shows that too many of our young adults have no common sense, no respect for the rights of others or right and wrong and feel that creating a disturbance is the solution to a situation. Last year, they were shooting and stabbing among themselves at the park, this year they have attacked the police in large numbers, what will they do next? The Butler Park crowd has always shown no concern for others simply because they think little of blocking the street in both directions just to talk and if you say something about it, they will stay longer or may become down right rude. Realizing that not all the Butler Park crowd is ill manners heathens, but, when you associate, contribute and support heathens, then what are you?

East Lubbock does not need anyone on our streets that has no respect for other people, that feel violence against the police will resolve any situation, and who think they can do whatever desired and we the community and police will accept it. There are too many good people in East Lubbock to allow a handful of heathens make our entire community the "jungle of Lubbock." Attacking the police for doing their job deeply harms the police protection we pay for. What policeman, except Officer William H. Britt, would come into East Lubbock on a disturbance call by himself? There are times when assigned East Lubbock Police units are busy on other calls and back up units may have to come from across University to East Lubbock. Now, wouldn't it be sad if one policeman's early arrival could have prevented a killing or severe bodily harm had the policemen not waited 5 to 10 minutes for a back up.

These type incidents have a tendency to stay with a community long after the debris has been cleared away. Just like you and I, the police look upon their job as a means to earn an income, they do not want to get hurt or killed doing their job anymore than you or I. Therefore, plain old human nature will cause them to be more hyper, in turn, making them more likely to over react to an East Lubbock incident and as the case generally happens, the victim is an innocent bystander or a minor incident is blown into a major one, simply because prior situations created a tensed hyper individual.

We must regain control of our community. The police and city officials can only do so much. The community must become involved morally, physically and mentally. Each of our community heathens has parents and even if only one is available, that parent must regain control of that heathen, even if they are 30 years old. Parents should always have some control over their children and when a person, regardless of age, does not honor and respect the wishes of their parents, then you know darn well, there is little anyone else can do with that person. That person becomes an animal, loose on our public streets. And if East Lubbock had just one wild animal loose on our streets, we would be screaming for something drastic to be done. Well, East Lubbock, there is a herd of wild, two legged animals, namely young black adults, roaming our streets daily. They have already claimed far too many teenagers and other young adults as drug victims. These animals have taken our rights to drive certain streets, they think little of breaking into our homes and stealing our



hard earned personal property to sell for a \$10 or \$20 cocaine "rock." These animals think little of using your young child or your young adult for their personal gain, be it financial or sexual. These same animals have turned our community into a "jungle," unsafe for good people to freely move to and fro; as you never know when and where you will run into these animals doing their thing.

The time is NOW to rid our community of these animals. We must take whatever steps necessary to rid our community of these will animals. Arresting parents or making parents pay a fine or attend mandatory training

classes, even when the violator is a young adult, is not beyond understanding under the conditions we face in East Lubbock. Drastic situations require drastic actions and being East Lubbock young adults have created drastic situations with drugs and a total lack of respect in general, we can no longer ignore their actions. If we can not turn the tide SOON, decent law abiding citizens will not be safe on the streets of East Lubbock. Let's roll up our pants legs, roll up our sleeves and go to work on correcting the problems created by our young adults before it gets completely out of control.

## Vote "Yes"

### For Bonds!!

If we are concerned about the future of our boys and girls in the Lubbock Independent School District then we should not hesitate to vote in favor of the April 18, 1989 Bond Election. There is no time to be negative about this effort, because our boys and girls are involved. We must see to it that these bonds are passed.

Of course, it will be the largest bond election ever in the city of Lubbock, but there is always a first time for anything. Among those items being voted upon will include air conditioning for our kids.

We understand that money is always the bottom line in any endeavor, but we can't even be concerned about what the bottom line is at this juncture in the lives of our most precious assets, our kids.

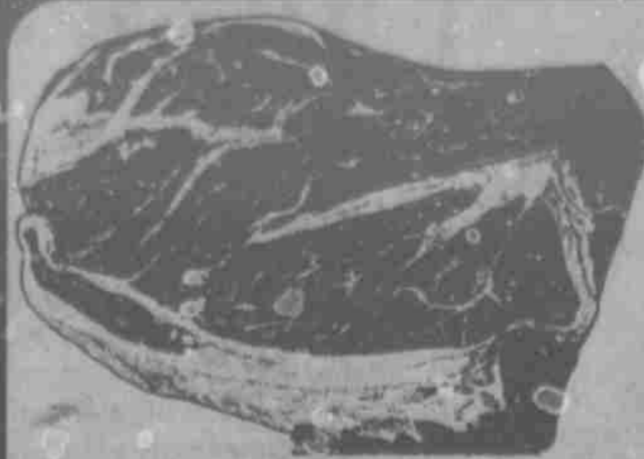

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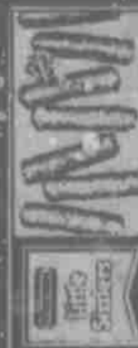

Hebrews 12:7 & 8: If you endure chastening, God death with you as sons; for what son is he whom the Father chasteneth not? But if ye be without chastisement, whereof all are partakers. Then are ye bastards, and not sons?

They gave me the best spot, where when you throw feed in, you can see the backs of the fish ten to twelve inches. Under the big tree, this was where my Grandfather would sit when he fished. He was Rev. Billy Morrison, I. I threw my hook in the water and my Grandfather's dog and my dog was fighting. Papa died in 1976. His dog was fighting mine which was in heat. As I looked around, I said: "Pappa's dog is trying to make some little ones, but my dog is putting up a fight." When I said that, I heard a crack. I didn't pay it any attention. Then I heard it again, only louder, now I know it was wood breaking. But I didn't look around, and it came again even louder. "C R A C K!!"

I said, "I don't know what made it fall, but maybe, the Lord doesn't want us to fish on Sunday." Hysterically, I began to pull mine in.

I was standing there looking into the water, and the warm sun was shining on my back. I said, The sun feels good." I didn't know whether I meant me the Son on the sun on my body, but I walked over between my Dad and his wife and said: "I hear tell you'll have a problem." They both said, "We sure do." They kept fishing as I told them, "Big nations take time to talk over and to work things out, and that's what they need to do, and we did talk."

I was standing with my rod and reel in my hand when we heard a horn blow near the house, now the house is setting across the front of the fishing tank. Someone was blowing and we couldn't see them. We all looked up toward the house and horn blew again. Something ice cold came over me, and my Dad said: "That's the Preacher's horn. He is on his way to Church, with nobody home, he'll go." But I said, "Preacher's horn or Gabriel's horn? That's my horn something tells me I can go to Dallas now. He said, "You're kidding." I said, "That's my horn and I've got to go." We shook hands and hugged and said goodbye. I called my dog, and started to Garland, Texas. (I remembered my school teacher, Mr. George Scott, Jr. of Dunbar High School, telling us when we'd come in the room just at the sound of the bell. "Don't ya'll be late when Gabriel blows his horn". It aint over yet; I ord with Part 4 next week.

Listed are ten guidelines for constructive criticism by William C. Sanford for those who would be critical concerning policy, and those who CARE for the youth of our city:

- I. Be sure of the facts.
- II. Ask yourself, "Would Jesus also think that this warrants criticism?"
- III. Consider whether your own conduct gives you a stable platform from which to criticize.
- IV. Consider whether you can make your point by commencing what you like rather than condemning what you dislike.
- V. Focus your criticism on ideas and issues; do not attack persons.
- VI. Honor the distinction between testifying to your own feelings and pronouncing judgment.
- VII. Credit others with good intentions until there is compelling evidence to the contrary.
- VIII. Attempt to add constructive suggestions to your criticism.
- IX. Exercise some restraint in sharing your criticisms with friends.
- X. Express your criticism clearly, promptly, and directly without venom to the person who evoked it.

#### U. S. Envoy For Namibia

(NIS) Career diplomat Roger Maguire has been appointed to head the U.S. Mission in Namibia during the transition period, although the State Department has declined to give specifics on the role that he will play.

When contacted by telephone, Maguire stressed that the U. S. would be playing a "liaison role," insisting that the Mission would not be monitoring or intervening in the U. N. supervised independence process. He also declined to say whether he would be remaining in Namibia after independence elections in November.
